Before coming to Caltech, Paul most recently directed a program to help disadvantaged high school students to get better educational opportunities. Before that, Paul has been a teacher, a campus minister for Inter-Christian Varsity Fellowship, an academic advisor (ask him how to get into grad school), an advisor for international students, and a community outreach coordinator for all sorts of community and social service projects in northwest Pasadena. He has a bachelor's degree in biology from Harvard, and a Master of Divinity degree from Fuller Theological Seminary here in Pasadena.

We asked Paul why he wanted to work for the Caltech Y, and what he saw as the Y's role on campus. His response: "I feel college students, particularly at Caltech, where the academic training is of such high quality academically and technically, that other needs the students have in terms of social concerns, opportunity for expressing themselves with the opposite sex, personal development, cultural issues, political issues, moral concerns" tend to be overlooked. Paul sees the role of the Y to "bring in quality offerings of programs and activities to stimulate a rounding out of the intensely scientific, technical background at Caltech.'

within 20 units of graduation and have the time for the job. For the last several years the California Tech has been neglected to allow the editors to pass their classes. It is time to bring an end to this.

Those of you who have not been here as long as we have may wonder what we are talking about. Let us tell you a story. Once there was a newspaper called the California Tech, the finest newspaper in God's universe. It addressed serious issues, caused controversy, and angered Murphberger's (the previous president, for you frosh) wife. It addressed both sides of the issues, had serious analyses of what was going on at Tech, and was chock full of real, honest-togoodness, home-cooked articles. It was useful, informative, and fun to read.

Then something happened. The paper changed hands and got, well, different. Articles were replaced with silly drawings of pigs. An issue was printed that was laid out with a Cuisinart. Months worth of Bloom County were printed ahead of schedule and almost got us sued out of existence. Intelligent staff members left. Finally, the Humanities faculty put their foot down and a new standard became established for the Tech. Articles became xeroxes of OPE releases with Honor System changed to Honour System and Winnett Center changed to Winnett Centre. The bulletin board on the back page became the bulk of the newpaper. The Rivet was cancelled as irrelevant. Issues died along with all other controversy.

The Tech cannot be the lapdog of the administration, faculty, alumni, or parents. This is a student-run, student-financed, student-owned paper, and it should cater first and foremost to the members of ASCIT. This has not been the case for many years. Issues highly significant to ASCIT members have been ignored or the 'official' position of the administration echoed. This has not been to the benefit of the Caltech student body. The Beckman Institute was cheered on as the greatest thing since sliced bread. No one asked why 14 off-campus studentoccupied houses were torn down, half of them for a parking lot across the street from a half-empty park-

ing garage. Open discussion of matters such as these is absolutely vital to the Caltech Community. We intend to return the Tech to its former place and air these issues in an open forum.

Some of the issues we plan to cover in depth are: the student housing crunch, the Campus Master Development Plan, and their impact on the Pasadena community; student suicides, counseling programs, and the special problems found at Caltech; graduate/undergradate relations, with an emphasis on broadening graduate student involvement in the Tech; and the search for a new MOSH. We intend to broaden CIT/PCC media exchanges and get more involvement between the two campuses. In short, we want to cover the issues, open communications channels, and hopefully make Caltech a bit less insular.

We don't want to define our candidacy merely by negating the policies of the past. Unfortunately, we're left with synthesizing a position of our own, one which promises great things and refers frequently to the national-awardwinning editorial experience we have which we think is real cool. Fuck it. It'd be fiction. We know something about writing, editing, and publishing newspapers. What we don't know we'll learn.

We give you the three ostensible purposes of newspapering (we neglect making money): to inform the mass, to interpret the media, and to entertain the message. No need to talk about the mechanisms ofjournalism that bring us the stuff of days in condensed, effective, moving prose designed to capture continued on page 6

Some of the readers may recall that I ran (and loss) against Gabriella last year for BOC Chairperson under a platform of honor code reform. Immediately after seeing the headlines about the BOC in last week's Tech, I spent some time studying the proposed bylaws. While much of the new sections is a statement of the tradtional unwritten responsibilities and procedures of the Board, I detect an honest effort to better define the Board's purpose and to provide some consolation to those under investigation. Persons facing a Board -

investigation should have some idea of their rights and the procedures under which the Board will operate, information which the old by-laws do not provide.

While there are some items in my mind which require clarification (such as how the BOC and the GRB might collaborate - they work a little differently and it would be bad for procedural differences to create serious disadvantages for either group), I would urge for everyone to approve the bulk of the proposal. It is definitely a step in the right direction.

Opera: Offenbach at the Music Center

The world premiere of a new production of Jacques Offenbach's The Tales of Hoffmann opened the 1988-89 season of the Los Angeles Music Center Opera in the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion last Friday.

