

Building a Better Bomb - Trap

On March 23, 1983, President Reagan proposed the Strategic Defense Înitiative (SDI), a major technological and intellectual undertaking designed to render nuclear weapons obsolete. In November 1984, a study group of the American Physical Society was formed to study the scientific and technical feasibility of the Strategic Defense Initiative, popularly known as Star Wars. Caltech Professor of Applied Physics Amnon Yariv, a member of this committee, discussed technical aspects of SDI and presented a summary of the committee's findings in the first Watson Lecture of the school

Professor Yariv's talk focused on Intercontinental Ballistic Missle (ICBM) technology, expected improvements in ICBMs, and weapon systems designed to attack ICBMs. A modern ICBM is a device used to launch and aim from one to ten missles at independent targets. An ICBM is launched much like an ordinary rocket.

The boost phase, the first phase of an ICBM's trajectory, brings the missle and warheads to an altitude of 180 kilometers. Three stages of the ICBM's rockets are shed during this phase, which can last up to five minutes. Only the bus, the part of the ICBM containing the warheads, remains for the post-boost or second phase of the trajectory.

Over a five minute period during the post-boost phase, warheads and decoys are aimed and launched one at a time. A warhead (or decoy) launched between the Soviet Union and the United States spends about twenty-two minutes in the mid-course phase and then reenters the atmosphere. Twenty to forty seconds into the terminal phase, the warheads detonate.

The boost phase is the ideal time to attack an ICBM. Hot gasses from the ICBM's rockets propel it out of the atmosphere, making the missle easy to detect. Due to the high vulnerability of ICBMs during this phase, it is surmised that both the United States and the Soviet Union plan to shorten its duration

During the post-boost phase, the warheads separate from the ICBM, increasing the number of targets that a defensive system must detect. The warheads now travel without any propulsion, making detection more difficult. Large quantities of sophisticated decoys, which are much cheaper and not easily distinguishable from real warheads, further complicate the detection of true warheads by a defensive system.

As the boost phase lasts a short time, attacking an ICBM during the boost phase requires detecting and destroying the ICBM quickly. Directed energy weapons, including particle beams, which can travel at nearly the speed of light, and laser beams, which do travel at the speed of light, are potentially useful weapons for such rapid destruction. Several types of lasers, including free electron, x-ray, and chemical lasers, were discussed. Lasers could be located in space or on the ground, and networks of mirrors in space could redirect the beams at the targets. Unfortunately, the Earth's atmosphere modifies the paths of laser beams and reduces their intensity. Much current research is devoted to decreasing and counterbalancing the atmospheric distortion through large deformable mirrors which can distort a laser beam in such a manner as to exactly cancel the distortion the laser beam will encounter in the atmosphere. Caltech graduates and current members of the Caltech community have performed much of the research in this

Many schemes can be used to counteract the effectiveness of lasers. Prior to an all-out attack, space-based platforms containing lasers, mirrors, and other equipment could be destroyed or blinded by detonating a nuclear weapon in their vicinity. Rotating boosters and boosters coated with special shields could reduce the effectiveness of lasers by decreasing their effective intensity. Redesign of the post-boost phase could allow the launch of warheads more quickly and at lower altitudes. At lower al-

titudes, x-ray lasers would be rendered ineffective, and the effectiveness of other lasers would be greatly reduced.

None of the lasers currently in existence are powerful enough to be used as an effective part of the Strategic Defense Initiative. The panel of the American Physical Society determined that even in the best of circumstances, a decade or more of intensive research would be required to provide the technical knowledge needed to make an informed decision about the potential effectiveness and survivability of directed energy weapon systems. Though the technology involved in such systems isn't fully understood, there's a lot of pressurefor Congress to spend money on untested technologies rather than basic research in the hopes of producing more immediate results. Professor Yariv feels this is unwise, and hopes that the report recently issued by the panel will influence Congress to spend money directly on basic research.

Professor Yariv graduated from the University of California at Berkeley with both Bachelor's and Doctoral degrees in Electrical Engineering. After working at Bell Telephone Research Laboratories, he came to Caltech in 1964. Among Professor Yariv's major research achievements is work with lasers, integrated optoelectronic circuits and phase conjugate optics.

