

To avoid confusion, accompanying freshman on excursions to places beyond Old Pasadena is also prohibited.

Change 2

Freshman are not to seek information about picks. Procedures should be treated with the same secrecy as a closed book exam.

U.S.: At last, mining our own business

Many American troops recently breathed a huge sigh of relief as President Clinton made the intelligent decision not to sign the Land Mine Treaty. For those of you who have not read this section in the past, I am not President Clinton's most ardent fan. However, by not giving in to international pressure or to the pain he must have felt due to Diana's death, he has done the people of Korea, our men in uniform, and possibly innocent civilians everywhere a great service.

In general, land mines are not for the greater good. Thousands have been killed and maimed in places such as Uganda due to land mines, especially anti-personnel mines. And yes, the world would be a better place if land mines were not sold in the middle of civil wars and insurrections. However, this is not the case on the heavily armed, highly tense Korean peninsula.

The Korean peninsula was the main reason that Clinton held out against the Land Mine Treaty. For better or for worse, land mines are an instrumental part of our defense in Korea. Due to the fact that North Korea has one of the largest armies (in terms of manpower), the sad truth is without anti-tank and anti-personnel mines the North Korean Army could easily invade Seoul before America could react, and possibly take

the entire peninsula. This would turn there taking of South Korea into a very bloody business as North Korea digs in, hoping America's will breaks before their defensive lines do.

Land mines are instrumental in stopping the North from overwhelming the South in an invasion. We need anti-tank mines in order to stop the basic unit of North Korean land power, their Russian tank platoons. And, unfortunately, to keep the North Koreans from simply sweeping up these mines, we need the anti-personnel lines that the diplomats in Europe have decided are illegal and morally unacceptable. The mines we have in Korea, far from being a danger to the people of South Korea, have kept them safe for the last forty years from an invasion from the North, a nation with which are still technically at war.

Some might point out that with no war there at this time, the land mines are not necessary, and that by ridding ourselves of them we are setting a good moral precedent for the world. This is wrong on three counts: First, wars are avoided by the projection and presence of force, preferably overwhelming force. As long as we have a force in South Korea that the North knows they can not defeat, we can be practically certain that the North will not attack.

Furthermore, were we to submit to a lessening of our defenses, this would be sending exactly the wrong signal to North Korea, a nation not known for rational actions or, at the moment, internal stability. Before the Korean War, the U.S. accidentally sent the wrong signal to North Korea by forgetting to mention it on a verbal list of America's vital interests in the Pacific. Standing down in Korea would be a much more flagrant signal to North Korea.

Finally, viewing this as a moral precedent is a little bit

(India, Russia, and China being some of them), the treaty has very little authority on countries who produce or use land mines. The treaty does not involve the countries who actively use land mines; it is more a feel-good effort to stem the guilt from seeing the countless pictures of maimed children and a need to memorialize Princess Diana's death (which probably should be used to remind us of the need for seat belts, as the only person who survived the crash was wearing his). For the sake of our soldiers

and the South Korean people, we should thank President Clinton for once taking a firm stand in the defense of freedom



The Outside World

KUALA LUMPUR, MALAYSIA -

Smoke from forest fires in Indonesia, Sumatra and Borneo is blanketing Southeast Asia with a thick unbreathable haze. Shipping has been disrupted, schools have closed, and many are suffering health problems due to the smoke. The fires are due to illegal slash and burn land clearing by hundreds of Indonesian and Malaysian companies.

JERUSALEM, ISRAEL -

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu promised construction of 300 new homes for settlers in the West Bank. Just two weeks ago however, Madeleine Albright met with leaders in Israel urging them to hold off on further construction and other measures which anger Palestinians.

ALGIERS, ALGERIA -

Tuesday at least 85 people were killed and 67 wounded in another unexplained attack on the outskirts of Algiers. This is the second worst masby Myfanwy Callahan

sacre since the beginning of the six year long, undeclared civil war. Madani Mezerag, the commander of the Army of Islamic Salvation declared

a cease fire the following day and ordered his guerrila forces to "stop combat operations from Oct 1,1997."

death, possibly by beheading, has created the most serious diplomatic crisis between Saudi Arabia and Britain in years. The two were accused of collaborating to murder a fellow nurse from Australia. The British are questioning not only the sentencing, but the entire

procedure of the courts and the validity of the verdict itself.

BELFAST, NORTHERN IRELAND -For the first tme since Ireland was divided 75 years ago, Protestant political leaders sat down to negotiations which include Sinn Fein, the political wing of the largely Roman Catho-

lic Irish Republican Army. David Trimble head of the Ulster Unionist Party demanded expulsion of Sinn Fein from the peace talks to determine the future of Northern Ireland, but British and Irish Governments rejected the demand.

BELGRADE, SERBIA -

For the first time in ten years, the Socialist Party will have to share power with the ultranationalist Radical Party. Elections on Sunday gave approximately equal numbers of parliamentary seats to each party, which means that the Socialist Party will have to form a coalition with the Radical Party or the more moderate Renewal Movement, which led protests against President Slobodan Milosevic last winter.

