The California Beta chapter of the Tau Beta Pi, national organization of honor students in the field of engineering, held a meeting last week to outline activities for the coming school year. The Caltech organization has the reputation of being one of the most active chapters in the nation and plans for various social events have already been drawn up under the leadership of Charles Murphy, president.

Nature of Tau Beta Pi

Tau Beta Pi is more than an honorary scholastic society; its primary purpose is to serve as a yardstick of engineering achievement and professional excellence. It strives for the maintenance of engineering ethics, its members are much in demand in industry and science. Membership in the organization is thus a very desirable asset to graduating s'udents.

Membership Requirements

Tau Beta Pi was founded as an engineering counterpart of Phi Beta Kappa. Because of the highly specialized nature of training in engineering and science offered at Caltech, the campus chapter has made it a practice to elect both engineers and scientists into its ranks. Twice a year the top fifth of the senior class and the top eighth of the junior class are considered for election; the final selection is based upon scholastic achievement, extracurricular activities and ability to get along with people. 





Industrial Organic Applications of Metallic Sodium



Sodium for organic reactions is shipped in 80,000-lb. quantities. It is pumped into the car, solidified by cooling and melted by hot oil for removal.




