This weekend, the laurels of victory had narrowly missed Snatch, the Women's Frisbee Team, which came in close second at the UCLA Invitational Frisbee Tournament. Competing against eight other teams in this two-day undertaking, the women played against six of the teams, losing only to UCLA, which emerged as the winner.

"The whole team stepped up and played very well and I was very excited that we were seeded second. I think we did a really good job this weekend," said Veronica Anderson.

Indeed, the team did more than a good job; although most of the teams in the tournament were of the B level, Snatch defeated all but one of its competitors with a considerably large margin.

Although the circumstances of this tournament were much more pleasant and predictable than those of last week's UC Santa Barabara Invitational, with sunshine showering the players instead of incessant mud, the tournament was still filled with injuries. During the game against UCLA B, Katherine Poulin dislocated her sholder, Lizzy Trower hyper extended her knee, and Taiala Carvallo was hit in her nose, broken just last weekend during the Santa Barbara tourney. The three, however, refused to let their injuries keep them from playing, and quickly came back into the game.

Bush Meets with Democratic Leaders at Party Retreat

President Bush addressed the Democratic Party's annual retreat on February 3 for the first time since 2001. Bush told the party, now in control of both houses of Congress, that he hoped to work together with them in the future.

He opened his remarks by with an attempt to defuse political bad blood over his reference to the Democratic Party as the 'Democrat Party' in the State of the Union by referring to himself as 'the head of the Republic party.'

Bush went on to ask for Congress' cooperation in working on issues such as the immigration system, a balanced budget, reduced gasoline usage, and health

a private session. 'The choice is bipartisanship or stalemate," said House speaker Nancy Pelosi.

New Advertising Triggers Terror Alerts in Bos-

A guerilla advertising campaign that involved placing lit up signs around Boston triggered a terror alert that nearly shut the city down and landed two men in jail.

The small devices portrayed a character from the Cartoon Network show 'Adult Swim' using small lights apparently wired to circuit board, and were placed in other cities without raising alarm.

The incident has sparked broader debate over government paranoia, acceptable advertising techniques, and artistic expres-

The two men responsible from the campaign were released on bail, and proceeded to give a press conference in which they would only answer questions about 70's hairstyles.

Pentagon Official Resigns After Terrorist Lawyers Comment

Senior Pentagon official Charles Stimson resigned on February 2 after he criticized lawyers who represented terror suspects.

In a Jan. 11 radio interview, Stimson that "I think, quite honestly, when corporate CEOs see that those firms are representing the very terrorists who hit their bottom line back in 2001, those CEOs are going to make those law firms choose between representing terrorists or representing reputable firms."

Stimson also called it "shocking" that large law firms would represent suspects held at Guantanamo Bay free of charge and suggested that those lawyers were receiving moneys from whoknows-where."

Stimson's resignation came after the Bush administration worked to distance itself from him amidst a wave of public out-

Hamas and Fatah continued to clash throughout the Gaza Strip, in spite of a truce signed last Friday intended to bring about a halt to the violence.

Kidnappings and gun battles resulting in deaths and severe injuries continued throughout the weekend and forced many Gazens to stay inside of their homes. The violence was centered around universities, cabinet ministries, and party security headquarters.



The role of the CRC (Conduct Review Committee) Chair is two-sided. The first role, like other CRC representatives, is to sit on cases and try to make the fairest decisions possible. The second involves leadership and a working knowledge of the system. Because of the intimate role that CRC Chair plays in the Caltech community, he or she is one of the first people others turn to, both with specific questions regarding the CRC's structure, and with broader questions like interpreting the honor code. I feel I can handle both of these responsibilities very well.

Why? I was a rep last year and sat on many cases. Consequently, I'm very familiar with the

whole process of determining whether or not a violation has occurred, and how best to remedy the situation. It's by no means a science; in every case there are countless factors must be considered. I've seen how some of our past decisions played out, and I've gained insight into different situations. Every person is unique and reacts differently, and I know that must be considered at all times.

The CRC's goal should be (and has been) to ensure that the honor code is universally followed, rather than to give punishments like some may believe. Having been on the CRC, I know well many of faculty and the deans who also sit on cases. I'm comfortable in candidly explaining to them how the Caltech undergrad world really is. Knowing people in many groups and houses, I have a good understanding of how our community truly operates.

Additionally, I respect the honor code immensely. Having seen other college campuses, I acknowledge that it, more than anything else, defines the environment at Caltech. It promotes a sense of trust and comradeship rather than competition against each other on every set and exam. It gives us so much freedom: working together on sets, taking home exams, accessing keys to every building on campus, and even leaving our doors unlocked. We might take it for granted sometimes, but it's something I am willing to spend my limited free-time on to ensure that this strong sense of community doesn't fade.

I've always had a strong feeling of right and wrong (sometimes I wish I didn't ... but I do). This, along with everything else, means I can do an excellent job as the CRC Chair and I would love to do so. I hope you all agree.

Every member of Caltech respects the Honor Code. It significantly influences the decisions we make. It is governed by the members of the Caltech community to build an atmosphere of confidence and trust. The aura of the Honor Code is quite strong in our academic lives. However, it is quite disappointing to see that the aura is dimmer in our social lives.

The honor code says that no member of the Caltech community shall take unfair advantage of any other member. The honor code has a lower impact on nonacademic life probably because in many social situations, there is only a very fine line between fair and unfair. Still, failure to think about the consequences of one's actions is no excuse. Thus, I would like to design a set of guiding principles with the CRC that helps all of us determine what is 'fair'. I will make



certain that all of the Caltech community gets a chance to give feedback so that eventually everyone agrees to it.

I have served on the CRC as an active representative over the last year. This gives me confidence in my capacity to lead cases, in coordination with Dean Green, in a way that is completely fair and impartial to all the members of Caltech.

Currently, the Honor Code committee is drafting an ASCIT bylaw change that proposes the transfer of the CRC leadership to the students. Presently, the committee is cochaired by the Associate Dean of Students. I strongly believe that restructuring the CRC leadership has its merits. At present, the CRC may be perceived as an administrative police. If it is under student leadership, it will be our body, something we would respect even more. I feel that my understanding of the objectives of the CRC and the Honor Code will enable me to help make this transition smooth.

The 2002 Student-Faculty Conference pointed out that about 20% of the undergraduates and most graduate students did not believe that the Honor Code worked entirely. I will ensure that we have better communication regarding the Honor Code, like CRC talks for freshmen, as has been proposed. Additionally, I will make certain that CRC procedures, realistic samples of CRC cases and other relevant information are also available. The idea is to make everyone aware that the CRC is a significant resource to ensure an atmosphere of trust, confidence and honesty in the Caltech community.

These changes are vital for the Caltech community. They are significant to the extension and implementation of the Honor Code in the non-academic sphere of Caltech. Meanwhile, it is important that the CRC still runs efficiently. I feel I am appropriate for the job. I am willing to dedicate my time, energy and built-in motivation to achieve these changes. Therefore, I urge you to allow me to serve you, the Caltech community, by electing me to CRC student chair.







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HamilTony Rebuts Again; Is No Editorial Safe?

After reading the editorials printed last week, I've decided to refute them. This editorial will make a lot more sense if you have a copy of last week's Tech with you! but my brilliance should show you that I speak the truth and those people published last week are a pack of monkey-faced liars, figuratively speaking.
