# Hoeg, Waniewski win Business Plan Competition

The number of students for next year's freshman class has been finalized at 260, according to Charlene Liebau, Director of the Admissions Office. The count is a record number in recent years, but is near the maximum size Admissions expects for an entering class.


According to Liebau, "we can reasonably expect [to lose] ten students whose plans may change over the summer." Last year nine students who accepted admission did not enter Caltech in the fall.

Next year's class is more diverse than previous years. Hispanic and Latin American students make up nine percent of the incoming class, an increase from the current five percent in the undergraduate body.

BY TECH STAFF Caltech alumnus and entrepreneur Glenn Hightower announced Hans Hoeg and Tricia Waniewski the winners of the first Caltech Business Plan Competition at the Caltech/MIT Enterprise Forum on May 19. They were awarded both a \$10,000 check as an investment in their company, "EndActive, Inc." and a letter of endorsement from the panel of judges for their business.

The competition, organized by the Industrial Relations Center and sponsored by Hightower, was designed to motivate people with marketable ideas to turn them into viable business plans able to withstand professional scrutiny and attract investor support.

Seven teams submitted executive summaries and business plans which were carefully reviewed by a panel with a wide range of business expertise and experience. The field was then reduced to four teams that made business presentations.

Hoeg and Waniewski, both PhD students in mechanical engineering, plan to build their business around a multi-directional viewing endoscope. This endoscope was developed by Hoeg under the supervision of Professor of Mechanical Engineering Joel Burdick, and in collaboration with Michael Levy, M.D., Division of Neurosurgery at Childrens Hospital Los Angeles.

The rigid, articulated endoscope will greatly enhance surgeons' viewing capabilities and will be useful for a wide range of surgical procedures. "There is nothing out there like this," said Levy. Warren Grundfest, M.D., Laser Research Lab at Cedars Sinai Medical Center Los Angeles, added, "This new optical viewing technology promises to further extend the reach of minimally invasive surgical procedures. This means fewer open surgeries, less trauma to the patients, and overall better performance."

Hoeg and Waniewski plan to use the \$10,000 to attract more investments, and have already solicited four members for their Board of Directors. On behalf of the panel of judges, Hightower said, "This is an impressive achievement... we have every expectation that you will succeed."



# William A. Hewitt, Life Trustee of Caltech, Dies

The Honorable William A. Hewitt, a Caltech life trustee and a former U.S. Ambassador to Jamaica, died Saturday evening of a heart attack at his home in Rutherford, California. He was 83.

The former Chairman of Deere & Company in Moline, Illinois, Hewitt assumed leadership of the company following the death in 1955 of Charles Deere Wiman, the great grandson of John Deere Hewitt. Hewitt retired in 1982, and was appointed to the Jamaican ambassadorship by President Reagan. He served until 1985. earned nine battle stars and four other medals, including the Presidential Unit Citation Medal, and left the service with the rank of lieutenant commander. After the war, he began his career with Deere & Company.

A native of San Fransisco, Hewitt graduated from Berekeley in 1937 with a degree in economics and thereafter attended Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration.

He was an officer in the United States Navy during World War II serving in the Pacific theater. Originally commissioned as an ensign, he June 9, 1967 and became life trustee on October 25, 1991. During his 30 years on the board, he served on the audit committee, the buildings and grounds committee, the visiting committee for the division of Humanities and Social Sciences, and the visiting committee for the Division of Biology. In addition, he was a life member of the Caltech Associates and a member fo the President's Circle in 1986-87.

In addition to his Caltech affiliations, Hewitt was also a member of the visiting committee for East Asian Studies at Harvard University and a member of the Stanford Research Institute Council during the 1970's. His civic affiliations in-

# The Outside World

JAKARTA, INDONESIA — After holding power for 32 years, President Suharto resigned from office Thursday following riots and protests in recent weeks which culminated with calls for his impeachment. Vice President B.J. Habibie has filled the office. Eleven members of Suharto's Cabinet who handled economic policy also resigned in light of the economic crisis facing Indonesia.

BELGRADE, SERBIA --- The Yugoslav Parliament appointed Momir Bulatovic Prime Minister despite Montenegro's protests that it will boycott the Government. Montenegro and Serbia are the last republics in Yugoslavia. The debate revolves around whether Yugoslavia should become a market-driven democratic state, as reformers in Montenegro wish, or follow the recent communist structure.

