Web ventures

The Internet is the birthplace of a powerful new marketplace - one which promises to revolutionize the way businessmen do business. To illustrate this point, Bill Gross, Chairman of idealab! and the youngest trustee of Caltech's board, gave an anecdote to the captive audience of aspiring entrepreneurs Wednesday in Beckmann Auditorium.

"I had gone shopping for a car on the Internet and found less than what I hoped," began Gross.

Gross hired a contractor to test-drive, so to speak, a web site that would allow the user to choose exactly the car they wanted. However, since it was a test, they didn't include any of the functionality (like credit card validation and so on) that a real site would include. Instead, Gross told the contractor to sell just one car using Wizard of Oz behind-the-scene web pages - and then to drive to a dealership, buy it and personally deliver it to the buyer's house.

The site went up on a

Thursday night, and the next morning, the contractor called Gross with the news: "We sold four cars!" "Turn off the site!!!" Gross responded, and *carsdirect.com* was born.

Although there were five very different speakers at the Caltech Entrepreneur Club's forum, each put forth the same message: Entrepreneurship on the Internet is not easy, but it is rewarding. The panelists also included Scott Zimmerman, CEO of Storagepoint.com, Michelle Kraus, CEO of Opensales.com, Rob Ferber, founding technologist of eToys, Luis Villalobos, founder of Tech Coast Angels.

Each speaker addressed some of the requisites for business on the Internet, but the most stressed was the ability to learn new skills at "web speed." For some companies, such as Netscape and Apache, this means opening up your product to a developers' community via open source. For others, this means getting the very best people working on utilizing the full advantages of the web. As Gross pointed out, the Web can make months into minutes.

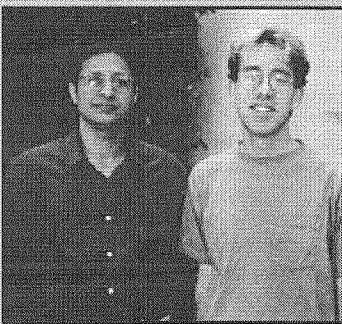

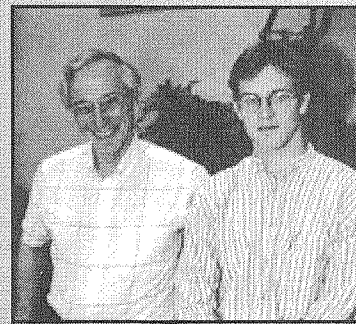

Dealing with Guests

Heather and Brian - Bring a budget requesting funding to hold the Y Fall Event, which will be like Gradiators except for the undergrads. The date is set for September 26, 1999, the Sunday beginning rotation before classes begin. This event would occur during the day and include lots of "wacky" sport events like innertube water polo and human battleship with water balloons with a big BBQ as well.
They also request funding for the Y Huntington Tea to be held on October 17, 1999, the Sunday after SURF seminar day. This event would be focused on encouraging interaction between the undergrads and the fac-

ulty, grad students, and Caltech alumni since all will be invited to the event.
Project Reports
Formal - It was held last Friday at the Ritz Carlton Huntington. It was right on budget with about 160 people in attendance. In general, the feedback about it was positive, with some mixed reviews on the band.
Axline funds - The BoD is concerned about the distribution and usage of these funds and will be looking into this issue.
Housing survey - The IHC is planning to send out a housing survey on the new roompicks process. The director of residence life has reported that 30-40 people who were guaranteed housing since they turned in their cards are currently without a place to live for next year. Apparently there is nothing to be done about this at this point and since rooms will probably become available by the time the next school year begins, there is not much to worry about. There is also the possibility of filling up unused grad student housing.
Student-Faculty Conference - Plans for this conference to be held the next school year include looking into certain "problem" options such as physics, electrical engineering, biology and others. Retention of people in the individual majors will one issue particularly researched. Also, recent graduates

will be contacted in order to gauge the relevance of the Caltech education in industry or graduate school. Students and faculty will be e-mailed in order to maximize the input received.

