Politzer, Paul Newman Play in New Fission Film

David Politzer; Professor of Theoretical Physics, has been taking some time off this term to appear in a new Roland Joffe movie about the Manhattan Project. The film, whose working title is Fat Man and Little Boy, stars Paul Newman as General Leslie Groves and Dwight Shultz (Murdoch, from The A-Team) as J. Robert Oppenheimer. Politzer plays Dr. Robert Serber, one of Oppenheimer's closest scientific collaborators. The picture, which is still in production, will probably not be released before next fall.

The movie, which is set primarily at Los Alamos, begins with the creation of the Manhattan Project and the appointment of Groves and Oppenheimer to head it up. In it, Joffe traces the history of the project through the Trinity test and the dropping of the bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Particular attention is paid to the politics and dilemmas faced by those working on the project, as well as the private lives of Oppenheimer, Groves, and several fictionalized characters. The fictitious characters are amalgams of many perso-

Robert Serber was a post-doc in physics at U.C. Berkeley prior to World War II. He was a colleague of Oppenheimer, and although not a part of the administrative hierarchy, was Oppenheimer's scientific right hand man on the Manhattan project. Serber was the man who gave the introductory talk to scientists new to Los Alamos, familiarizing them with the project. Politzer met the real Dr. Serber about ten years ago and described him as "quite a character". Politzer did not even attempt to imitate the real Bob Serber in the movie. "I'm not an actor. I played myself, ... that's not why they got me."

Roland Joffe, whose previous credits include The Killing Fields and *The Mission*, is the writer and director of the new movie. Joffe is famous for using non-actors in his films to achieve greater realism. Joffe wanted real physicists in his movie. The movie is being filmed in Durango Mexico, and in Politzer's words, "There just aren't any

physicists hanging around in the cantinas looking for odd jobs". Thus, Joffe and casting director Nancy Foy went recruiting at Caltech, Stanford, and other universities. Politzer is the only professional physicist in the movie, but six other people with scientific degrees will also appear in the film.

At first, Politzer was not keen on the idea of taking time away from his work. Not teaching any courses this term, Politzer was looking forward to devoting full time to several projects he was working on. However, Politzer has long been fascinated with the Manhattan Project.

Politzer gives three reasons for his fascination. First, says Politzer, the Oppenheimer saga is "high tragedy, worthy of Sophocles". Second is the question of the responsibility of physicists to society. The final reason is that the current state of physics in this country is a direct result of the Manhattan project.

Thus, Politzer agreed to talk to Joffe. The two talked for hours about science, religion, politics, and other issues. Joffe expressed concern that most people are ignalities actually involved in the norant of the events that are the we all live. He explained that he feels bound to educate the masses about the people and the difficult decisions that they had to make regarding the atomic bomb. Says Politzer, "Mr. Joffe believes that he can affect people's minds and hearts. That's why he makes movies." Politzer was impressed with Joffe's ideas, and agreed to take the part, provided his time commitment could be minimized.

Politzer eventually spent twelve days in Mexico working on the movie. The first six days were spent rehearsing. Politzer spent time with Newman, Schultz, and the other actors, showing them how real scientists behave. In return, the actors worked with Politzer and the other non-actors. giving them acting tips. Politzer returned to Durango three more times for actual shooting. These trips lasted one, two, and three days.

Disturbing Incidents Mar 'Unpleasant' Interhouse

This year's Interhouse, as many Techers can attest, featured a number of disturbing incidents, many involving non-Tech personnel, despite the measures taken in recent years to forbid advertising offcampus and limiting access to alcohol. These events prompted Dean Chris Brennan to speak at this week's IHC meeting concerning the past, present, and future of Interhouse.

Dean Brennan began by describing how Interhouse has evolved over the past twenty years. Interhouse, he said, began as a carnival of sorts, intended for the Caltech community, wherein the houses would display their ingenuity in various ways. There was an element of costumes and performances, and the feel was very much one of entertainment and interaction. It was a festival for members of the Caltech community, alums, faculty and staff and their families.

