



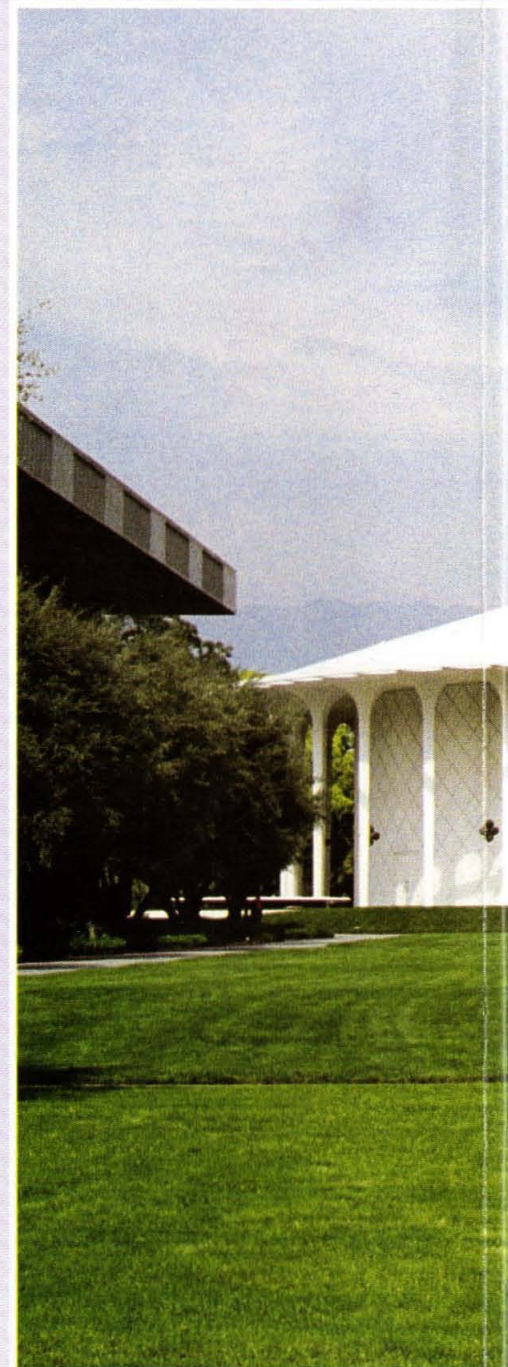

Right: Flanked by Beckman Behavioral Biology and Baxter, the Court of Mann is a lush green carpet leading to Beckman Auditorium.