Ozone Death

To the Editors:

May I offer my solution to the dangerously depleted ozone layer problem. Of course, all chlorofluro-carbons (CFC's) should be totally banned internationally, but that in itself will not heal the ozone layer. It should be possible to repair the ozone layer using my method. First, manufacture ozone and liquefy it (LOZ). Then load the LOZ aboard large military refueling tanker aircraft. These aircraft would then climb to their maximum altitude above forty thousand feet, the lower level of the ozone layer. As they distribute ozone by spraying it, the strong upper level jet stream winds at that altitude will carry the ozone even higher aloft, well into the ozone layer where it will stay as desired. Ask Dr. Beav.

Dear Dr. Beav: Every couple of weeks my girlfriend goes berserk-she bitches complains-absolutely nothing makes her happy. She craves sweets, eats everything in sight and then complains about having to lay on the bed to zip her jeans (she says she is just puffy)! Most of the time we get along fine, but these mood swings and eat-o-ramas are making me crazy too! Is something wrong or should I just get used to −Puffy's Guy Dear Puff: At first thought you might want to get the net, however, there really could be a medical explanation. She could have PMS (premenstrual syndrome). PMS is defined as the cyclical occurrence of various signs and symptoms beginning near or after ovulation and resolving soon after the onset of a woman's period (menses). Many women have some symptoms of PMS ranging from mild to severe. Some common physical symptoms are: abdominal bloating (puffiness); headache; weight gain; sore breasts; increased appetite; craving for sweets; and acne flare-up. PMS symptoms can also be psychological such as: anxiety, depression, irritability, aggression, wide mood swings, lethargy, and sleep disorders. Some common recommended

treatments are to avoid caffeine and alcohol; small frequent meals; Vitamin B6 (no more than 100mg per day); Evening Primrose Oil, two capsules twice a day (available at health food stores); calcium and magnesium supplements. For more information on other treatments contact the Health Center.

Dear Dr. Beaver: Since twice-a-day football practice has started I have been having this weird feeling between my legs. At first I thought my jock strap was too tight so I decided to not wear one—but that didn't help. My symptoms are getting worse—I h ave constant itching and a red flaky rash in my crotch. I need help——

-Miserable Jock Dear Miserable: Since we understand that it is socially unacceptable to dig and scratch in your crotch we have some advice for you . . . it sounds like you have tinea cruris (jock itch). This is caused by a fungus that thrives in moist dark areas of the body, especially skin folds, i.e. the groin. The treatment consists of keeping the area clean, dry, and wearing loose clothing. There are several antifungal ointments that can be used in addition—they are available at the Health Center.

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
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Way Rad Culture!

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
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

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

The trip started on a typical note as the team left Caltech very early Friday morning. The caravan of cars, led by the fearless Coach Dodd, all turned right on California, except for the Brunomobile which turned left. Runners Off on Right Foot To Fine Year, New Records

Caltech is experiencing tremendous interest in cross country with the current men's squad of over 40 runners, and even more remarkably, the women's team is comprised of 14 athletes.

Just exactly what is causing this explosion, or infusion of new blood, if you will, is a total mystery. The accusations concerning no interest loans to runners and Corvettes for the top seven are totally lacking in substantiation. The results of the ongoing NCAA investigation will be reported in future editions of the Tech.

The First Meet...

After only 4 days of preseason practice, on September 19th the men's teams (all 3 of them) travelled to Santiago Oaks Regional Park in Orange for the Chapman College Invitational. In a field of 19 teams, Caltech's "A-Team" finished 7th ahead of SCIAC opponents Redlands, Whittier, and LaVerne, as well as NCAA Division I teams such as Loyola Marymount and Pepperdine.

Only one woman, Ami Choksi, was ready to race that weekend and she managed an improvement over last year by clocking 30:24.

Notable performances were turned in by senior John Gehring, who finished 13th overall in 24:12 on a hot and hilly 4-mile course over sandy horse trails. Chris Campo, a talented freshman, was next at 25:55, while freshman Scott Kister was less than a minute behind in 26:54. Rounding out the top 5 scoring runners were sophomore Ron Rogge at 27:43 and senior Joe Shiang in 28:02.

Home, sweet home

The following week Caltech hosted last year's top three conference teams at the "notorious" Lower Arroyo Park. One particular conference coach just couldn't seem to find anything good to say about our classic and challenging 5.1-mile home course. Oh well, what would the home field advantage be without a little controversy?

