




A Taste of Nostalgia


When the Honorable Amos G. Throop decided to start a college in 1891, it is unlikely he would have foreseen what was to come. Throop University had modest goals in its early days: to train young people in the industrial arts and crafts. However, the noted astronomer George Ellery Hale had a grander vision: a first-class science and engineering research institution. The Board of Trustees, whose members at that time included Norman Bridge, Arthur Fleming, Henry Robinson, J.A. Culbertson, and C.W. Gates, agreed with this vision and in 1907 decided to discontinue the elementary school, the high school, the business school, and the teacher-training school, leaving a college that awarded bachelor degrees in electrical, civil, and mechanical engineering. Throop was renamed the California Institute of Technology in 1920, and a year afterward the Institute started to pursue research in chemistry, led by Arthur Amos Noyes, and in physics, led by Robert Andrews Millikan, who would soon win the Nobel Prize. The college's prestige increased dramatically, and the modern Caltech began to take by Jimmy Lin shape.





Today, Caltech is still guided by the same principles set by Hale, Noyes, and Millikan. Professors Rudolph Marcus and Edward Lewis join Caltech's list of twentythree Nobel laureates, a remarkable achievement for an institution of its size. Professor Peter Goldreich didn't do too badly himself; he was a winner of the 1995 National Medal of Science. The Chemistry Animation Project produced its first videotapes, joining Project Mathematics! and the Mechanical Universe in teaching science and math to highschoolers in an entertaining manner. Due to a generous donation by Dr. Gordon Moore, the Electrical Engineering and Computational Neural Science departments can boast the brand-new Moore Engineering Laboratory as one of the forerunners of research facilities in the nation. On the lighter side, undergraduates celebrated the 75th anniversary of the Big T and Senior Ditch Day this year, and the oak tree between Gates Laboratory and Dabney Hall was named one of the top twelve trees in Pasadena.


A Glimpse of the Future

Caltech will continue to evolve as new areas and directions arise in science and engineering. We can see signs of this evolution already. Beckman Institute and Moore Laboratory, the first two academic buildings under the 1989 Caltech Master Plan, bridge the gap between the disciplines of Biology, Chemistry, and Electrical En-gineering. However, some things at Caltech probably will not change, such as its small enrollment. In 1946, Caltech had 1,391 students on a 30-acre campus. Today, the campus has more than guadrupled in area to 124 acres, but its enrollment has increased only by about 1 1/2 times, and that level is not expected to increase much for years to come. The small, select student body, coupled with a small student-to-faculty ratio, ensures that Caltech will retain that special character that no other school has. Finally, as one of the foremost research institutions in the world, Caltech will continue to impact various aspects of human life as it develops new synthetic materials, discovers novel biological applications, and engineers innovative technological systems. by Jimmy Lin



On opposite page: A vision of the future, the Master Plan illustrates the changes to occur at Caltech in the years to come.





Student Life

Yes. Caltech students do have a social life! Despite the heavy workload (for which Caltech is definitely famous) and the many all-nighters students usually pull to complete problem sets, Teachers do take the time out of their busy schedules to experience a variety of activities. The seven undergraduate houses regularly throw parties for all to attend. There are also over 70 clubs on campus and over 80% of the students participate in athletic competitions each year. Traditions such as the popular Ditch Day and the Pumpkin Drop off the roof of Millikan Library, hanging out at the Coffee House, eating desserts at the MOSH's, and social events sponsored by ASCIT, all give students the opportunity to meet with friends and to relax. Noon-time concerts and broomball also provide Teachers a break from studies. In addition, the Office of Residence Life periodically organizes off-campus trips to plays and dinners, while every year the Office of Public Events presents more than 150 programs, including drama, film, and concert attractions. The unique Honor System provides a sense of trust and camaraderie among the students and faculty — an attitude which extends to social as well as academic aspects of caltech life. The small community of only 900 undergraduates encourages Teachers to form close-knit friendships that exist now and beyond graduation. Caltech is one distinguished institution which offers its students not only a wonderful academic preparation but also a diverse social life.



Undergraduate Research

It is of no doubt that research is an integral part of undergraduate life at Caltech. Due to its small size, accessibility of faculty members, and availability of funding, Caltech undergrads have enjoyed a plethora of research opportunities to enhance their theoretical knowledge and experimental skills. There are three principal avenues for undergraduate research: research courses of academic credit and senior theses, research for pay funded by a faculty member, and the Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowships (SURF) program.

The SURF program at Caltech was created by Frederick Shair, Professor of Chemical Engineering, in 1979. Since its birth, SURF has become an outstanding example of the advantages Caltech offers. Students collaborate with a faculty member in an independent project for ten weeks during the summer. At the end of the fellowship, the students present their results, of which over 20% are published in open scientific literature. In 18 years, over 1,700 undergraduates (15% non-Caltech) have graced the doors of the SURF program.

The goals of the SURF program are to encourage the professional creativity of Caltech undergraduates, to enhance interaction between undergraduates and the faculty/JPL staff, to assist undergraduates in career decisions, and to provide an outreach program involving emeriti professors, admissions, alumni, donors, JPL, and other institutions to help Caltech achieve its institutional goals. With the support of so many, SURF remains a strong Caltech resource. by Michael Ru











This year marked the one hundred and second annual commencement for Caltech. The ceremony was held on a sunny Friday morning on June 14, 1996 at the Court of Mann. 226 students were awarded the B.S. degree, 105 students the M.S. degree, 1 scholar the Engineer's degree, and 164 doctoral candidates the Ph.D., resulting in 496 new Caltech alumni. The Alumni Association generously donated beautiful orchid leis to all B.S. candidates. The guest speaker was Admiral Bobby Ray Inman, who has served in tours as director of Naval Intelligence, vice director of the Defense Intelligence Agency, director of the National Security Agency, and deputy director of the Cental Intelligence Agency. Inman retired with the permanent rank of admiral in 1982 and is currently on Caltech's board of trustees. After the awarding of the degrees, President Everhart delivered a short message to all of the graduates and announced special awards. Following the commencement was a reception at the Athenaeum, attended by numerous graduates and their proud families.