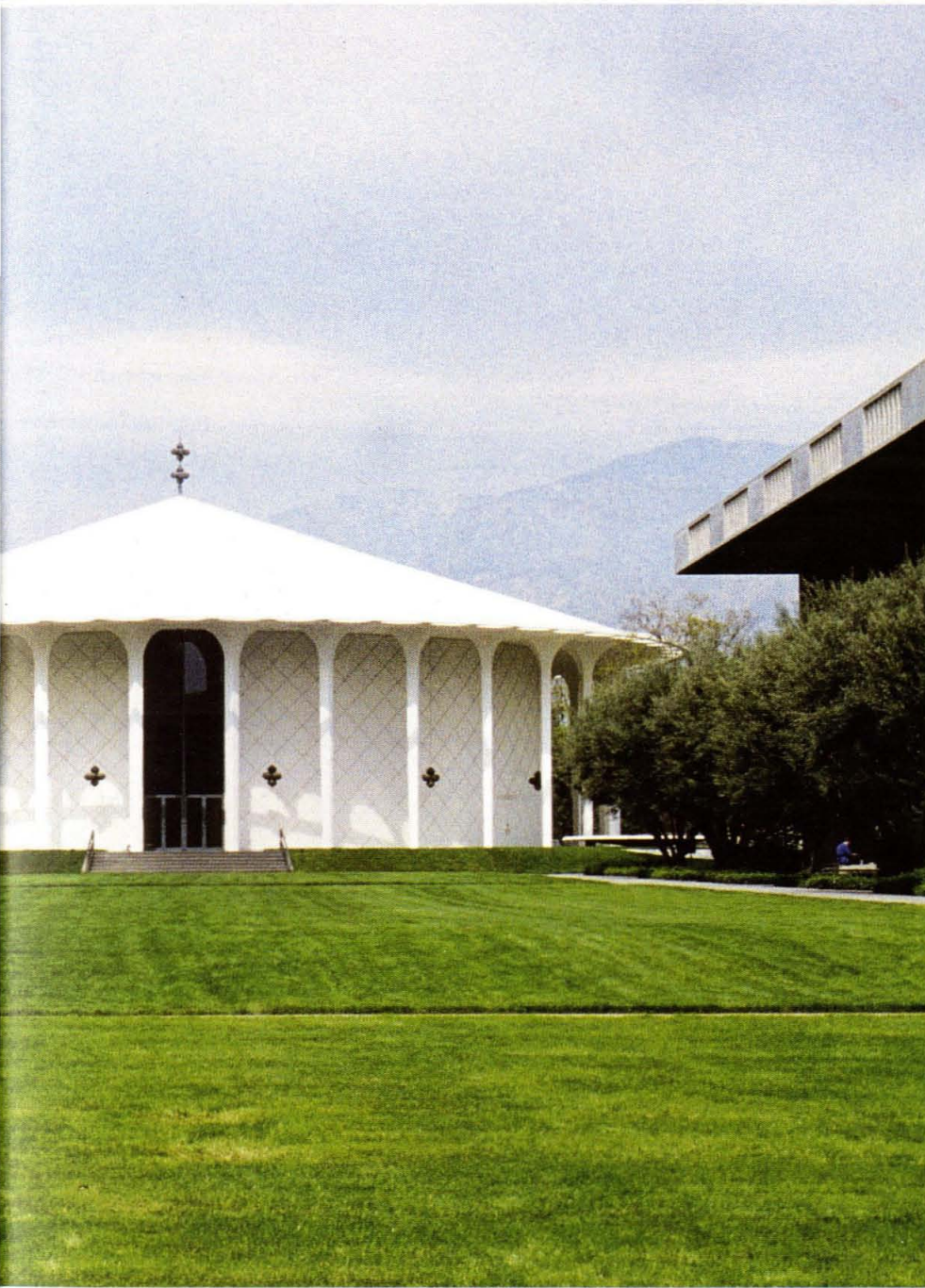

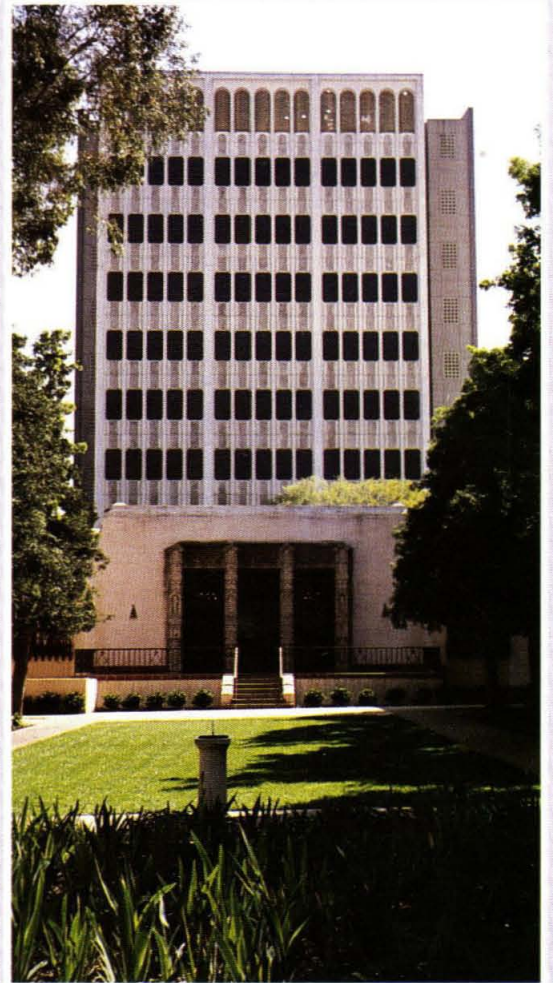

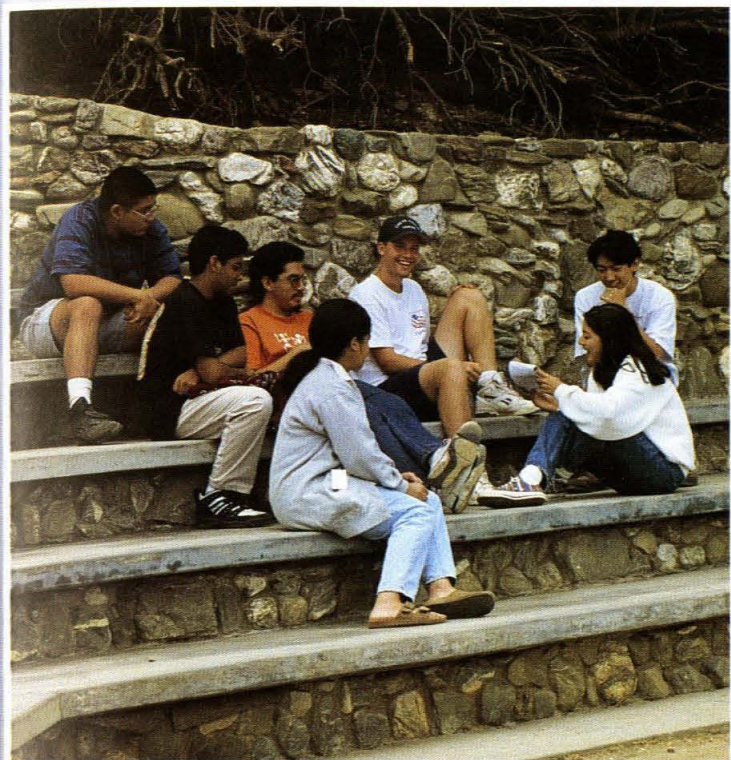

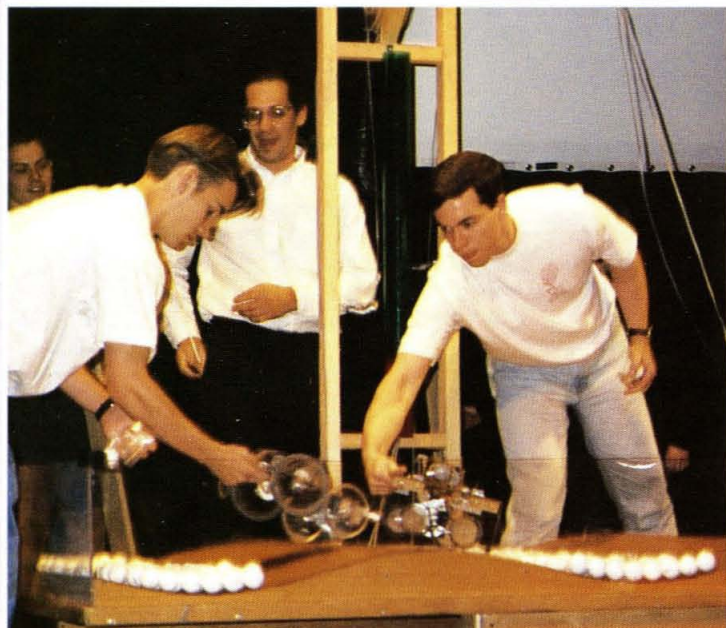

Continuing the series of constructions started last year, Caltech paved the way for the Fairchild Library by demolishing the unused Chemical Engineering Laboratories located between the Thomas and Spalding Labs. The Moore Engineering Laboratory, located south of the proposed site of Avery Center, and west of Steele House, is nearing its completion this year. The competition of a new structure between Noyes and Beckman Behavioral Biology both aes-