Moscow, Russia —

President Boris Yeltsin announced that the Government would take a stronger role to insure competition in Russia's continuing economic development. He stated that powerful business interests have jeopardized the development of free-market competition, causing a yawning gap between the rich and poor.

sociate (R.A.) of the House in which they are residing by 3:00 p.m. on Saturday of Rotation week. This information will be given to each House president and shall be made available only to the House rotation chairmen. The Houses are not required to follow the rankings submitted by each student, except that no House may choose a student that did not rank it. Students living off-campus or in the Annex must give their list of Houses to the R.A. of the House which they visit on Saturday of Rotation week. Students will be picked by any one of the Houses if they do not submit a House preference list. On rare occasions, in order to insure that all on-campus rooms are filled, it may be necessary to select students who will be removed from the rotation pick and assigned housing. New students who state to the Director of Residence Life that they do not wish to participate in Rotation will not be selected by any House, but are still given Institute housing.

5. By 5:00 p.m. on Saturday of Rotation week, the IHC Chairman and the seven House presidents will have a list of the House preferences of each new student. They will make themselves available at this time to correct any mistakes in the list. It is the responsibility of the student to verify that the list contains his or her actual choices. A student who is listed as a no-show may try to straighten out the situation with the IHC chairman, who will have a list of each Houses' no-shows. At 7:00 p.m. the IHC will meet to verify changes, and all choices will be considered accurate when the meeting adjourns. New students may only check to see that their choices have been accurately recorded, and no other students (other than members of the IHC) will be given access to the list until after 7:00 p.m.

6. Selection of new students will take place at a closed meeting of the Director of Residence Life, the Master of Student Houses, the Interhouse Committee Chairman and Secretary, the seven House Presidents, and four Rotation chairmen from each House. The R.A.s may attend the meeting as guests of the Director of Residence Life. This meeting will occur on the Sunday immediately following Rotation week. [Pick procedure omitted at IHC's request.]

III. Regulations

1. Rotation rules are in effect for any contact with new students from their initial acceptance to Caltech (including before they matriculate) until their submitted ranking lists are considered accurate (as stipulated at 7:00 p.m. on Saturday of Rotation week).

2. Throughout these rules, the term House refers to both the organization as a whole and any of its members.

3. New students are specifically prohibited from unfairly biasing other new students toward or against a House.

4. Houses are specifically authorized to do the following during rotation:

a. have receptions after dinner

b. serve refreshments at these receptions

 c. prohibit those who are not current House members from attending these receptions

 d. have open presentations anywhere on campus

 e. publish and distribute informational literature which is inexpensively reproduced f. accompany new students to any place open to the public, if no extraordinary services are provided.

Note: Driving freshman beyond walking distance is determined to be extradinary and is prohibited. Walking distance is determined by IHC to be anywhere less than the distance from Campus to the far border of Old Pasadena. To avoid confussion, accompanying freshman on excursions to places beyond Old Pasadena is also prohibited.

5. Houses are specifically prohibited from doing the following during rotation:

a. making a trophy or alley challenge
 b. publishing a social calendar or relating in any fashion future social events

 c. organizing and sponsoring a social event

d.attending a reception of a House of which you are not a member without the permission of that Houses president

 e. discussing with new students anything at all to do with picking strategies, future new student picks, or past new student picks

Freshman are not to seek information about picks. Procedures should be treated with the same secrecy as a closed book exam.

 f. spending money on a new student or providing extraordinary goods or services on credit or for no charge

g.providing alcohol or other controlled substances to a new student

h.getting a new student a date
(Note: dating a new student is not
a violation, but setting a new student up with another person is a

violation.)

i. otherwise unfairly biasing a new student toward or against a House. (Note: there is no gag rule. Individuals are not prohibited from speaking about a House of which they are not a member. However, individuals are advised to take care in what they say, as they may be misinformed.)

6. Aside from the specifically authorized activities, Houses may do anything approved by the IHC in advance of the act

7. Information pertaining to the ranking of each student and to the order of the picks may not be made public. All such information in written or electronic form must be destroyed immediately following picks.

IV. Penalties

1. An action which any student thinks is a violation of the Rotation rules must be reported to the Director of Residence Life, the IHC Chairman, an IHC-appointed Rotation Supervisor, or to any of the House Presidents.

2. Alleged violations will be tried by the IHC; a four out of seven vote is sufficient for conviction.

3. Any House or individual who is found to have violated these rules will be penalized by any one of the following:


a. loss of draft choices

b. loss of privilege to live on campus. c. probation

d.loss of right to House ranking (i.e., new student will be considered to have chosen all seven Houses equally)

e.any other punishment handed down by the IHC

4. Due to time constraints, no House will lose draft choices after 12:01 a.m. of the day of picks. Other penalties may still apply.


incoming students and their elders.

Conspirators of Pleasure

With Conspirators of Pleasure, Czech master surrealist Jan Svankmajer has created both his most accessible and his most artistically successful feature film to date. Conspirators follows six Prague residents as they follow bizarre, elaborate schemes of fantasy and self-gratification. Without giving too much away, it will suffice to say that turkeys, rolling pins, umbrellas, fish, dummies, and a bowl full of balls of mashed-up bread are all involved. Svankmajer began his career as a puppeteer and animator before moving to live-

action films, and his characters often act more like extremely life-like puppets than fleshand-blood humans. The interesting thing is that, in the tradition of Franz Kafka and Robert Walser, the mechanical lifelessness of life is very much the point. Conspirators of Pleasure is playing for one week only at Landmark's Port theatre in Corona Del Mar, which recently switched to a Nuart-like schedule of innovative programming.

A deliciously perverse short film of Little Red Riding Hood starring Christina Ricci and narrated by Quentin Crisp opens the show.