In the last five or so years, he went on, Interhouse has changed dramatically, and, in his opinion, for the worse. Standing on the Olive Walk, he said, he found himself "surrounded by young people from the surrounding community" who have no knowledge of or stake in Caltech. The atmosphere has grown far more unpleasant. It was "not [something] I would have brought my family to," and, he said, he left that evening feeling very depressed.

The feeling that Interhouse was poor this year was not his alone, nor was the lack of fun the only thing wrong. For the second year in a row, the Pasadena Police were called to Interhouse because of fighting. When they arrived at Ruddock, they were forced to shut down the band to control the crowd, many of whom were Pasadena high school students with no connection to the Institute.

Dean Brennan emphasized that he was not blaming the student body for the change in atmosphere. The most disturbing aspect of recent Interhouses, he said, has been the number of local high school students who crash the party. Caltech is being increasingly victimized by the surrounding community, in that locals are taking advantage of the low security at large Caltech events.

Pasadena youth are on the lookout for Caltech parties, said Brennan, where they can, with little or no fear of law enforcement, cause trouble, disrupt the environment, and in general make Interhouse miserable for the student body and their guests. He pointed out the frightening fact that "they know when [and where] Interhouse is." During the Halloween party two weeks before, according to one member of the IHC, Techers were stopped off campus by carloads of high school students asking whether Interhouse was that weekend, since there was a party going on on the Caltech campus.

The IHC's attitude was one of general agreement; as one student who attended the meeting commented, "Interhouse sucked; I didn't know anybody there.

Dean Brennan contrasted Interhouse with the Halloween party in Dabney Hall Garden. The difference, he said, was the controlled entrances to the party. There were very few gates left open to the garden, and security guards at the entrances simply asked those who wished to enter what house they were from, a question very few gate-crashers would be able to answer convincingly. "It was a great filter," Brennan commented.

The bottom line, according to the Dean, is the absolute necessity of "a strictly controlled perimeter." The IHC agreed, and also agreed in principle with the intention of putting temporary fences on the Olive Walk, from Fleming to Page and from Ricketts to Ruddock, and closing off or controlling all other access to the student houses for the evening.

This fence, in addition to acting as a filter, would allow Caltech Security to prevent bottles or cans of alcoholic beverages from being brought to the event. (Bottles and cans were outlawed this year at Interhouse; anyone who helped to clean up after the party can attest to how poorly this was enforced.)

Brennan said, "I think we've been very fortunate that there haven't been worse problems. Next year will have to be different."

Derelict Cars Will Vanish

As all of you know, parking at Caltech is difficult to find. The situation has been exacerbated by the fact that some people have been using the parking lots for long-term storage of their vehicles or to keep vehicles which are not currently operational. Also, the parking spaces have often been lost to cars owned by PCC students, surrounding neighbors, and other people not

affiliated with Caltech. To alleviate these problems and to free up more parking for Caltechers, Security has identified 64 vehicles which they believe to be abandoned or non-functional. Some of the characteristics identifying non-functional vehicle are: broken windshields, missing major components, flat tires, or occupancy of the same parking space for long periods. These vehicles have had notices placed on their windshields, identifying them, and stating that they will be towed away to the Pasadena City impound yard if the Security Office does not hear

from the lot within seven days. CHECK YOUR CAR. Security

has attempted to determine the owner by use of the Caltech parking sticker, and by use of the California Department of Motor Vehicles registration systems. However, some license plates have expired, so they are not on the DMV list. Some cars are licensed out of California, so the DMV list cannot be used, and some cars do not have Caltech stickers. If your car falls into any of these categories, Security cannot contact you, and your car will be towed. A list of the vehicles currently identified for removal is reprinted below, with as much information as possible. If you recognize your vehicle, you need to contact Security at extension 4701, before November 28, 1988. Otherwise, it will be impounded at the City of Pasadena impound yard, and it will then cost \$53.50 plus \$10.00 per

day to retrieve it. continued on page 3

To the Editors:

There is a general misunderstanding of the difference between editing and censoring. Since the difference between the two lies primarily on subjective criteria, it is often difficult to distinguish between them.