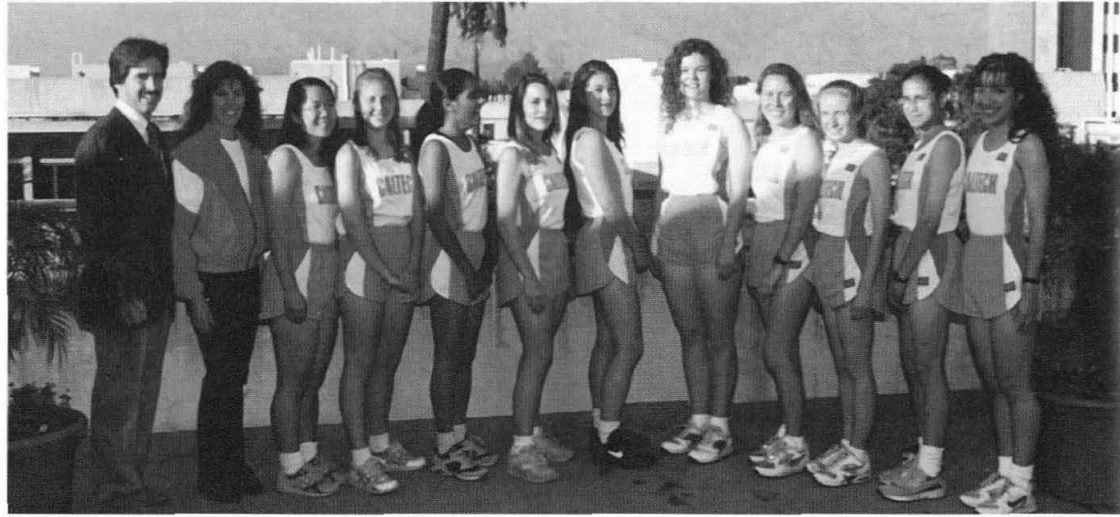
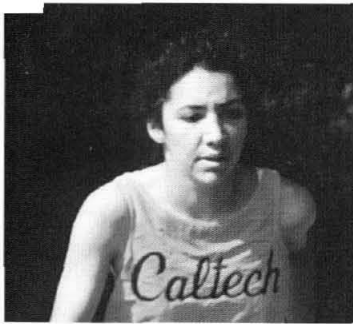
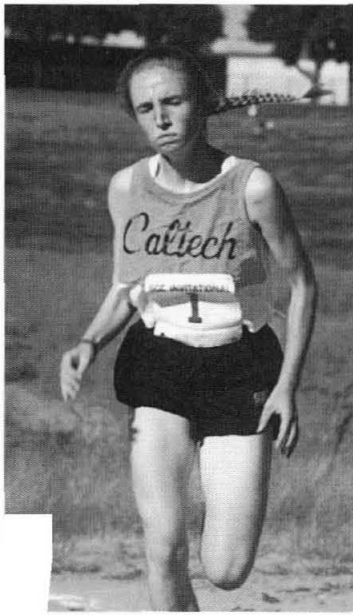
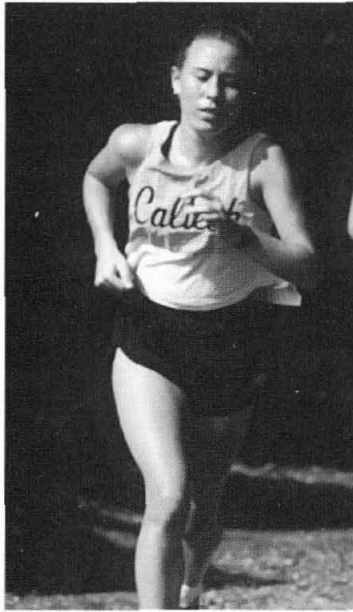
The Caltech Beavers have a 1994-95 record of 4W-8L in the Central Division of the Pacific Collegiate Hockey Association (PCHA). The hockey club team draws players from members of the Caltech community, including undergrads, graduate students, faculty, staff, and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Caltech started off the season strong with a 7-4 win at home vs. University of Pacific. The game highlighted a six goal effort by player/coach Pavel Svitek. After a close 7-5 loss to the UCLA Bruins, the Beavers traveled to northern California for a two game road trip. While they were blown out by a strong San Jose

State team to start the trip, the Beavers regained their composure to defeat UC Davis, even while playing on consecutive nights with a reduced lineup. The Beavers returned home to add a win against Pepperdine. The team closed the season with the 9th annual Beaver Cup, the annual battle against the MIT Alumni All-Star team. The MIT team got off to a quick start with 4 goals in the first period, but the Caltech team settled down to hold the game scoreless during the second period. The Caltech team finally got on the board in the third period, but MIT immediately answered with a goal of their

own. In the end, Caltech pulled the goaltender to try to mount a comeback, but the MIT team held their ground for a 5-2 win. The Beavers were coached by Pavel Svitek, who led the team in scoring and penalty minutes. Ron Siefert and Haj Sano were the assistant coaches. Other leading scorers for the Beavers are Svitek's linemates Captain Steve Chase and Bob Lane. Other undergraduate team members are Sean Suchter, who acted as the score keeper and the coach's assistant for the road games, Ben Liau, Brian Monroe, and Eugene Ha.

The latest and most successful version of Tech's women's Cross Country team had by all accounts a fantastic WINNING SEASON! This was the first time in history that we have managed to rack up more wins than losses. Coach O'Brien commented, "This is the first year in my ten years here at Caltech that the women have stepped it up to a whole new competitive level. Our SCIAC opponents couldn't take us for granted any longer and we managed to strike fear in their hearts. They hate losing to Caltech!"

The absolute highlight of the year was when sophomore sensation CAILIN HENDERSON qualified for and competed at the NCAA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, PA. Henderson also claimed 1st Team ALL CONFERENCE honors placing 7th and also placed 4th at the NCAA Regional Meet.

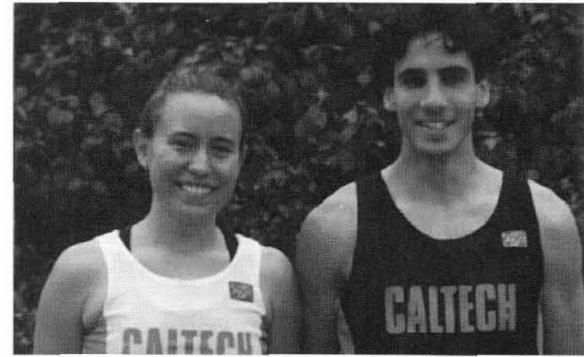
Caltech had never sent a woman to Cross Country Nationals before, so history was made. The team finished the season with 8 wins against 6 losses, placing 5th in the SCIAC out of 8 schools. Then at the NCAA Regional Meet the team finished with a flourish by placing 6th of 11 teams, our highest finish to date.

