



What's That on the Cover?

As the editors of the yearbook, we were confronted with the challenging task of how to represent a year in the lives of eight hundred people within about 300 pages. Those choices were generally very difficult: what photographs to choose from any number of very good ones, what events to cover in a centennial year full of activities, and so on. The most difficult choice, however, was that of the theme for the whole book.

Though this was the centennial year, we did not want to make this book much of a retrospective of Caltech's last hundred years. Therefore, we chose the theme "A New Century" to simultaneously celebrate the past, mark the present, and whisper passages of the future. To complement the theme, we chose the new Millikan fountain as our cover design. The fountain is a symbol of the centennial, and yet it is also something that much of the Caltech community is ambivalent about. Under the right conditions, the fountain can be quite beautiful -- say on a balmy night with a gentle breeze to move it. At other times, perhaps on a cold, grey morning, some would call it ugly. However, upon reflection, one realizes that the past, present, and future also have many faces -- not all pleasant, but yet like the new fountain, always somewhat interesting, and forever dynamic.

Throughout this book you will see this theme continued. We have tried to give you a view of one year, tempered by some glimpses from the past and some wishes for tomorrow. A warning: not everything recorded in these pages is wonderful and pretty, but we hope that it is all close to the truth, for we have struggled to make it so.

We hope that you enjoy these memories of the 1990-1991 year and hope that when you look back at these pages, they will leave you with a taste of the mixture of the heaven and hell that make Caltech, and all the people from it, very special indeed.




Caltech Celebrates Centennial

War in the Gulf

The breakout of war in the Gulf was met with shock at Caltech. Students put work on hold to watch and listen to news broadcasts detailing the U.S. attack on Wednesday, January 16, 1991. As the initial shock and disbelief wore off, the campus split into two groups: those in support of U.S. actions, and those opposing war in the Mideast. Those opposed to war participated in antiwar demonstrations at the Federal Building and LA City Hall. Many


people on campus displayed yellow ribbons in support of U.S.

The panel, moderated by Professor Don Kevles, consisted of thirteen members, and represented a spectrum of views on the Gulf War. 






The Caltech Environmental Task Force








Shantytown

In order to bring attention to the undergraduate housing crunch, undergraduate students created Shantytown on the Olive Walk. A large incoming frosh class, the largest number of incoming transfer and 3-2 students in Caltech history, and the imminent removal of the affiliated houses along Holliston to make room for a satellite power plant and parking structure precipitated this year's housing dilemma.

Because of these problems, and a slowly increasing undergraduate population, due mainly to more five year students, the housing system was unable to provide accommodations for all the students. Some have had to find private apartments for the coming year. With an eight undergrad house still in the initial planning stages and unfunded, the problem will probably not disappear anytime soon.


Student/Faculty Conference

Some hot topics of discussion included: should there be an ATM on campus, is the honor system working, etc. Another question



This meeting provided a useful channel for students to voice their opinions. Hopefully, we will see it again next year.










The upperclassmen puzzled about the task at hand, should it be a little prank, or something far more grand?




This year, Mark Lyttle won the contest with a unique defensive device. In the final round, Mark defeated Chris Ho's device in the most thrilling match of the day.

Other contestants used various strategies to climb the rope, including several basic climbers, a few catapults that attatched to the rope and shot a piece up, a "walking climber" by Bill Swanson, and some extending lazy tongs by Annetta Papadopoulos.
There were 21 competitors in

the double elimination contest. Each device had to start in a 20 by 40 centimeter rectangle. They were given power for 30 seconds. The first device to reach the top of the rope won.






when it may go 24 hours straight!



With America at war this year in the Middle East the Y responded







As the waves of enemies constantly poured onto the Caltech shore, left full back Scott Josephson would ride them "with style", and turn them into breakers.


It was the same Scott Josephson

Korean Student Association


The Korean Student Association (KSA) boasted 25 members this year with the main goal of enhancing the social life here at Caltech.






SEDS




major milestone for us," Jack said of the USD game. "We wanted to show we could play against that caliber of program."



Water Polo Blasts Into Action





Swimmers Break Records

The Caltech men's and women's swim teams had a successful season this year. Although both teams finished in fifth place, they fought hard and showed that they had the winning spirit by consistently winning the close races. Coach Clint Dodd described this year's group as one of the toughest swim teams he has ever seen.

Leading the scoring for the men's team were seniors Barry Stipe and Dave Geraghty Stipe, the team's premiere backstroker and MVP, broke the Caltech record for the 200-yard backstroke and finished fourth in the 100-yard backstroke at finals. Geraghty, a distance freestyler, swam the gruelling 200, 500, 1000, and 1650-yard events, as well as backstroke. Also swimming dis-tance was freshman Roger Moore

and junior Tim "Mad Dog" Maddux, who was voted the Most Improved (for the second time in his career). The breaststroke was handled by senior Brian Shim and sophomores Nick Pornsinsirirak and Korhan Gurkan. Backstrokers were sophomore Dave Lande and freshman Keith Thompson, who also swam butterfly with senior Art Shmurun. Freestylers were senior Ben Masek, freshman Ellis Eckland, sophomores Alan Kulawik, and Mark Savellano, who also swam the breastroke. In addition, senior Allen Corcorran racked up the points in diving.

