

Quiz Bowl Scores in National Championship

Despite its much derided athletic record, Caltech does not get brutally crushed in all contests of skill and prowess. In fact, sometimes they get to do some of the brutal crushing. On April 3-5, the National Quiz Bowl Tournament was held at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee. Graduate students Richard Mason, Chris Nolte and Maribeth Swiatek, and freshman Michael Schein placed twelfth out of 46 Division I teams.

Over the course of the weekend, sixteen rounds were played. Caltech defeated some of the better teams, including

groups from the University of Pennsylvania, Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech. Overall, they finished with a

10-6 record for the tournament. Stanford ended up in first place on top of a strong west coast showing with Brigham Young University and Berkeley following at 4th and

8th.

Out of 800 questions in the tournament, apparently there was a rash of chlamydia - controversy, that is. Anecdotally, one participant was quoted as saying "I've got it! I've got it!", and there was a large debate via email prior to the competition as to the exact nature of the bacterium. Furthermore, "chlamydia cost us a game," as one team member put it. Caltech lost to Arkansas in overtime due to confusion over the organism's life cycle.

Overall the team was pleased with its performance. Initially, they were ranked 20th, so finished better than expected. In the very last round, they defeated Maryland, whom they had lost to several time in the tournament. Also, they noted that




This year the traditional activities of International Day have been extended to an entire week. The program, called International Week, is co-sponsored by the Caltech Y and the Office for International Programs. Interna-

The Outside World

Washington, D.C. - The Department of Defense, State and Justice are to devise a plan to arrest and try Pol Pot, the Khmer Rouge leader held responsible for the deaths of up to millions of Cambodians. The Thai Government offered to take Pol Pot into custody if the United States would immediately take charge of him and remove him.

JERUSALEM, ISRAEL - The Palestinian group Hamas called on Arabs and Muslims worldwide to attack Jewish targets in revenge for the death of its chief bomb maker last month. Hamas has blamed Israel for the death although the Palestinian Authority found it was the result of conflict within the organization.

BELFAST, NORTHERN IRELAND - The British and Irish Prime Ministers met yesterday to work out disputed issues for a midnight deadline on the peace agreement. Leaders hope to renegotiate the peace proposals rejected Tuesday for a mutually acceptable agreement.

FREETOWN, SIERRA LEONE - Thousands of refugees are fleeing rebel attacks in Sierra Leone and walking to Guinea. Over the 35 mile journey hundreds have died. Already 50,000 Sierra Leoneans are housed in refugee camps in Guinea.

PORT KLANG, MALAYSIA - Hundreds of Indonesians are migrating to surrounding countries to escape the economic troubles of their own country. Malaysia is sending them back in what some call "Operation Get Out", but 300 more arrive every day.

JAKARTA, INDONESIA - The International Monetary Fund came to a new settlement with Indonesia with new conditions for the \$43 billion worth in aid. The new agreement allows subsidies of food and fuel to continue because of the threat of an anti-government riot should they stop.

Minutes of the ASCIT BoD Meeting, 1 April 1998

Present: BoD (minus Devi), Michael Shein, Brandon Vandebrake, Audry Lee, Stephen Shepherd

Meeting called to order at 22:04.

Dealing With Guests Quiz Bowl - Brandon and Michael are here to make the pitch for the quiz bowl club, as none of them will be able to make it to the budget meeting on Saturday. They are also requesting special funding to send a team to the NAQT National Championship. They are ranked 17 out of 64. Both the Deans and the GSC are pitching in cash for this effort. They are looking for \$400 from ASCIT.

Athletics - Audry has been busy ordering athletic letters and pins. She has run up \$1500 in expenses already, and jackets haven't even been ordered. We are looking at another \$1,200 or so if we subsidize jackets by a half. There is \$600 left in the athletic manager account with Caltech. This is apparently a holdover from last fiscal year. There is discussion over whether ASCIT should be funding these awards. In the current system, the BoD approves distribution of all letters. Jacket subsidies are also traditional. It is decided that this issue will be resolved over drinks at the budget meeting.

Totem - Stephen is checking on the Totem's finances. There is \$800 in the account. This is apparently the allocation from the last fiscal year. Everything seems to be in order. In other Totem business, Stephen is already talking to next year's editor. There are submissions coming in and he will be accepting more until the end of the month. Stephen is also considering publishing the best of the submissions available from last year. Stephen raises the idea of charging a nominal fee for the Totem (\$1) to help defray printing costs and get an idea of the interest in the publication.

General Business Business Committee - Rob proposes a resolution that will allow the treasurer to call together a committee of all officers who handle ASCIT business on the behalf of the Corporation. The resolution passes 5-0-1 (Mike abstains because he is distracted by his shoe).

Phones - To save money, it is decided to discontinue the ASCIT phone extensions. This means that the phone sex service will also be going offline. 

IHC MINUTES 04/02 NEW IHC MEETING ROOM: SAC 33 PRESENT: ALL+BALDEEP+STEVE MICHAEL (JUST ATE SOME PRETZELS), Laucius couldn't find the new room.