The individual highlights were many. Ten

women earned varsity letters this year. GINGER GARCIA, a senior, closed out her XC career by staking claim to the #3 spot midway through the season. Garcia finished up having lettered in each of her 4 years and earned the "Most Improved" award. Freshman SARA BEABER stepped right into the #2 spot on the squad, and she ran her fastest 5 kilometer time of 19:31 at the SCIAC Multi-Dual meet. Beaber garnered 2nd Team ALL CONFERENCE honors at the SCIAC Championships.

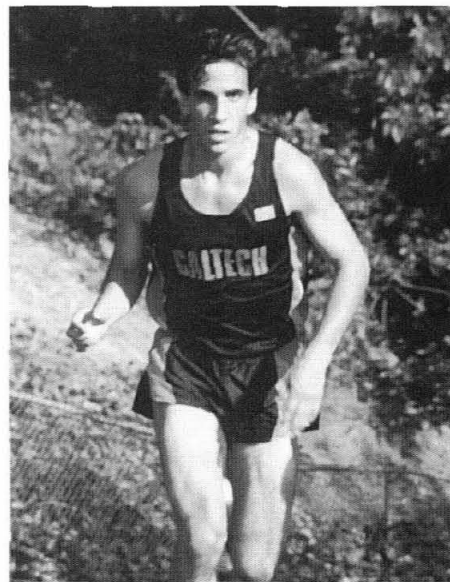
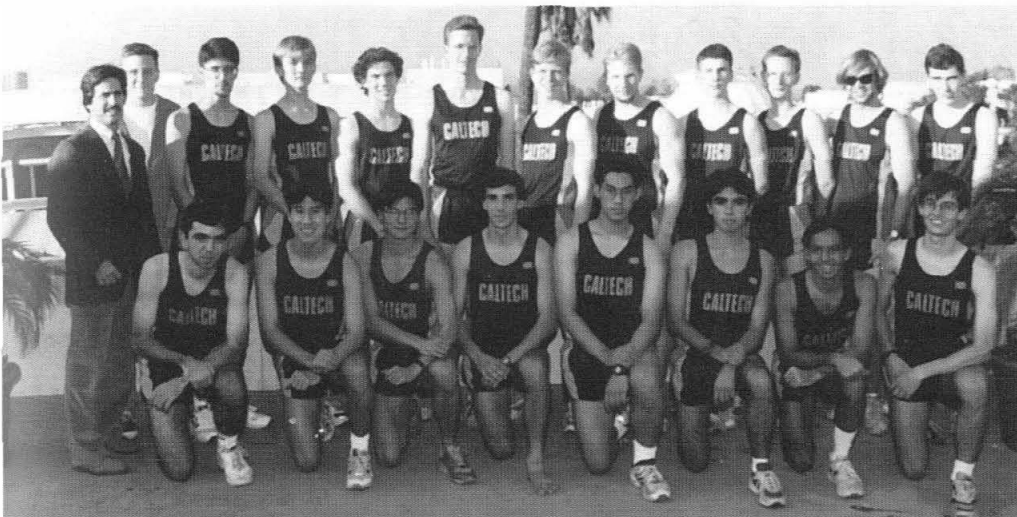

The men's Cross Country team battled gamely all season, missing a winning season by a mere 1 point. Finishing the season at 7 wins 8 defeats, this was a very successful effort by any standard. 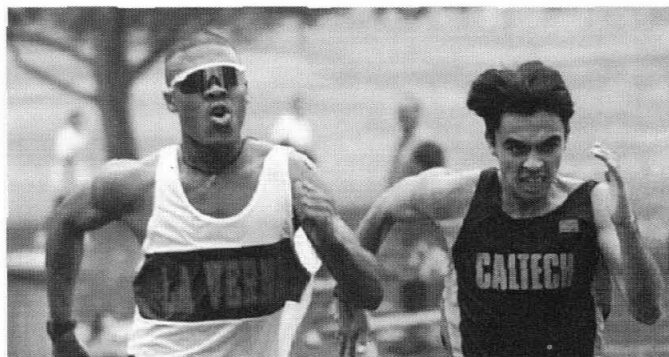

At the annual awards banquet, Kleiman walked away with the "Outstanding Runner" and "Paul Barthel Trophy," the latter award recognizing his Achievement, Leadership, and

Dedication as voted by his teammates.