Offenbach died in 1880 while preparing the opera-it was completed by others for its premiere a few months later. Recently, more than 350 previously unknown manuscript pages by Offenbach for the opera were discovered, as well as the libretto by Jules Barbier that was submitted for "authorization" shortly before the 1881 premiere. Michael Kaye, formerly director of the Offenbach Publication Project for Belwin-Mills, used this newly recovered material and the extant Hoffmann manuscripts to produce this new and longer version of the opera.

This "critical" edition was presented in five acts with two intermissions. The part of Hoffmann was performed by world-renowned tenor Placido Domingo, who is a consultant to the opera company and has performed here in its first two seasons. His four loves were sung by Julia Migenes, who is well known for her role of Carmen opposite Domingo in the Francesco Rosi film.

The story is based on a play by Barbier and Michel Carré, which in turn was founded on the fantasy stories of E. T. A. Hoffmann. Three stories have been united by a frame story starring Hoffmann himself. He is a poet frustrated by love at every turn, and he tells eager listeners in a tavern stories about three loves that ended tragically.

The first story concerns a lifelike doll named Ólympia. As done in this production, this act was the funniest I have seen. The doll's mechanical behavior is taken to an extreme that is practically slapstick in nature. Purists may object, but I found it enjoyable. Her dancing is so bizarre as to knock the wind out of Hoffmann. The scene ends with very good use of a midget actor.

The second story is one that has been presented last in previous productions. It is about Antonia, a frail girl who has been forbidden to sing. Her mother died when singing weakened her, and her father fears that Antonia may suffer a similar fate.

The third story about the courtesan Giulietta is the one that has been changed the most. For one thing, there is new material that stretched the scene out. The ending is also quite different and more tragic than the one that we are used to hearing.

This opera and the performance started the season off on a good note with only a few weaknesses. While supertitles are a wonderful addition to an operatic performance, one could have wished for a little more accuracy. Someone needed to do a little more editing for proper spelling ("alright"). One could also have wished for better timing. It is a little jarring to have the supertitle come a minute before it should in the scene. Also, in one place, I noticed a definite mistake in the translation from the French. As always with such things, not everything was translated, particularly in the spoken dialogue.

The performers were excellent with Domingo and Migenes putting forth superlative efforts. Stephanie Vlahos, who played the Muse and Nicklausse, and Rodney Gilfry, who played the four dastardly roles of Lindorf, Coppélius, Dr. Miracle, and Dapertutto, were also very good. I only wish the orchestra had not so frequently drowned them out.

The sets were also excellent. Intriguing use was made of lighting to produce strange reflections and other effects. In this way, one set could often be used for more than one scene with little actually physical change.

The remaining performances of The Tales of Hoffmann are Sunday, October 16, and Tuesday, October 18, at 8 p.m. both evenings.

entertainment -**Breathless Reading**

by Bradley Scott Breathing Lessons, like other Anne Tyler novels, is about people trying to live in contemporary America. It concerns itself mostly with a pair of couples-Maggie and Ira, and Jesse and Fiona. Through a series of brilliant flashbacks, Tyler shows the reader how these two marriages developed and deteriorated. The action of the novel takes place during one hectic day when a bizarre set of circumstances bring Maggie and Ira to the home of their son's ex-wife Fiona, and Maggie makes a misguided attempt to force Jesse and Fiona to reconcile.

Breathing Lessons sparkles with wonderfully comic scenes and sharply drawn characters. Although the book's main subject is marriage and the strains that must be dealt with in a marital relationship, it also deals beautifully with the relationship between parents and children. Maggie is the well-meaning but over-concerned parent that never quite knows when to let her children lead their own lives. She thinks that she is helping Jesse and Fiona, but her interference leads to disaster because she always distorts the truth so that it matches what she wants to believe rather than what she knows is true. What makes the novel so enjoyable is Anne Tyler's wit and insight. I found passages such as the following delightful:

"Music is so different now," she had said to Jesse once. "It used to be Love Me Forever and now it's Help Me Make It Through the Night.'

"Aw, Ma," he had said, "don't you get it? In the old days they just hid it better. It was always Help Me Make It Through the Night.

Altogether, Breathing Lessons is a very entertaining novel for anyone who enjoys literature which looks at the serious side of life with a little bit of humor. It is currently available in hardback only and can be found at most major bookstores. Her previous novel, The Accidental Tourist, is also excellent and can be found in paperback at most major bookstores, and maybe even our own.

Amend "Section 5. Approval. All decisions of the Executive Committee must be approved by the Board of Directors." Amend Article VIII - Elections and **Procedures:**

Add to Section 1, paragraph 3 "The Secretary shall publish an announcement in the issue of the California Tech immediately preceding the opening of these nominations.³

Amend Section 10, the first sentence to read "All officers shall be installed at the second Board of Directors meeting following the election of the non-Treasurer/President officers (except as provided elsewhere)"

Append "(e) *The Totem.* The Editor will receive a salary of one hundred dollars (\$100) with a maximum bonus of one hundred dollars (\$100). A group of people can share this position."

Append "(f) The Undergraduate Research Opportunities Handbook. The Editor will receive a salary of one hundred dollars (\$100).