The BoD approves \$600 for Y fall event and \$100 for the Y Huntington Tea.

Minutes of the ASCIT Excomm

June 2, 1999

A protest has been submitted regarding the announcement of joint-candidacy in the election for Senior Class President. Two concerns are outlined in the protest: the first is that the candidates forming a team did so after the nomination deadline, and the second is that the office naturally belongs to a single person.

The Excomm decides not to consider the implications of changing to joint-candidacy after the deadline vs. before the deadline. The issue of late nominations was decided in the Excomm ruling of February 3, 1999. Thus the question before the Excomm simplifies to "should a team be allowed to run as a single candidate for the office of Senior

Class President?"

The benefits of joint-candidacies includes allowing interested parties to work together to complete the duties of an office. This reduces the workload of the office, and involves a greater number of interested people.

This benefit is at some cost, though. Spreading the duties of a single office over several officers reduces each officer's accountability. It also allows for significant political maneuvering. Some limit on the number of officers holding an office is definitely necessary: in the limit, all candidates could run as a single team. In the absence of a limit on the number of team members, the resolu-

tion with which the electorate can express its preferences can be severely limited.

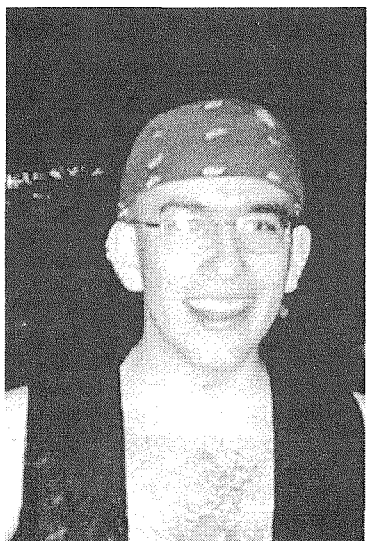
SENIOR CLASS VICE PRESIDENT

My reasons for running can be summed up in three succinct statements: Hello, hello, hello.