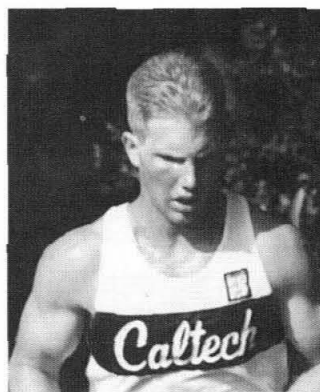

# MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

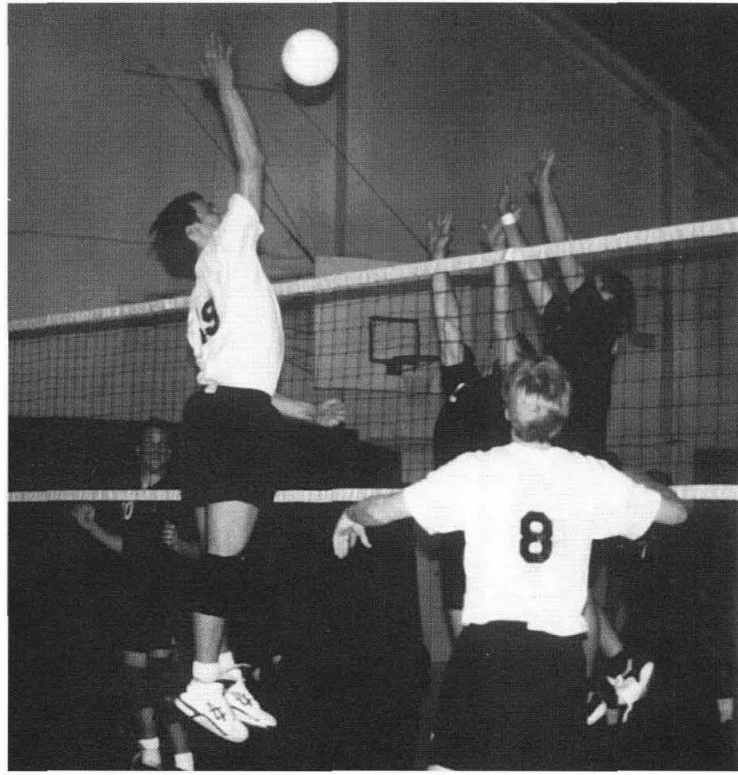

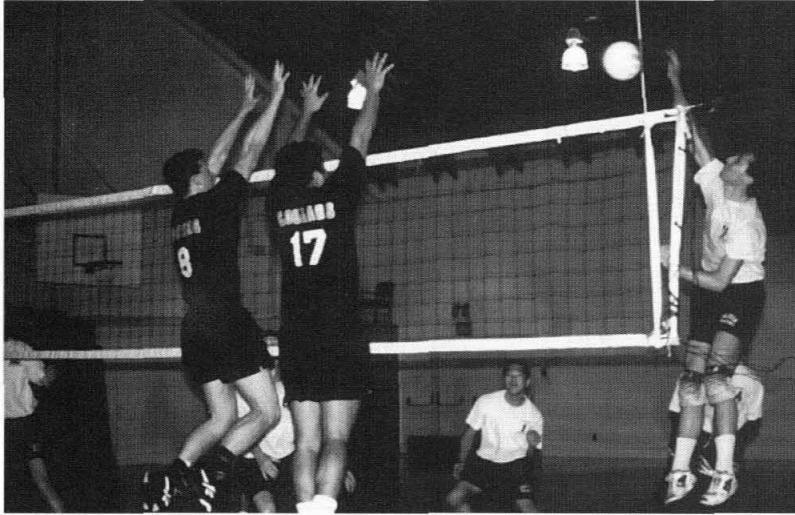

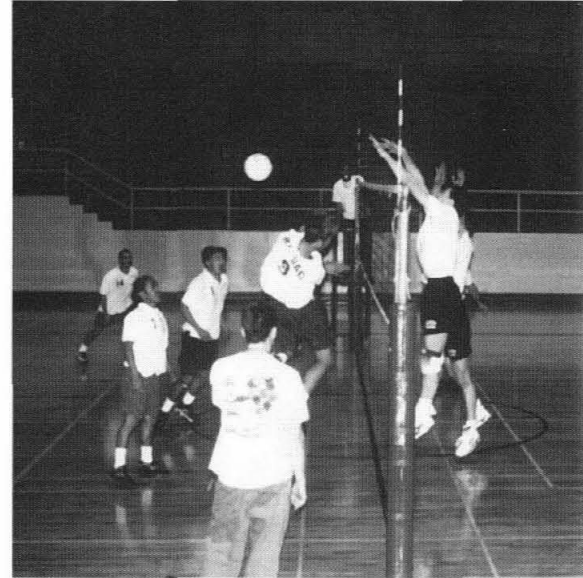


Intercepting a quick set from setter Chad Edwards, middle hitter Ken Wiberg spikes the ball over the opposing block.