Amend Article IV, Section 7; Article XII, Section 1; and Article XIV, Sections 1, 8(d), 9, and 11 to replace "Teaching Quality Feedback Report" with "Course Listings of Undergraduate Education" (ie. TQFR # CLUE)

Append Article XVI:

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Proposed BOC By-law Changes on Today's Ballot

Sec. 3. RULES OF PROCEDURE.

a. When a suspected violation of the Honor System is reported to the Board, the Chairman and Secretary will conduct a preliminary investigation to examine all relevant facts. They may require any persons involved to discuss their knowledge of any information concerning the case. The Chairman and Secretary will determine whether or not the case will be brought to a hearing of the full Board.

b. When a case is brought to a hearing of the full Board, the Board will make three decisions:

1. Whether or not an honor system violation has been committed.

2. How to nullify the advantage that has been taken.

3. How to protect the Caltech community

c. All persons appearing before the Board at a hearing or a preliminary investigation will be informed of the reasons for their presence.

d. Persons who feel that they have been unfairly treated by any members of the Board or that their personal rights have been violated may make appeals to the Dean of Students.

e. The Chairman and Secretary of the Board shall not have a vote on the Board.

f. Seven (7) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

g. In case of absence or disability of the Chairman, the Board shall select a temporary chairman from among their number who, while acting as Chairman, shall not have a vote. In the case of absence of the Secretary, the Chairman will appoint a temporary Secretary, who shall not have a vote, from among those who are present or past Board members (see section 3.j).

h. If a Board member feels unable to render an unbiased judgement in a particular case, that member should disqualify himself. Furthermore, no member of the Board shall sit in judgement of his own case

i. If a defendant feels that particular Board members are unable to render an unbiased judgement, a request may be made to the Chairman or the Dean that those Board members not sit on the case.

j. If made necessary by sections 3.g, 3.h or 3.i, in order to maintain a full quorum of the Board, the Board shall reserve the right to ask any past members of the Board of Control to serve on a case, contingent on a three-fourths [3/4] vote of the remaining voting Board members. All those serving on a case are bound to secrecy as stated in section 3.r.

k. Any person asked to attend a preliminary investigation may be accompanied by any Board member of his choice.

I. A defendant attending a hearing of the full Board may be accompanied by any one member of the Caltech community of his own choosing. This person may not witness any part of the actual hearing, will be bound by secrecy as set forth in section 3.r for all witnesses, and must not interfere with the normal proceedings of the Board.

m. A three-fourths (3/4) vote of those members of the BOC present shall be necessary for a decision of the Board.

n. No decision of a previous Board shall be revoked unless the Board is convinced that new evidence or changed conditions change the status of the original case or upon recommendation of the Deans.

o. Minutes of all proceedings of the Board shall be kept by the Secretary in a minute book of the Board of Control. This book shall be kept under lock and key by the Dean of Students. The Chairman or the Secretary shall have the sole power to get the minute book from the Dean and shall do so only on official business of the Board.

p. Records of the proceedings shall include the names of all persons concerned, the decisions reached by the Board with corresponding vote tallies, a description of any previous convictions, as well as the names of the members of the Board present.

q. The Board of Control has the right to collaborate with the Graduate Review Board.

r. All those appearing before the Board, and the Board itself, are expected to maintain absolute secrecy regarding case meetings of the BOC. Divulgence of any of the proceedings shall be considered a violation of the Honor System. Should the defendant wish to discuss the issues involved in his case with others, after his case has been completed, he may do so at any time, provided no portion of the case that concerns other defendants is made public without the permission of those persons. However, once the defendant initiates discussion, witnesses in the case are no longer bound to secrecy. If, in a particular case, the Board shall deem it wise to make known the proceedings of the Board, the Chairman shall be empowered to, upon resolution of the Board, to convey such information without disclosing the names or identities of any persons involved.

s. Oath. The oath taken by all persons appearing before the Board of Control shall be: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.'

Caltech's cross-country teams traveled to Redlands last week for a rematch against conference teams Claremont and Redlands. Temperatures in the nineties, a Santa Ana Condition, and a hilly dusty course through a valley made this race the toughest of the year. Despite the conditions, both the men's and women's teams continued to improve relative to the competition.

The women's team avenged a previous loss to Redlands, but couldn't defeat Claremont. Freshman Jerri Martin again led the Beavers and beat all competitors. Martin has won every collegiate dual meet she has run. In the last three races, she has beaten every runners from ten teams. Her time on the 3.1 mile course was 20:55

Margi Pollack was the next Caltech runner, finishing 11th in a time of 24:36. Bibi Jentoft-Nilsen was next in 12th place in 24:51.

Golda Bernstein was running with Bibi until the heat and hills got to her. She was forced to drop out of the race less than one hundred yards from the finish.

Finishing fourth for Caltech was freshman Emmeline Naranjo. She placed 14th overall in a time of 25:56. Rounding out the top seven were Liz Warner (27:50), Mary Rowe (28:09), and Christina Garden (28:15).