Moscow, Russia — President Boris Yeltsin faces yet another impeachment vote due to a series of troubles wracking Russia. The market faltered, with prices falling 12% Monday, demanding a half million dollar effort by the Central Bank to steady the ruble. Striking miners in the Kuzbas region have held up rail traffic preventing 300 cargo trains and 120 passenger trains from reaching their destinations.

NAIROBI, KENYA — Eritrea and Ethiopia, former allies eight years ago, have amassed thousands of troops to attack each other. The leader of each country has accused the other of invading a 250-square mile area called the Yigra triangle which the two countries border. The Ethiopean Foreign Minister stated his country would take "necessary measures" unless Eritrea immediately withdraws its troops.

NEW DELHI, INDIA — Prime Minis-

ter Atal Bihari Vajpayee spoke at the site where recent nuclear tests sparked international concern, saying that Pakistan should adopt a more conciliatory tone, considering India's new weap-"We want ons. peaceful co-existence but the frequent threats to security forced India to conduct the nuclear tests to silence its enemies and show its strength," said Vajpayee. The Indian Home Minister also warned Pakistan to ease pressures on India in the disputed territory of Kashmir or face a "pro-active response".

Similarly, African-Americans are three percent of the matriculating class, compared to one percent of the current student body.

International students have also increased to twenty-three (from fourteen) in next year's sophomore class. The incoming Asian population only makes up sixteen percent of the class, compared to the twenty-eight percent of the student body.

Rising acceptances have been seen across the country this year. Each of the Claremont Colleges overfilled; MIT has a more than full class; and even UC Berkeley has a higher than normal acceptance rate than us, at 44.1%.

This year, Admissions accepted fewer U.S. nationals and permanent residents, and more international students. The applicant pool was also bigger; making the process more selective; only eighteen percent of applicants were admitted this year. Last year, twenty-six percent of the applicants were admitted.

Next year, Liebau anticipates a drop in the number of applicants admitted, adjusting to the acceptance rate this year. Admissions will continue its efforts to recruit women and mi-



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

# Commencement Music Change Intolerable

Students have been asked for numerous years their choice for commencement speaker. While in the past the suggestions may have been few and often unfeasible, this year's class has chosen a speaker that many students have strong feelings about, whether they be positive or negative. That alone should demonstrate the vested interest of the class of 1998 in their graduation ceremony.

Now another decision concerning a recent tradition at commencement has been made, but this time without consulting the students it concerns the most: those graduating. Handel's Hallelujah Chorus from The Messiah has been performed for all the years most of the graduates of 1998 have been here: the last six commencements, and thirteen out of the last fourteen. This year, it is being replaced with Gaudeamus Igitur, a song prepared by the Glee Clubs earlier this year for President Baltimore's inauguration. But none of the candidates for the degrees were asked their opinions before this change was made.

The argument was made that this change was due to the religious nature of the Hallelujah Chorus, likening it to a decision to pull the invocation from the ceremony this year. However, some misinformation exists about this decision and its likeness to the musical change. Students were asked, albeit informally via representatives in the undergraduate houses, whether or not

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they would like to keep the invocation. Approximately 10 students voted strongly to remove the prayer, while numerous others remained indifferent. The commencement committee pulled the event. No students were consulted in the decision to change the Hallelujah Chorus.

Further, the invocation is not non-denominational, though the deliverer has a different religious affiliation each year. The problem that students opposed had was two-fold: some are uncomfortable with the nature of the invocation's speaker, while others are uncomfortable with a prayer of any sort. The Hallelujah Chorus is fundamentally different in nature from the

invocation. Most students I have informally asked have no idea of the religious nature of the piece; they simply see it as rejoicing. In addition, the Glee Clubs and the other members of the Caltech community that join the Commencement Chorus have no religious affiliation, unlike the figures that perform the invocation each year.

In trying to make the students' wishes known, the issue of whose decision the choice of music belongs to has arisen. It seems to be the Commencement Chorus director's privilege to select the music. This does not make sense to me. In high school, the senior class was invited to make nominations for and then vote on the song

to be sung at graduation. We do have a Commencement Committee whose job it is to oversee various aspects of the ceremony. Why is the choice of music not that of the students for whom the ceremony occurs in the first place?