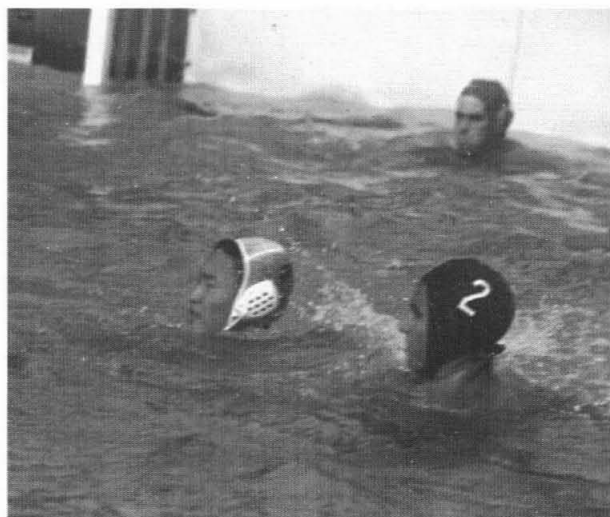

# SWIMMING AND DIVING



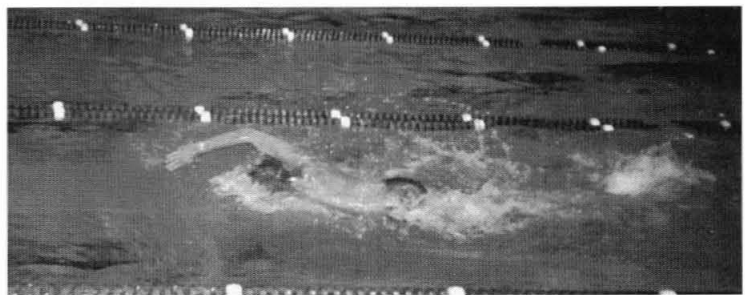

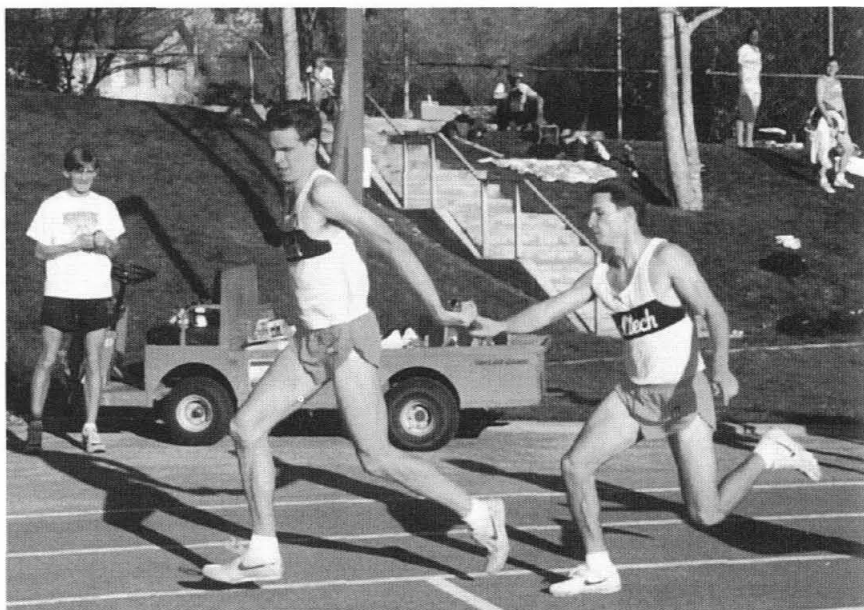
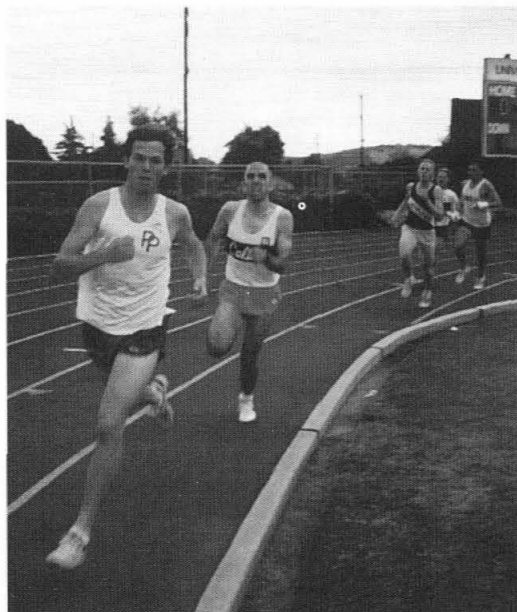

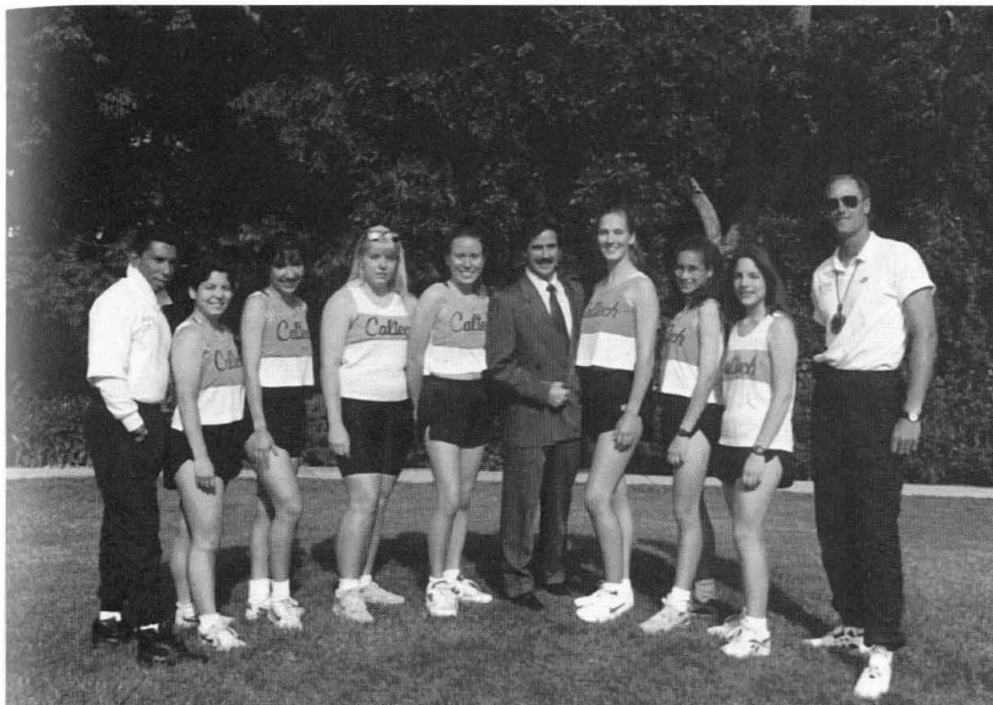

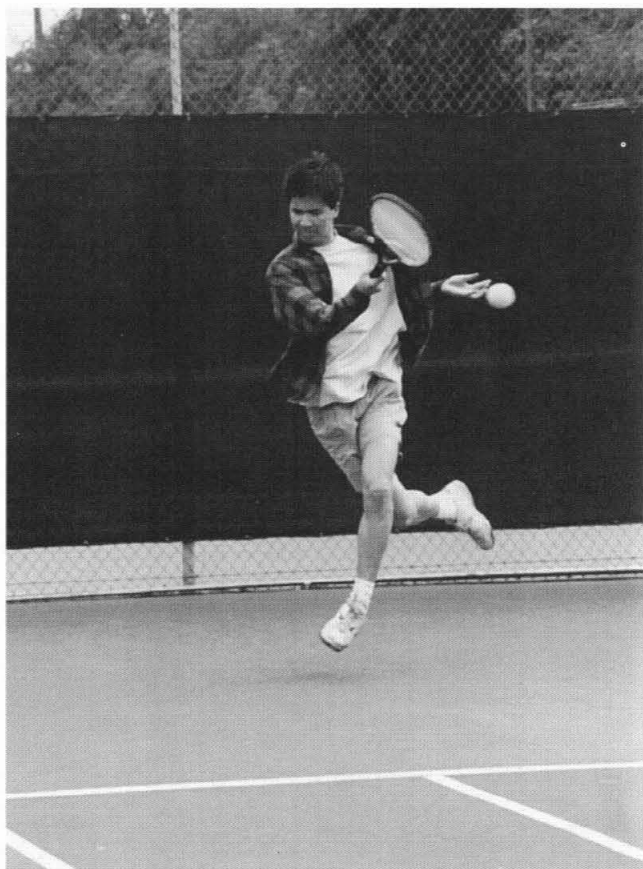
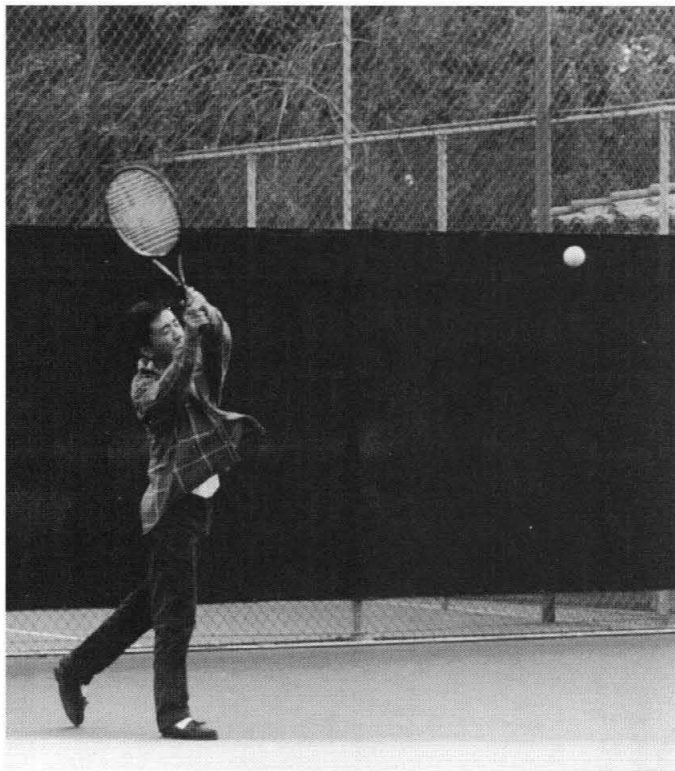

