Admiral Badger Presents Award In Assembly

Admiral Oscar C. Badger presented Caltech with a commendary plaque for its "essential part in our national defense" at the assembly held last Friday at Culbertson Hall. The plaque was given by the Navy in recognition of the V-12 Naval Personnel Training Program during the war period.

The award was accepted by Dr. Lee A. DuBridge, president of Caltech, who praised Dr. Millikan, president of the Institute during the war, and others working at Caltech for their **EE's Conclude Field Trips** part in the Navy program.

Rear Adm. Badger also told how the Caltech training and research program aided our forces during the Pacific campaign.

Prof. "Ex-Dean" Jones then spoke on some of the problems arising from the V-12 program and how they were met by the co-operation of Navy and Caltech administration and by the helpful advice of Dr. Millikan.



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