Discussed prefrosh rules (in effect until they accept Caltech, 4/30 then rotation rules in effect). Decided (1) That stating an opinion about any house is OK so long as statement is clearly framed as a personal opinion and (2) That any communication about strategies of ranking houses, future or past picks, or active recruitment for a house is a violation. These are guidelines for Pre-Frosh Weekend. We should be trying to help the Pre-Frosh evaluate Caltech as a whole. It should not be viewed as a chance to recruit new members for a house. (For a more complete guideline, refer to your little t, page 286-287)

All of the prefrosh weekend house events were approved: Ultimate frisbee (Bl); Tie-dye party (Da); Casino night (Fl); Capture the flag (LI); Magician, Slam-dunk contest (Pa); Largescreen video games (Ri); Minigolf (Ru). Will have a meeting with Admissions at Avery this tuesday (4/7) regarding house conduct during prefrosh weekend

Faculty-Student committee nominations are posted on the door of SAC 33 and will be taken down Wednesday April 15 at midnight. Interviews will begin Monday April 20. Committee selection will be done Friday May 1. Just for future reference, IHC will try to find out which committees still need student members, and contact head of those committees. To give new student committee members a start on their job, IHC will try to find a a contact faculty member from each committee. The transfer admissions committee member is chosen at a bad time: right when he is expected to participate in selection. Overloads and Overloads

ingly stand in the middle of the flood. Without that excitement it would not be a challenge, it would not be fun, it might not even be worth being a Techer. Or is that so? Can it be argued that the more courses one takes, the more diverse the mix of topics being ingested at one time, the better? More is not always better. Attempting too much prevents one from spending the time needed to really assimilate the material. The more courses one takes at once, the less time one has to spend and the less deep our understanding of any one topic. I have heard many times, from many students that, "well I don't really have to work for the course, it is P/F. My shadow grades last term were not so great, but that does not make any difference, does it? All I needed was to stay out of the F range, out of the lower fringe."

what a course is for. Is it really some silly ritual that has to be dealt with since you are in College or is it a chance to learn about something new or deepen your understanding of particular topics? Is a course really only a means of garnering

units? Is going to school only some-

That brings up the question of

that has to be done in order eventually to get out? A kind of growing up ritual, akin to killing a lion bare handed to prove one's mettle? Then why bother coming to Tech? You could have a much easier time reaping your crop of courses by going to Podunk U. Why bother overloading unless, of course, it is to get out of here faster? Having the chance to concentrate on one topic and giving yourself the time to think deeply about it will be more fruitful than dilettantishly fluttering to too many of the blooms which are opening in Caltech's gardens of the mind. There are times when overloading is the only way out. But hey! Unless truly and absolutely necessary, rein in those ardors and be ready to spend more time on fewer things.

Another topic that has been of concern to me, has been how difficult it is to tread the line between private and public matters. There are so many instances where there are conflicting interests. It does not feel reasonable to refuse to discuss a given student's problem with their concerned parents, but so we must, unless we have specific permission. There are many other instances where the best interests of the opposing parties seem to balance out. We pride ourselves in our Honor Code and well we should. Learning to live with the code turns out

for many students to be one of their great experiences at Tech. Knowing that others will behave likewise empowers one to share and cooperate and develop a sense of openness that one wishes could be had everywhere. It is a wonderful opportunity to learn to live in an environment that is free and accepting and is conducive to immerse oneself into the adventures of the mind, rather than the daily competition as there is outside the Insti-

But there are problems with that. One that I feel acutely is how to deal with the few people who come afoul of the Honor Code. Great pains are taken by the Board of Control to avoid exposure of the people involved. In some instances, however, as part of a Protection Decision, I must ask the student to leave for a period of time, or rescind grades, or whatever and do this without tipping anyone off! Some other times there are conflicting interests such as first amendment rights and the right to privacy. It can be very hard to decide how to do things. The good of the majority has to be weighed against the rights of the individual, the needs of one person against the curiosity of the many. And sometimes there are more than two sides to each story, more than two ways to look at things and it may become impossible to solve a problem to everyone's satisfaction. All the choices may have unpleasant consequences.

To take examples away from Caltech consider national news and all the talk about possible inappropriate behavior by President

Clinton. Do I really care to know about his alleged sexual escapades? Is it important for everyone to be exposed to as yet unproved accusations, especially when they could well be politically motivated? In many ways I would say no, but then I am not so sure.

Consider the revelations in a previous case, that one about Clarence Thomas, who was being considered for appointment to the US Supreme Court and was accused by previous employees of making sexual advances. Whether these accusations were based on true incidents or not, was never resolved. However the fact that accusations were lodged did much to raise our consciousness about the problems of relations between boss and employee. So, true or not, these revelations have led us to appreciate a problem which had not been as emphasized before. Can the subordinate complain or take other action against the Lord and Master without risk of reprisal? Can the Boss make what is thought to be an innocent compliment, without being imagined to be too forward? Can the boss make inappropriate comments and hide them under the guise of humor? What are the rules about interactions between Profs and students, Upperclass students and Frosh etc? Hey you, my head is spinning, take it easy, behave how I would, would you, like that, no problem?

In the words of the Sage: "Be reasonable, do it my way," and a bientot!
