Caltech to raise \$100 million for new biology building

The California Institute of Technology has formally announced the goal of raising \$100 million in a campaign to support new initiatives in the biological

The Biological Sciences Initiative (BSI) will allow the Institute to create approximately a dozen new faculty positions in biology and related disciplines, construct a new biology building on campus, develop new joint training programs with medical schools, and target several major biological questions that can be answered only through sustained research in state-of-the-art facilities.

"We intend to keep Caltech at the forefront of research in the biological sciences," says Camilla Frost, cochair of the BSI and member of the Caltech Board of Trustees.

According to Caltech president David Baltimore, a Nobel Prize-winning biologist, the campaign is designed to strengthen Caltech's ability to advance scientific knowledge and pave the way for new tech-

"The 21st century will be the Golden Age of biology. We will see advances in both fundamental understanding of nature and medical technology for the treatment of disease.

"Our campaign is ultimately aimed at complex questions like the nature of consciousness, how memory and learning operate at the molecular level, how cells grow and die, and how genetic networks function," Baltimore

"To answer these questions, we need the modern resources that only a major fundraising effort can provide for Caltech.'

Anderson to receive Crafoord Prize

CALTECH PRESS RELEASE

The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences is to award the 1998 Crafoord Prize in geosciences, with special emphasis upon "the dynamics of the deeper parts of the Earth," to Don L. Anderson of the California Institute of Technology and to Adam M. Dziewonski from Harvard University for their fundamental contributions to our knowledge of the structures and processes in Earth's interior. The 1998 Crafoord Prize is valued at \$500,000 dollars, and will be presented to the prizewinners at a ceremony on Septemher 16 in Sweden

On hearing the news that he had been awarded the 1998 Caltech's Eleanor and John R. McMillan Professor of Geophysics, Don Anderson, said, "I think it's very significant that deep-Earth geophysics is being honored by this award. It is rare for our field to be acknowledged in this way. I am really delighted that Adam Dziewonski, a close colleague of mine, is also being honored for his work. Most people, when they think of geophysics, think of earthquakes, but seismologists do other things, such as x-raying Earth using seismic tomography to see what is going on in the deep Earth."

Caltech president David

Baltimore congratulated Professor Anderson and noted that "the Institute is very proud and pleased that Don will be receiving the Crafoord. It is exciting news. Don's work is truly deserving of this great prize. He is one of the world's most prominent scientists in the area."

According to the Academy, Royal Anderson and Dziewonski have together developed a generally accepted standard model of how Earth is organized and of changes in composition of the the dynamics of the processes mantle may explain the occurat its core and in its mantle that govern continental drift, volcanism, and earthquakes.

Anderson and his team have researched changes arising from the pressure deep down in Earth's mantle. Sudden changes in the rock types at depths of 400 kilometers adn 660 kilometers are explained by conversions undergone by the rock types, so that they contain minerals entirely unknown at Earth's surface. At 400 kilometers, the mineral olivine, common in lava, changes to spinel, a high-pressure mineral. At 660 kilometers, the mineral perovskite is formed, a mineral otherwise ony produued in the laboratory at very high pressures and

temperatures. Anderson's reserach has shown that such rence of tensions in Earth's crust that can lead to earthquakes. Anderson and his research team have also used seismic data to study convection currents in the mantle, important for understanding continental drift and volcanism. Recently, Andreson has also used geochemical and chemical-isotope methods not only for mapping Earth's development, but also for understanding the development of the moon and the planets Mars

Anderson was born in 1933 in Maryland and received his doctorate in geophysics from Caltech in 1962. He has been a leading figure

New Delhi, India — Despite the threat of sanctions, India conducted two more underground nuclear tests Wednesday, after an initial three blasts on Monday. President Clinton has pledged to use the United States' vote todeny India funding from the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank.

TAANAYEL, LEBANON — Israeli jets bombed a Palestinian guerrilla training camp in the Bekaa Valley of Lebanon. Ten men were killed and another twenty or more were wounded in the attack. The training camp was for the syrian-backed Fatah Uprising which is opposed to the Middle East peacemaking process.