This year's women's swim team was one of the strongest in recent memory. They worked hard and fought tenaciously, breaking many school records. During finals, juniors Monica Holboke, Karin Johnson, Jerri Martin, and sophomore

Karen Ross shaved five seconds off the school record in the 200yard freestyle relay with a time of 1:54.31. In addition, Holboke finished fourth in the 200-yard individual medly with a time of 2:25.31. Another record was set when Holboke, Ross, Martin, and freshman Vania Lee swam the 400-yard medly relay, dropping eight seconds off the previous record set in 1979. In the 400yard freestyle relay, a third record was set when Ross, Johnson, Lee, and Holboke finished with a time of 4:12.21, three seconds off the old mark. Also swimming this season was junior Linda Ying, who was an integral part of the team. Overall, the women's swim team proved that they were a force to be reckoned with. Their determination and record-breaking performances resulted in a very impressive season.


New V-ball Team Shows Promise





Women's Tennis: A Class Act






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
Welcome to Blacker House, Frosh. It's Not What You Expected!



The second question is often useful for answering the first one. I'd lead the freshman over to our photo display case and say, "Look, would we do all these crazy things if we were on drugs?"




With no Interhouse party, Fleming organized the first multi-house party of the year. Traditional activities followed, including B—r & Bowling and then Wine and Candlelight.

The freshmen - well, they're new to all of this. Given time and a little work, they, too, will someday be able to say, "When I was a frosh..."


















































Lloyd House Commitment to Excellence


provides a hammock for visitors. Admission is free.



Things gradually returned to normal and everyone got ready for the long year of work ahead of them, with only a few minor distractions...




































The highlight of the year, however, was the First Annual Alley Olympics. Alleys competed in a total of nine events, three per term, in an attempt to win honor and glory.

Pre-frosh weekend? Pre-frosh Party, featuring the last concert of that amazing Page House band "Fistful of Yen."



The Diaries of a Post-Holocaust Survivor

[ed. note- These papers were found in a locked metal box which was discovered after the fighting had ended. The author shall probably remain forever unknown, but we surmise from other eyewitness reports of the Technocratic War that it accurately conveys the attitude of the common foot soldier serving on the rebel side.]

I remember the fall of 1990. I remember the new draftees, looking sharp in their black battle fatigues and gray combat lasers, taking the places of those lost forever. They seemed prepared, determined, but younger than ever to my worn body. And I've only served two and a half years—the grizzled four year veterans are nearly as distant from me as I am from the frosh.



Surace scrounged up a decent band and the troops were able to take their mind off of the war. But the next day found us fighting even harder in an attempt to retain ground.

It was of no use. An assault tank and demolition squad penetrated the outer curtain defenses and razed half of Zone Holliston. We were forced to relinquish 317, a prime safezone, to our sister unit in the Dabney sector. Anticipating less room in the barracks next season, Lt. Cof. Sobolman imposed strict rates regarding residence within the defended barracks. Some of us will be forced to brave the a nuclear wilds in order to survive, a prospect dismaying even to those who have never run the vicious Marks gauntlet,

Spring proved to be no better than the bitter winter. As the rains began coming down a roving attack 'bot ambushed Sgt. Wagner while he was on recon to Las Vegas. No trace of him or his assault vehicle was found. But in a daring raid we recovered Biery from the clutches of the Tennessee prison camp where he had languished for three months. Pfc. Rothenberg took him under her wing to nurse him back to health.

The high note of the season came when we assembled enough troops to mount an attack upon the Technocracy fortress that had R been the houses. Quickly assaulting the fortifications and helped by a thunderous rainsform, we emerged, dripping, and surprised at the light casualties. The enemy was completely demoralized.


Historian's Note: This is my second year doing the yearbook section, and it was certainly an interesting set of events that took place.

ASCIT Formal: A Special Evening


May 10th was a special night for many couples as they dressed up in their finest and paraded through the Olive Walk on their way to the Athenaeum and the annual ASCIT Formal.






California Tech, May 24, 1991




International Day


generally left no stone unturned to ensure the Chief's safe arrival.


Security was tight as expected. Everybody had to go through metal detectors, and all items carried in had to be hand-inspected.







Some of the League's contributions to the Caltech community this last year includes:

Freshman Parent's Day

In cooperation with the Institute, the Service League sponsors a freshman parent's day, an orientation program to introduce freshman parents to the Caltech community. This all-day event features a panel discussion, lunch, a tour of the campus, and a tea.

Student Activities

The League gives financial aid to student groups such as the Glee Club, various instrumental groups, the ASCIT drama production, the California Tech, the little t, the Big T, and the Caltech Y.

Decompression Evenings

In cooperation with the Caltech Y, the Service League has helped with "Decompression Evenings," an open house in Winnett Student Center during each of the final examination periods. All students are invited to take a break from study, and drop in for conversation, music, games, and a snack. The Service League gives a financial donation toward the supply of food, such as milk, fresh fruit, and vegetables.

Thanksgiving Dinners

Each undergraduate and graduate student house is given funds for a complete Thanksgiving Dinner.

Christmas Boxes

Large, decorative boxes laden with home baked goods, nuts, fruit, and food staples are given to all student houses at Christmastime.

Well Baby Clinic

For students, postdocs, and research fellows with families, a well baby clinic is available for children up to the age of two years. Checkups and immunizations may be received for a nominal fee.

Baby Furniture

Students may borrow cribs, strollers, and other equipment needed by their small children. If the supply is large enough, research fellows and visitors to the Institute may also use this equipment.

Plant and Bake Sale

To augment its income, the Service League holds an annual Plant and Bake Sale.