Either Caltech is making progress or these other teams are slipping because last year all three of them skunked our men 15-50. With a strong effort, John Gehring led the charge by blazing to a new school COURSE RECORD of 28:46. This was 51 seconds faster than his previous record established in 1986, and it allowed him to crack into the top 5 of both Oxy and Pomona while finishing ahead of Redlands' #1 man. Gehring

placed 6th overall. Chris Campos was next in line with a 21st place finish of 31:32. Joe Shiang moved up to 3rd man in 32:37 with junior Alex "The Greek God" Athanasopoulos running 4th and clocking 32:56 in his first race of the season. Rounding out the top 7 were Mark Lyttle, just a tick of the clock behind Alex (32:57), Ron Rogge (33:39), and

freshman Mike Pottenger (33:41). Pomona-Pitzer defeated Oxy 27-30, establishing itself as the team to beat in '87, with Spencer Allen of P-P speeding to a new

While Oxy beat Caltech 17-46 and Pomona put it to us 18-45, the "Battling Beavers" just missed upsetting Redlands, as we lost 27 - 30in a heartbreaker. This outcome might have been reversed had Scott Kister not imitated a snowball in an avalanche as he rolled down a hill in Catalina during Orientation, or if Huck Seed hadn't gotten off course after leading the race during the first mile. Both of these talented freshmen can be the difference between winning or losing a close race, according to Coach Jim O'Brien, and in the future they have the potential to be All-Conference in our league.

In the women's competition, Oxy flexed some heavy duty muscles by sweeping the top 7 spots. Another course record was established by Michelle Trimble of Occidental College as she ran away from everyone in 18:42.

While Oxy swept Caltech 15-50, we were considerably closer to Pomona as they defeated us 22-35. Since Redlands was unable to field a complete team, Caltech won by forfeit.

Leading the list of superb performances for CIT was junior Bibi Jentoft-Nilsen who covered the 5-kilometers in 22:45. This time indicates a considerable amount of summer conditioning as Bibi improved on her best previous clocking on this course by 3:23.

Close behind was sophomore Vicki Lane, who stopped the clock in 23:05, an improvement of 1:20. The coach has Vicki on a unique training schedule designed to protect her fragile knees. During the week she runs 3 days and swims 4 days in an attempt to keep her healthy throughout the season.

Freshman Liz Warner ran impressively in 24:23 and will only get better as her aerobic fitness increases. Coach O'Brien is very impressed with Liz's competitive spirit and feels that she will eventually emerge as a team leader.

Completing the top 7 for Caltech are junior Carmen Shepard (26:01), freshman Susan Schima (26:28), sophomore Christina Garden (26:39), and sophomore Ami Choksi (27:15).

Hats off to all the student volunteers who assisted with this meet!

Beating the heat

Finally, our most recent meet was conducted a week ago Saturday, again at Lower Arroyo Park, in the midst of the record-breaking heat wave. If you haven't gone out running in 104__ temperatures, you just haven't lived, died, or gone nuts (choose one). Survival was definitely the name of the

Despite the horrendous conditions, the men defeated Pepperdine (21-40), Christ College (16-47), Citrus College (18-45), and Southern California College (forfeit).

Unfortunately, we lost to Master's College (26-29) in a squeaker that wasn't decided until the last half-mile. The good news is that two weeks ago Master's defeated us by 105 points at the Chapman Invite and now we are breathing heavy down their necks.

John Gehring worked his way up from 10th place at Mile 1 to 3rd by the finish in a tough effort and an intelligent race to stop the clock in 30:25. Scott Kister was close behind John as he turned in his best race to date, finishing 5th in 31:38.

Chris Campo (32:27), Alex Athanasopoulos (33:24), and Mark Lyttle (34:52) closed out the top 5 scoring runners. Joe Shiang ran 35:11 and John Bowers clocked 36:06 to displace runners in the top 5 of other teams.

The women's team defeated SCC, Christ College, and Citrus all by forfeit while losing to Pepper-dine (21-35) and Master's (22-33). Again, Bibi Jentoft-Nilsen led the team with a 9th place finish in 23:49 as Liz Warner was less than one minute back in 24:37.

Moving up to 3rd on the team was Susan Schima in 26:10, an 18-second improvement over last week. Carmen Shepard ran very well in the heat, clocking 26:53 while junior transfer Betina Pavri cracked the top 5 in her first race. Ami Choksi (28:18) and junior transfer Selena Forman (29:56) closed out the scoring for Caltech.

Both the men's and women's teams are currently at 4 wins and 4 losses as we prepare for this week's SCIAC confrontation with Whittier and Redlands in Yorba

the details and also for enduring the rowdiness shown by fifteen Techers away from school.


Wednesday afternoon Caltech battled the invaders from Chaminade in Hawaii. In a very


called no fouls, the Beavers lost the game. This weekend Chaminade plays the Beavers again in the Caltech Classic Tournament.