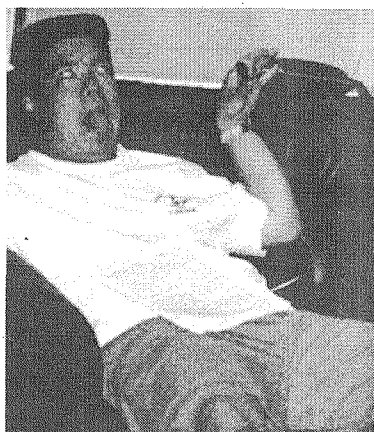

In closing, an illustration: The office of jun-

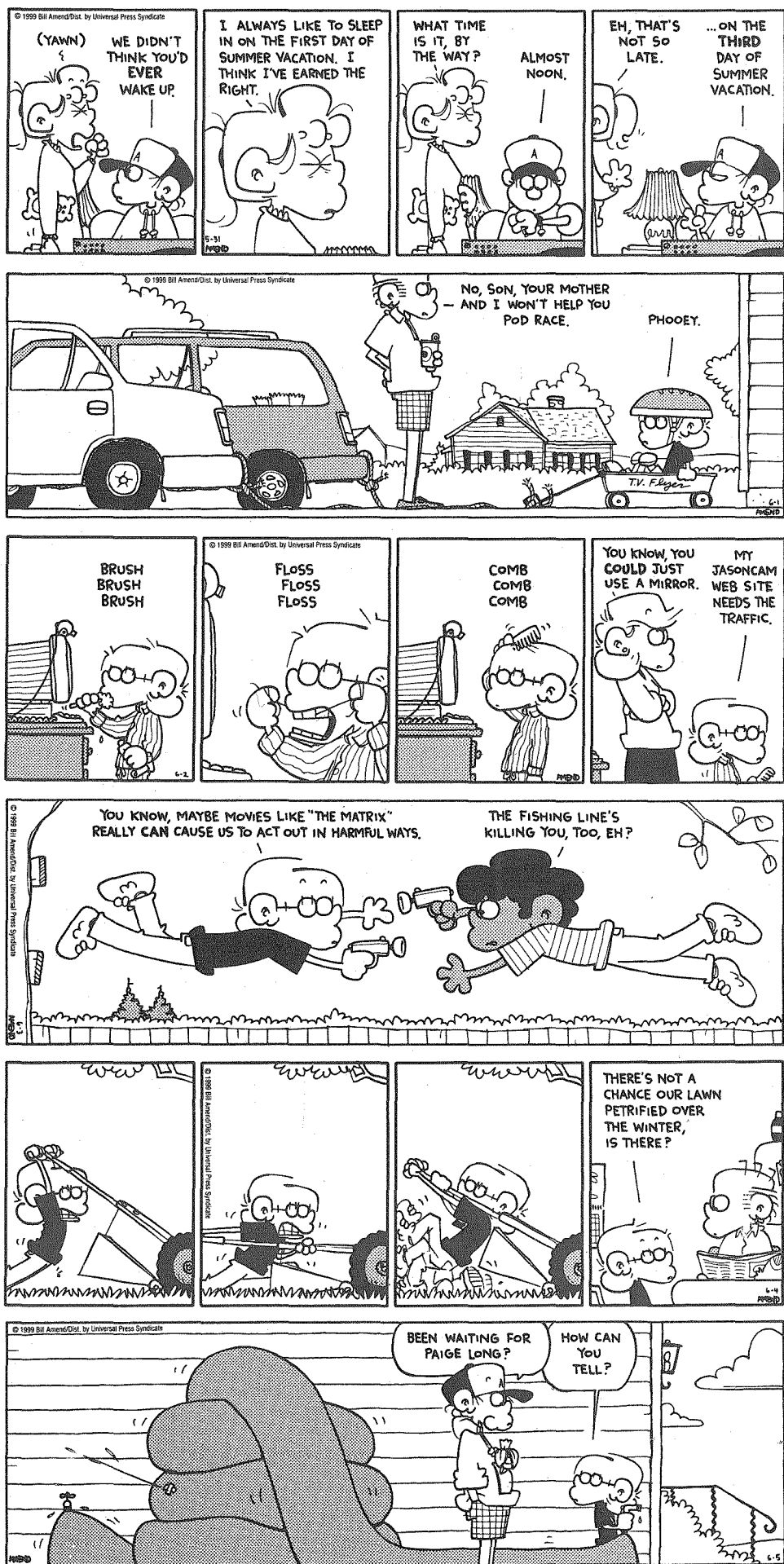

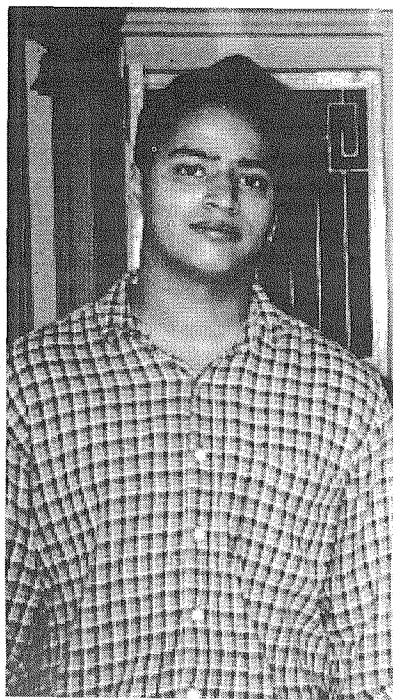

Mudeo next year memorable for all of us. I'd also take the initiative to put together other cool events.

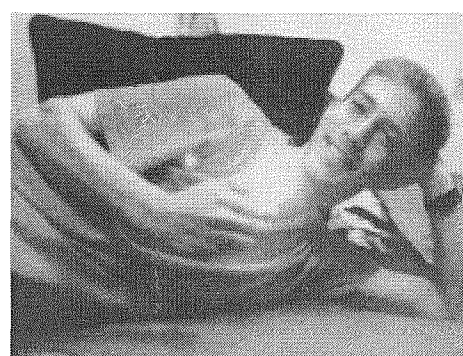