Entrepreneur Club






Men's Basketball



Caltech has placed several times in the top five in the national undergraduate William Lowell Putnam Mathematics Contest, and won the national Math Contest in Modeling (COMAP) in 1989. In 1963, the Mathematics Department established the Eric Temple Bell Undergraduate Mathematics Research Prize and the Morgan Ward Prize, in honor of the memories of Professor Bell and Professor Ward. In 1953, Caltech admitted its first female student, Dorothy Ann Semenow, who came for graduate study in chemistry. Semenow had been at MIT, working under John. D. Roberts, when he accepted a position at Caltech as professor of organic chemistry. Semenow asked to come with him to Caltech in order to pursue her research, and Caltech had to change its policy to grant her request. The entrance requirements for graduate students were somewhat a barrier to an immediate large influx of women, but gradually Caltech admitted more and more women. In 1970, Caltech started admitting its first female undergraduates.

World-class Physics started at Caltech in 1921 with the arrival of Robert Millikan and the construction of the Bridge Laboratory. Even as Caltech's President, Millikan continued his studies of atomic phenomena and cosmic

rays. In 1932 Carl Anderson found the first antiparticle, the positron, and Charles Lauritsen launched nuclear physics experimentation in the new Kellogg Laboratory. All the research led to Willie Fowler's 1983 Nobel Prize for elucidating the nuclear pathways by which stars produce energy.


Millikan and Anderson's work on high energy cosmic rays has evolved in several directions: effort has been devoted both to detecting particles from outer space, and to High Energy Physics. Initially an on-campus effort in the Synchrotron Lab, recently the experiments have been conducted at giant accelerators off campus.

Already in the 1930's these experimental studies were backed by the theoretical efforts of Robert Oppenheimer. In the 1950's Richard Feynman and Murray Gell-Mann provided strength in the theory of high energy physics. Kip Thorne and the LIGO Project continue the tradition of astrophysical and gravitational studies.

Over the years, the Nobel Prize in Physics has gone to five Caltech Professors and to seven former Caltech students or postdoctoral fellows. Stay tuned to find out whether future prizes will be awarded in our areas of traditional strength, or in newer areas. - by Dr. Steven Frautschi





The Astronomy Department has experienced a tremendous growth in off-campus facilities. The Palomar Mountain Observatory, with the Hale and Oschin telescopes, was completed in 1969 and that was just the beginning. The Solar Observatory at Big Bear Lake was built to permit detailed solar atmospheric observation. The Owens Valley Radio Observatory, with its 40m telescope, its sixelement millimeter-wave synthesis interferometer array, its five-element interferometer for solar studies, and its 5.5m microwave background radiation telescope, allows an incredibly wide range of observing opportunities. Caltech Astronomy's latest expansion of its capabilities is the continuing construction on Mauna Kea in Hawaii. The Caltech 10m submillimeter array was completed in


1986, and the first Keck 10m optical-infrared telescope is now in operation. The second Keck telescope is due to be completed late in 1996. Members of the department have received a number of prestigious awards over the years, but Dr. Sterl Phinney explains, "since the mid-1970's, the Theoretical Astrophysics and Relativity group has held the annual Ocsi Bacsi award ceremony, which goes to the graduate student "most deeply dedicated to physics" — chosen not by faculty, but instead by the previous year's winner. The ceremony is accompanied by the annual lighting of the Bridge Annex sign, and the winner is presented the profits of the group soft-drink fund, and his name is taped to the trophy.

Kim West came to Caltech in July of 1990 to become the first Director of Residence Life. The office was located in Lloyd House for the first year and then moved to Winnett Student Center a year later. That year was an important one: an off-campus Resident Associate position was created at 150 South Chester, the Coordinator of Student Activities position became the Assistant Director of Residence Life, and Dr. David Wales became the Master of Student Houses. The residential spaces in houses offcampus have been disappearing over the years, as the houses themselves disappeared to make room for new construction. With the close of the year everyone bid the Seniors farewell and looked forward to a new crop of Freshman and Baby Burl.





















This year marked the 49th Apache in the history of Ricketts House. Originally known as the "Apache Mating Dance," it was first held in 1948. Throughout the years the mode of entrance to the dance has varied. In 1966 guests were brought in by boat. Since the early seventies party goers have been entering via the tunnels. 1974 saw the construction of the ladder which is currently in use. Despite these changes, some things have remained constant since the early days of the dance. As far back as 1950, Ricketts Rowdies wrote of "soft music, conservation of electricity, bestubbled faces, and short skirts..." The garter contest has also long been a traditional Apache activity. In the 1960's it was even supplemented with kissing and purity point contests. This year, once again Steve Sobelman MC'ed the event. Dressed in drag, Juan Carlos Nuno was measurer, an honor once belonging to the RLPL. Chris Brichford, sporting a RPN HP, served as calculator. The team of Jasmine Sekanina and Lauren Eckstein, assisted by the flagellation of Jarah Evslin and prayers of Scott Noble, walked away with first place. 
Ditch Day






























The Pot