TEGUCIGALPA, HONDURAS -Forest fires spread so much smoke that all airport traffic in Honduras was grounded for the day. 35,000 acres of land are afire in the El Nino related drought. Travelers over the past two weeks have had to rely on land traffic through nearby Nica-

residents outraged over the killings of students have joined in the riots. 8000 students marched to demand President Suharto's resignation. Meanwhile, the rupiah, Indonesia's currency, dropped further by 16 percent.

BELGRADE, SERBIA - President Slobodan Milosevic of Yugoslavia and Ibrahim Rugova, the leader of Kosovo's ethnic Albanians have agreed to begin talks discussing the future of Kosovo. Their first meeting will take place today with no foregin mediators present.

PHNOM PENH, CAMBODIA — The Cambodian Government announced Tuesday that it had taken control of the last Khmer Rouge positions along the Thai border. The group has been falling apart since March when more than 1000 Khmer Rouge defected and since the group's longtime leader Pol Pot died last month.

I spent part of last week working on ETQ, the early term questionnaire that we (the Ombuds Office, Academics and Reasearch Committee, and the Dean's Office) are trying out. The idea, as I am sure you remember, is that if Profs. would hear early in the term about problems in the courses they are teaching, then there would be time for them to do something on the fly to remedy the situation before the course is over. The first round of ETQs is now done with, with letters being sent to the Professors, last Friday. The reports consist of one Excel worksheet with a numerical evaluation of the various items queried. The written comments were reprinted on a separate page. Of course all identifying information was

QED ETQ?

questionnaires covering 44 courses. These numbers obviously reflect a problem. Only for one course did we get sufficient responses for the comments to have any statistical value. Only for 3 courses were there 5 or more responses. For 27 courses only one questionnaire had been filled out. We need to have more participation than that, if the questionnaires are to give an accurate image of the course.

When one deals with few responses it is difficult to convince Profs. that they should take the comments made on their presentation, seriously. After all if there are few respondents it is likely that malcontents will be better represented than people who are mildly satisfied, or even ecstatic. And if Profs. are led to disregard the comments as unrepresentative, there is no incentive for them to change the things that the students find unsatisfactory. The whole idea of being able to improve com-

munication appears to be doomed.

We had hoped that letting everyone know by e-mail that there was a questionnaire and making it available both on paper and on the Net would encourage many people to respond. It took only a few minutes to respond for all of the courses a particular student was enrolled in. I am actually amazed at the number of groups, which try to pry information out of the students.

Pry seems to be the word. The multiplicity of mechanisms suggests that none are really satisfactory, that there is an unfilled need for information. There are lots of anecdotal complaints, but in our effort to get timely information, there is too little response in most cases to decide whether anything is wrong with the way a course is taught. If ETQ is going to produce something more than another poll, there needs to be sufficient interest and a commensurate response rate.

So help us find ways to increase participation. Do

you prefer to respond on line or is it easier to follow the paper route? Would a cartoon, which opens after the questionnaire is sent, titillate your curiosity enough to have you fill the questionnaire, just to see? Or would you like to get a "fortune cookie"? or being excused from one homework set, one midterm question? Or do you think that appropriately timed, impassioned exhortations would be the ticket, or ice cream for all the respondents in the course that had the highest percentage of responses? (appropriately weighted according to how many people are enrolled in the class). Alternately do you prefer being solicited by your peers, the ombuds people in each class? etc.

Besides numerical evaluation of various criteria we had also requested further comments. Many of these written comments were excellent and to the point. But there were quite a few which went beyond a productive format. To be useful comments have to be objective and discuss lecture styles, teaching goals and techniques, accessibility of Profs. and TAs and other matters of this kind. They should describe, not evaluate. And they should not include personal slurs.

In a way, I do hope that the small return is due to the defects of the procedures we followed. We were a little late off the mark and did not get the questionnaire ready to function until just before the Midterms. We will try to remedy these problems. By and large however, what is really needed is your cooperation. We all want your experience at Caltech to be the fabulous adventure that it is meant to be. Only by knowing how close we come to allow you to achieve your goal can we come close to help you achieve it. It is one of the things you can do to maximize your returns from attending Caltech.