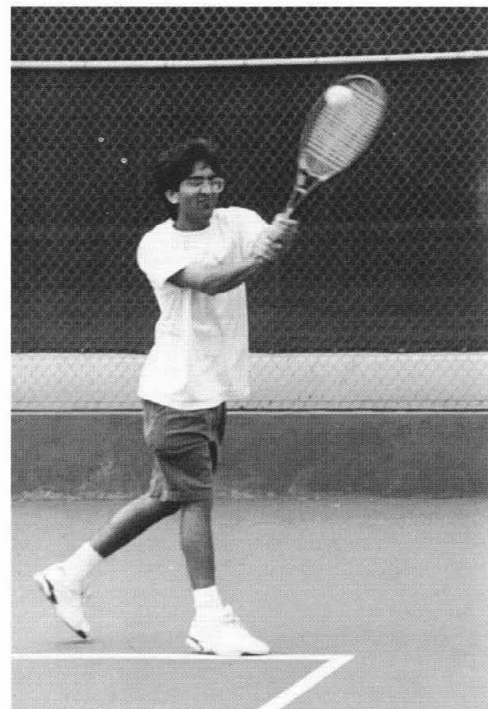
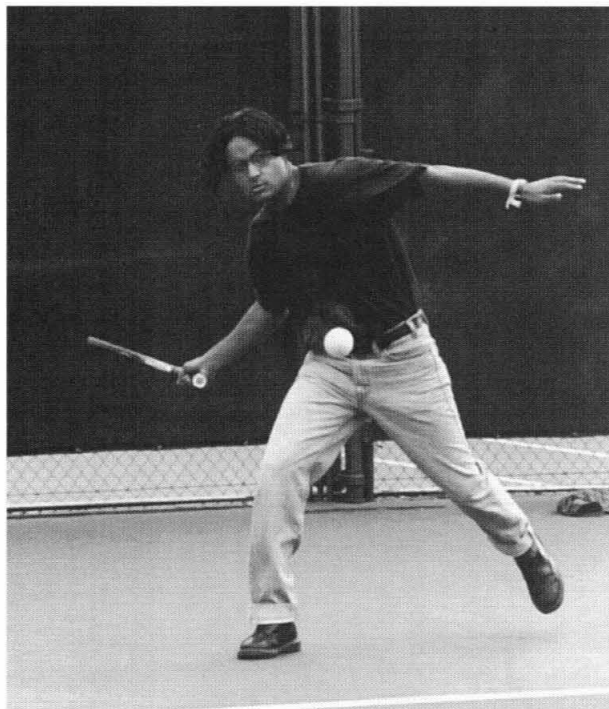

The Beaver squad responded to quite a few coach-

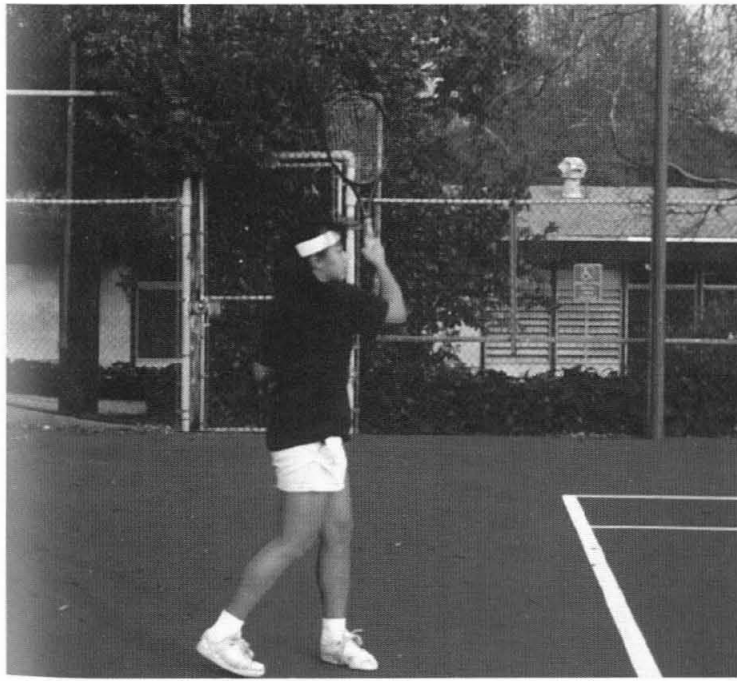

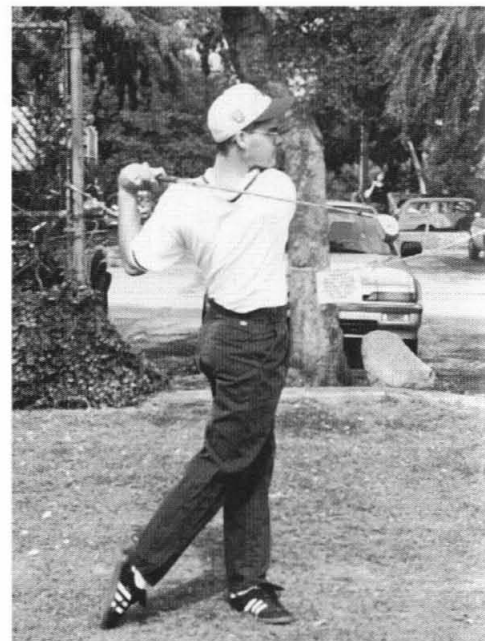

vision I conferences) was our women's foil team, led for the second year by their team captain, Rhonda, who graduates this year.

