Check Out the Frosh Class of '95

You've seen them around – those unfamiliar faces, those naive looks, those random question generators; these are the people who make our clueless frosh look like seasoned insiders...They're our pre-frosh, and this is the time of the year when we get to check out 245 prospective Techers (including 112 women), while they try deciding whether the Institute is the right place for them or not.

These pre-frosh make up less than half of the 530 high-schoolers admitted this year. We won't know the exact make-up of the incoming frosh class until May 1st, but here are a few promising numbers.

We've admitted 184 women (35%), eleven percent of unerrepresented minorities, and many more twins (well okay, four sets – rotation is going to be oh so fun!) The freshman geographical distribution hasn't changed much (i.e. 29% from California, 24% from the South, and others from all over the nation) although the number of admitted foreign students has been kept down. As any self-respecting freshman class, they are at the top of the graduating class in terms of grades, SAT scores and their interest in science. The admissions office figures that about 40% of them will become part of Caltech's Class of 1995.

Meanwhile, we'll have to deal with those pre-frosh for forty-eight more hours (not that this will be much of a burden – pre-frosh weekend is one of the high points of the year, after all). But remember to be nice to them – some will probably end up in your house...

Grad-Undergrad Interaction Lacking

To the editors:

During three years at Caltech, I have been surprised at the lack of contact between grads and undergrads. I think the two things that make Caltech unique are the scientific excellence and the sense of community and tradition.

Some undergrads, while enjoying the latter, feel cut off from the former (grads get the time and energy of profs, benefit from the grant money, etc.) Meanwhile grad students feel cut off from the sense of community and tradition (we watch Ditch Day and ME 72 from afar, if at all).

While many grad students are just here to weiner away in the lab without distractions, I think many others would participate in the Caltech community (what we now call undergrad life) if they just felt welcome. If such participation were happening, the benefits to the grad students are obvious, but I also think the undergrads would benefit from the increased diversity the grad students would bring (half the grad students are internationals; most went to universities where they interacted with liberal arts, and interacted with the opposite sex in the absence of The Ratio; some have had jobs or marriage or children.

I have talked to many grads and undergrads on the topic over the last year and it seems many of us would like to see the situation changed. In the long run, there may be some structural changes to make interaction easier. Some people are considering a student center, or incorporating student center functionality into the proposed new on-campus house (the C-house), where undergrads, grads and faculty would be drawn

together for informal and natural interaction.

Others are kicking around the idea of creating a mechanism whereby interested grad students could associate themselves with one of the undergrad houses (possibly through a process not too different from rotation).

However, I believe those of us who want to see more interaction are numerous enough to improve the situation immediately without waiting for long-term structural change. Here are some things we can do.

Join organizations that attract equal numbers of grads and undergrads, such as Caltech Christian Fellowship, S.P.E.C.T.R.E., or SEDS.

Make an effort to invite the people you know from the other camp to your parties in the houses or in Catalina.

Become part of the Grad-Undergrad Social Team (gug-st), a new project of the Caltech Y, to plan and publicize events specifically designed to mix grads and undergrads. If you are interested, contact me by email (nolty@gap) or phone, x6695.

Become part of the gug email list, a mailing list for people who are willing to invite and be invited to social events such as ball games, beach trips or potluck suppers. To be added to the list, send a request to gug-request@gap.