Still, censorship is often clearly charged unjustly in many instances. When an editor refuses to print parts of an article, or rejects an article, writers tend to cry, "Censorship! My First Amendment rights have been violated!" This may not be true, as has been borne out in the past.

For example, several years ago, The Miami Herald refused to publish a proposed political advertisement. The politician sued the newspaper, arguing that he had a right to have his opinions published.

His suit failed.

The Supreme Court argued that it is the editors' prerogative, an inherent responsibility of their position, to decide what material should appear in their publication. In other words, the editors, in their decision not to publish the material, were editing, not censoring.

This applies no less to The California Tech. The editors are not guilty of censorship unless they prevent publication of material by any recourse. If one's editorial views differ from those of the editors, there are suitable avenues to

take. But simply to accuse them of censoring is not only useless, but wrong

To the Editors:

I am writing this as a letter to the editors rather than an editorial for two reasons: first, I wish to take full responsibility for its content, and second, the layout of page two was impossible otherwise.

After a several-week hiatus, in which many students dared to hope that the problem had finally been solved, the south house fire alarms blew again Sunday and Wednesday evenings from unknown causes, disrupting students' midterms and prompting threats and mild cases of vandalism against the alarms.

Sunday's alarm, which rang off and on for forty minutes, caused implements to be placed in the speakers as mutes, students to open and examine the downstairs fire panel, and at least one alarm to be rendered inoperative.

I met with Associate MOSH Marda Collett, who counselled patience. She says she understands the impatience and anger of the students, but that any acts of vandal-

ism against the alarm system by the student body, in addition to being criminal acts, will be pointed to by the personnel working on the problem as interference by students and be used as an excuse for failure to solve the problem. She emphasized that it is extremely important that there be no detectable damage to or tampering with the alarms or detectors.

I feel that the situation as it stands is intolerable. Alarms which wake us up in the middle of the night or which ruin our concentration as we work are worse than useless; they are violating our privacy and interfering with the essential reason we attend this institute, i.e. they remove our ability to study. [Besides, we want to die in flames. -eds] I agree that no damage or tampering with the alarms should be evident. I suggest that members of the community use their imagination in a nondestructive manner.



small, but he does have several lines in three different scenes, including scenes with Newman and Schultz. In addition to coaching the other actors on physics, Politzer is responsible for filling most of the blackboards which appear in the movie with equations. Politzer is quick to point out that the movie is still in production and that some scenes may be cut from the final version.

In addition to Politzer, Newman, and Schultz, the cast of the film includes John Cusack (L.A. Law), John McGinley (Platoon, Wall Street), Bonnie Bedelia, Natascha Richardson, and Laura Dern (Blue Velvet). Tony Garnett is the producer. Technical advisers include Richard Rhodes, author and expert on the Manhattan Project, and Spencer Wert, historian for the American Institute of Physicists.

With a mile to go, she needed to pass three runners to qualify. In the next half mile, she passed two of them. However, she could not keep it up and slipped to 15th. Her time was 19:55, 48 seconds slower than two weeks ago on the same

Five runners whom Jerri had consistently beaten qualified for na-

Margi Pollack and Bibi Jentoft-Nilsen both finished strongly, passing six runners in the last half mile. Margi finished 39th in 21:45. Bibi finished her college cross-country career one spot back with a best ever time of 21:48

Golda Bernstein finished an excellent season by finishing 51st in

22:35. Liz Warner was 57th in 23:32. Freshman Emmeline Naranjo, who improved steadily over the season finished 60th in 23:54. Freshman Mary Rowe finished 62nd in 24:07

The women's squad improved tremendously from last year. They improved by three places in the regional meet from 11th last year to eighth. Their record in dual meets was 7-8.

The reason for the improvement was the addition to the top seven of three freshman: Jerri Martin, Emmeline Naranjo, and Mary Rowe. Jerri finished first overall in four meets. The men had a succesful season considering it was supposed to be a rebuilding year. The team lost its top four runners from last year, yet finished 6-10 in dual meets, and fifth out of seven in the conference. The team did this well because of a strong freshman class. Next year should be even better with five of the top six runner returning.