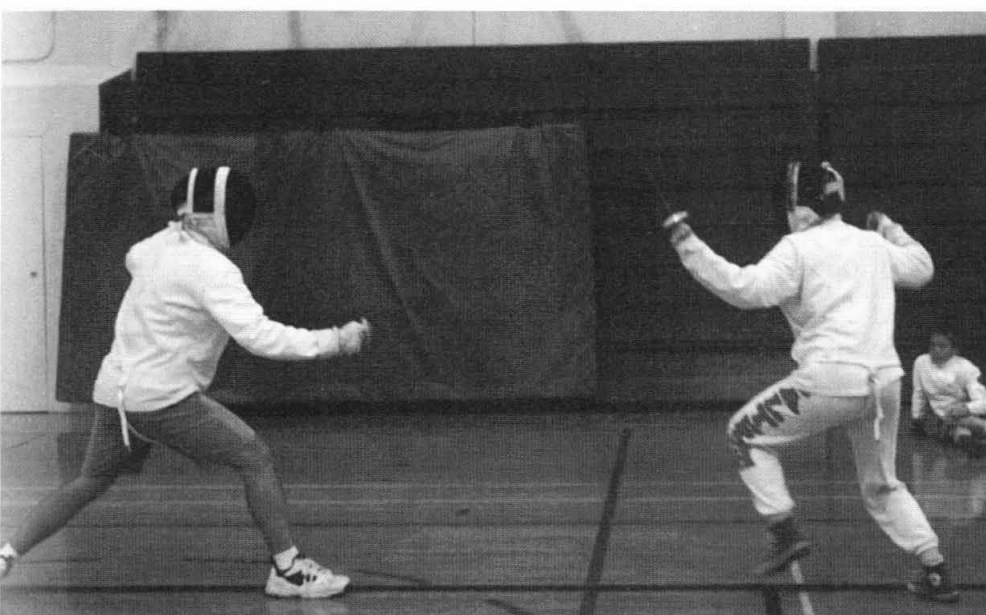

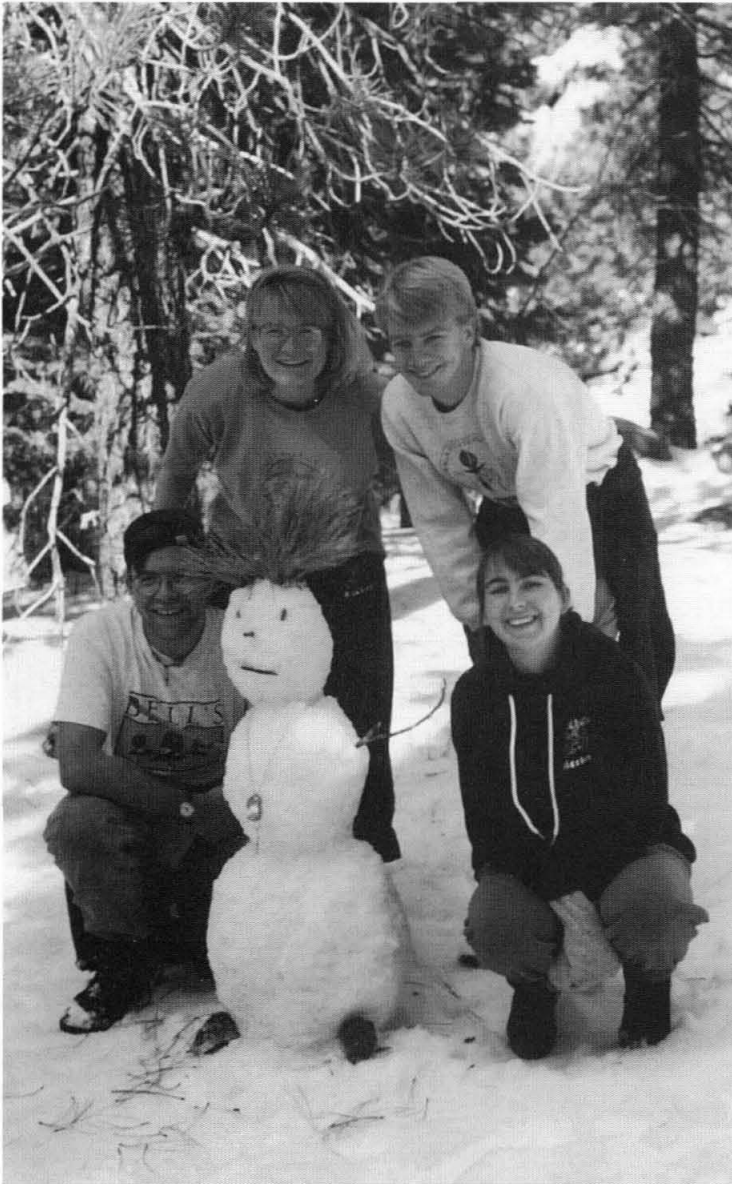
The Y has continued to bring the same kinds of quality services and programs that have

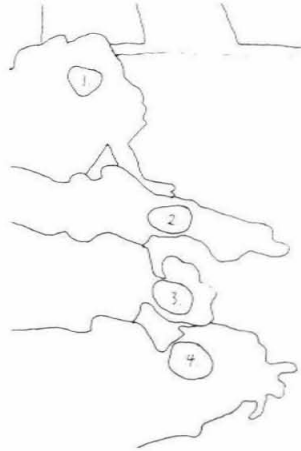




Sometimes the days go past unnoticed.