So please answer even if you are satisfied, not just if it feels like a bad dream. We would love to hear, nay we need to hear from you. Send us comment on ways to improve the questionnaires and to increase your response to them. I can be reached at revelj@cco the through Devi Thota at devi@cco, and the Ombuds office at helenh@cco. 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



The Bidding

Last week's West, now sitting South, stared at his 17-pointer with two major-suit doubletons, and decided to bid 1C instead of opening 1NT, although he mentally decided to bid it later. West, holding a reasonable spade suit and 13 good points, doubled that for takeout. North oblingingly showed his red suit, as did East. South, apparently oblivious to the opponents' inteference, went through with his plan anyway. This was resoundingly doubled by West; after all, he stood to make at least two spade tricks, two club tricks (since South was marked with the club King), and East could probably supply something in diamonds. North tried to save into clubs, but that was doubled too.

West led into his partner's diamonds. Dummy came down, and South went into a stew. West's doubles had unnerved him. Gingerly, South took the Ace and trumped a low diamond in dummy, noticing West's doubleton. Leading a low club from dummy revealed the bad trump break as East discarded a diamond. South's ten was overtaken by the queen, and West led a high spade back to South's ace. Trying to get rid of his hot potato (the low spade), or at least force West to use one of his trumps, South led out the top three hearts, throwing the last spade in his hand on the King. South led a heart from dummy and West seemed surprised when he trumped it with the Jack of trumps. West overruffed with the Ace and led a high spade. West raised his eyebrows again as South trumped with the four. Now the situation was:



and South made the only move that could save the contract: the diamond 7. If West ruffed high, declarer's hand would be good. As it happened, West threw the spade 3, and declarer again made the only correct move of leading a side suit from

Maya Angelou shares poetry, song, self in talk

Wednesday, I abandoned our frantic little island of pristine Science and Technology for a lyrical, meandering, distinctly right-brained experience. Through the grace of Residence Life, I trekked to the Pasadena Civic Auditorium to see the Distinguished Speakers Series of Southern California. Looking

for some excuse to justify abandoning the usual ponderous homework assignments, I went to see Maya Angelou the fa-

mous poet. However, I returned with a vision of Maya Angelou the person - famous yes, but famous for her outstanding personhood.

She opened her speech with a song: from a deep, mellow alto rolled lyrics that spanned the globe, and a melody that held the timeless richness of pure passion. Applause were universal, but only a few - all women save a lone black man - rose from their seats. Only an hour and a half later, Angelou had, by sheer inspiration of her spirit, animated the group to rise unanimously in a standing ovation. This power came not from her ability to identify with women and African Americans, but from her ability to distill the human experience into a brew so strong that her message at once was understood by each individually, and by all collectively.

The evening revolved around poetry, again rendered in Angelou's rich, rolling, precise expression. Poetry was used because, "in the poetry we can find evidence of our wonder," and Angelou deftly inspired and elucidated that wonder as she walked the line between speech and song. She drew primarily from black writers, reciting Paul Lawrence Dunbar, Mari Evans, Langston Hughes and ending with her own work, but poets far

removed from Africa, including William Shakespeare, Edna St. Vincent Milay, and Robert Service were also prominent. Recalling her early life in the racially polarized environment of Stamps, Arkansas, where the black community did not acknowledge non-African authors, she stated that "It is imperative that you know that all of [poetry] belongs to all of us all of the time."

Angelou was most inspiring as she twisted and tweaked the often delicate issue of race. She is undoubtedly a

minority: black, female, highly educated. However, she neither exploited nor avoided the issue. It was clear throughout that she was who she was and would be taken on those terms. However, she was again able to pull out the thread of universal experience from a background of personal anecdotes. While no one, perhaps, could relate to the complete spectrum of her life, everyone received the message. "You need to have this poetry inside you. You need to laugh and cry. You need to realize that human beings are more alike than unalike."

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
