Calvin Brown of Los Angeles will speak on "Fallacies of Perpetual Motion Machines." A personal friend of Professor Daughterty of the Mechanical Engineering Department, this distinguished patent attorney was persuaded by Jerard Werner of the local C.E.S. to exhibit to Techmen his knowledge of the many freakish, crank machines which will almost but not quite work.