In terms of the debate over the two pieces themselves, I return to the students' perception of the Hallelujah Chorus. I and at least a few

others I have talked to view the Hallelujah Chorus as a jubilant, celebratory, rousing cheer that we have finished our tenure here and are happy to be moving on, yet also happy that we were here. Gaudeamus is unfamiliar to many more people, and is in an entirely different spirit: pompous and snobbish and stuffy and uptight. I don't

feel this is an accurate representation of my feelings about my experiences here, nor do I see it as an accurate depiction of the school's attitude, nor does it stand as a testimony to the spirit of graduation. Musically, the Hallelujah Chorus is much more spirited and uplifting than Gaudeamus. The Hallelujah Chorus is much more familiar, and people just like it better.


Many of the Glee Club members Ι sang Gaudeamus with at the inauguration just flat out did not like the music or the text. I have personally looked forward to the performance of the Hallelujah Chorus at my graduation ever since I first heard it at graduation in 1995.

A final aspect of the choice of music at graduation has been the range of participation each

piece allows. The Hallelujah Chorus is simple enough and familiar enough to be picked up in a few short rehearsals by singers. This allows all members of the Caltech community to participate in the Commencement Chorus, not just those who were in Glee Club that year. Gaudeamus is simply not faenough to allow anyone who did not sing it with the Glee Clubs this year to perform it at graduation. I think this is especially important to graduating singers that for some reason or another couldn't sing in their last year or term, like myself, allowing us to participate in our graduation ceremony. Some singers, myself included, are not singing at graduation only because of distaste for Gaudeamus, but there are other singers who will not be singing at their graduation because they don't know Gaudeamus.

There are petitions to have the Hallelujah Chorus at this year's commencement being circulated through the undergraduate houses. A graduating Ph.D. student has taken on contacting other graduating grad students. I urge graduating students to consider signing and asking for the Hallelujah Chorus. I urge the administration to listen this time when amazing numbers of students voice their opinions. Finally, I ask that the choice of music at graduation be given to the students through the Commencement Committee in future years, to make that graduation which we have all worked so hard for truly meaningful and ours.







Luckily I also had a wonderful encounter with Alice and friends at Wonderland on Huntington. The tea was highly successful, the finger sandwiches luscious and the setting elegant if crowded. Thanks a bunch for including me in these happy cavorts. I guess it all balances out, being wet willingly and unexpectedly, and being given the chance to be the Mad Hatter at a really snazzy Tea Party. I am sure that you all know why the hatter was mad. At least a commonly held theory is that it was due to Mercury poisoning. What an interesting contrast to see people only 5 years or 10 years out of Tech. Their perspectives and outlooks are already widely divergent from those of Techers still at work here. There is indeed light at the end of the tunnel. All these people were well adjusted, forward looking, alive people, alive in the everyday, not just at fun and games time like Ditch Day.

How could I ever doubt that that was the true character of Techers, that the odd behaviors you all exhibit at various times are only a sign of growing up and letting off steam. You too will eventually emerge from our own somewhat artificial environment, the Caltech Wonderland to participate in the real world life. And that takes me to the idea that we are not really in a real world, here in the Caltech Wonderland. We are governed by the

Honor Code that most of us try to apply in the best way we know how. Because we all accept this common inspiration our environment is a benevolent one. But that does not mean we have license to act without controls

The behaviors, which are indulged in on Ditch Day, when a kind of Mardi Gras license spreads through the Campus, is not meant to be for everyday. It is not the real world, not even Caltech's everyday world. The extent to which Caltech Students can self-govern is one aspect of Caltech Wonderland, which has attracted many of you here. But such a self-government must be a realistic; it includes responsibility. It is great to borrow Daihatsus, (I believe that this year they were asked for, not stolen, bravo) but they must be driven with care. Drunk driving in a Daihatsu is as dangerous as drunk driving on city streets. All your endeavors must be taken as seriously as constructing brute force stacks. Along with the freedoms implied by "self Government" there must come responsibility to act reasonably. The more responsibly students behave, the less interference with student government is necessary. We in Wonderland are subject to the same laws and constraints than ordinary citizens in the outside world. Let us respect the rules of society, Caltech's and the World's in Truth, that will make you free!


