



### Topic: Life of Franklin

The annual contest, sponsored by Hearst Newspapers, honors an early American patriot, and this year it dealt with the life of Benjamin Franklin. Sulmeyer's winning oration, called "The Philadelphia Story," told of Franklin's humble beginnings and said in part:

"Today we honor Franklin as a scientist, a statesman, a scholar. We knew him as a kind as a wise old man, the father of American Diplomacy, the sage of the American Revolution. An embodiment of man's purpose, a federation of man's achievement."

This signal honor climaxes four years of active participation by Sulmeyer in Caltech forensics where he has repeatedly shown high proficiency.

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

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# Mermen Second In Swim Meet

Frosh Take Third In Battle at Oxy, Dick Libby Sets New Record in 220

In a record setting Conference Swimming Meet held last Saturday at Oxy, the Caltech Varsity squad placed a substantial second, and the Frosh team netted the third spot while the Tiger crews took both first places. The final scores were Oxy 87, Caltech 491/2. Pomona 211/2, Redlands 6, and in the Frosh meet it was Oxy 64, Pomona 36, Caltech 28, and Redlands 9.

Six new records were set at Saturday's meet, two of them by Caltech's Dick Libbey, four by Occidental.

Libbey set a new conference record in the 220 yard free style at 2:28.6 during prelims held last Thursday. Although he won first place again in the Conference meet, his Saturday time of 2:33.2 wasn't quite down to his newly set record.

The star Frosh paddler also pulled to an easy first place in the 440 yard free style in the new Caltech record time of 5:43.3.

The other new conference records were set in the Medley relay by Oxy's Brubaker, Evans, and Wadsworth at 3:17.2, in the Varsity 220 by Oxy man, Scoles, at 2:25.5, and in the 100 yard free style by Crosby of Oxy at 55.1 sec., a new Frosh record.
