"There is room for organizing on the part of engineers in order to better their position as professional men, but this is best to be accomplished by organizations of their own as distinguished from existing labor unions."




Picture 4: The General Staff poses for candid informal shot on palace steps. (Rumplemeier would not be seen with them.) Peon shoveling in background remains unidentified.

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

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
