

#### Caltech Mourns Death of Board Member G. G. Hoag And Associate E. W. Crellin

Two of the California Institute of Technology's most loyal benefactors, George Grant Hoag, member of the Board of Trustees, and E. W. Crellin, member of the Associates and donor of the Crellin Laboratory of Chemistry, died this week.

Mr. Crellin died Sunday at his home at 1550 San Pasqual Street, the day after his 85th birthday. Mr. Hoag died Tuesday morning at the Huntington Hospital following a heart attack. He was 75 years old.

Mr. Hoag, Mrs. Hoag and their son, George Grant Hoag III, established the Hoag Endowment Research Fund in 1937 and made a gift valued at approximately seco,000 to the Institute, the income from which was to be used for educational research in the fields of science and engineering. A plaque commemorating them was subsequently placed in Guggenheim Laboratory of Aeronautics which this fund helped make possible. Mr. Hoag was one of the founders of the J. C. There have been some basically incorrect assumptions regarding the issues that exist between the United States and Russia.

It has been generally assumed that the conflict is between Capitalism and Communism. Actually, the real issue is between democracy and totalitariansm. The real issue is political rather than economic.

To approach this problem in the proper manner, one should set up an equation involving the essential factors; i. e., the beautification factor, the cost, and the state of the institute's budget:

The equation will then be of the form D\_f (B, k\$). The precise form is shown by a process of elimination. It cannot be of the type D\_B/k\$, for in that case the optimum condition would occur when \$\(\subseteq\) O, while it will be agreed that an even higher D should be attainable when \$\(\sigma\) is negative. We shall assume, then, as a working hypothesis, that the equation is of the form

D\_B - k\$
in which case D reaches a maximum when B is very high and either k or \$\(\text{ negative}\). B, standing for beauty, is according to an accepted old proverb, "only in the eye of the beholder."

k can be found quite easily—ask the comptroller.

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## SCHROEDER'S 5303 POINTS TAKES ANNUAL DECATHLON

Last Thursday and Friday ten of Caltech's more versatile track athletes competed in the annual Doc Hanes Decathlon. Big gun among the iron men proved to be Dwight Schroeder who finished with 5303 points to rank eighth among Techmen of all time
