The drive will be under the direction of Dave MacKenzie, general chairman; Bill Muehlberger, Dick Roehm, Doug Dethelesen, Bob Barraclough, Pat Glover and Rube Kachadorian.

Why Contribute to the Y?
Over 90 per cent of the student body benefits directly by Y services or activities. It is the only organization on campus dedicated to meeting the personal and spiritual needs of students.

Through its sponsorship are available the capacity-crowded luncheon clubs. The Y provides a program of forums throughout the year that range from current events to sex. Frye Discusses Marriage, Sex

Mrs. C. Brooks Frye, prefacing her lecture with the assurance that "you can't reason with women!", held forth on "The Factor of Sex in the Healthy Marriage" last Monday evening in the Y's second Sex Forum.

Mrs. Frye's main thesis was that sex in marriage is largely an expression of all the attitudes in which husband and wife are related. Conversely most sexual troubles arise from resentments, dissatisfaction, worries and fears which may be extraneous.

The American Institute of Family Relations counselor urged all men to cast out ideas that sex is dirty or unhealthy or to be denied. Mrs. Frye insisted that active, healthy sex activities are invariably reflected in success on the intellectual level.

Much time was given to a discussion of the Kinsey report, which assertedly will provide much helpful information for marriage counselling.

Fifteen Schools Debate at Tech Beaver Orators Place Fourth

Friday Banquet Features Talk by Max Mason, Second Half of Tourney Slated for UCLA

Competing against fifteen California colleges from San Diego to Stockton and over 100 debate teams, Caltech debaters last Friday and Saturday surged into the win column to take second-place honors in the senior division and third place in the novice division in the annual Caltech debate tournament. Leo Breiman and Stan Boicourt, the senior division team, shared second place with S.C., while the novice team of George Brown and Clem Savant met a three-way split with U.C.L.A. and S.C.

Fourth in Tournament

First place was awarded to U.C.L.A. in both the individual team prize and in tournament rating. Caltech placed fourth in the tournament, being surpassed only by the larger schools, S.C. and L.A.C.C. Dr. Schutz, Caltech debate coach, stated that he was very well pleased with the results of the tournament inasmuch as the senior teams won 75 per cent of their debates, thus defeating all other colleges of comparable size. Subject of the debate, which remains the same for the school year, was, "Resolved That a World Federal Government Should Be Established."

Athenum Banquet

Initiating a new event in debate tournaments, a banquet was

given Friday night in the Athenum which featured Dr. Max Mason, Caltech professor, as guest speaker. Dr. Mason, in his talk, "The Way of Science," urged the use of the scientific method in the solution of the world's political and social problems where we so often abandon truth and reason for prejudice.

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"Y" Poll Reveals Conservative Trend Among CIT Students

In a well-timed preliminary event to its fund-raising drive, Harold Stassen emerged as the Presidential candidate favored most by students, although any Republican except Taft easily could defeat President Truman, in a poll of the undergraduate student body, conducted by the Caltech Y on some of the more important aspects of National Affairs, and student participation in the program offered by the "Y."

The results on student participation in the "Y" program indicate that the most popular is the Sunday Firesides, with 29.2%; while the Monday night Forums are a close second with 28.2%

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News-worthy Notes for Engineers

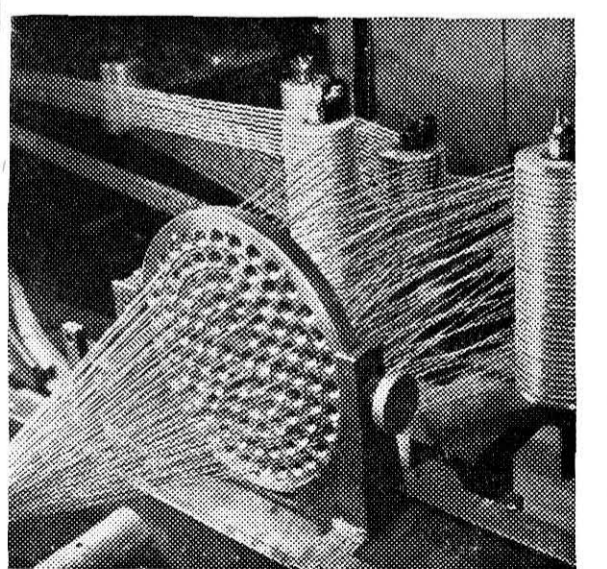


“Merry-go-round” speeds telephone dial governors

Most production lines in Western Electric plants follow standard practices, but often it is advantageous to custom-tailor an assembly line to do a specific job better. To control the mass production of delicate telephone dial governors to exacting standards, Western Electric engineers designed this “merry-go-round” conveyor with its ingenious assembly fixtures. It both simplifies the operation and reduces the time of assembly.

Cable at the “Cross Roads”

This “Cross Roads” guide plate through which pulp-insulated wires are rushing, keeps the wires in their proper relative position while being twisted into units of 101 pairs before being fashioned into a telephone cable. The wires passing through the guide plate to the flyer strander are kept at a uniform tension by means of a torque motor and a very sensitive control device at each of the 101 supply reels. Designed by Western Electric engineers, this mechanism prevents defects by keeping the wires from being stretched as they move along.



Engineering problems are many and varied at Western Electric, where manufacturing telephone and radio apparatus for the Bell System is the primary job. Engineers of many kinds—electrical, mechanical, industrial, chemical, metallurgical—are constantly working to devise and improve machines and processes for mass production of highest quality communications equipment.

Clean Sweep Lifts Dabney to Fourth Place

By taking a clean sweep of all of their eight games, Dabney bowlers moved out of the cellar of the interhouse league this week. Adding to their glory, Dabney's No. 2 team fired a hot 2132 series, high for the week. Meanwhile Throop was winning 6 games; Ricketts, 3; Blacker, 2; and Fleming only 1. At the half-way mark in the league, the standings now read: Throop, 46; Fleming, 34; Ricketts, 31; Dabney, 26, and Blacker, 23.

Feature attraction of the day was the terrific game rolled by Dan Markoff of Dabney. Starting with nine pins in his first frame, he proceeded to pound the wood with eight perfect consecutive strikes. Tapering off with nine pins again in the last frame, he wound up with 244, by far the highest game yet. According to Dan, the highest game he had ever rolled before was 204.

Three Bowl Over 200
Several other 200 games were rolled by Tech's keglers this week, including Carl Fox of Ricketts with 210, Ray Heggland of Throop with 210, and Bill Root of Ricketts with 207. Heggland took individual series honors with 507, only series of the day over 500.

Trailing 40 to 31 with just two and a half minutes remaining in the game, the Engineers turned on the heat and scored nine points while holding Redlands scoreless, thus forcing the game into an overtime with the score tied, 40 to 40.

Goon Sparks Rally

Paul Saltman, who scored 13 points to keep in the running for the league individual scoring crown, started the Beaver rally by hitting a short jump shot. Jay Montgomery added two more on a one-hander from just outside the foul line, but the Beavers still trailed, 40 to 35, with scarcely more than a minute to play.

Foil Stalling Tactics

Redlands tried to stall out the remaining time, but Don Furth, back in the lineup after missing the last three games, stole the ball and passed to Bob Stokely, who brought the score to 40 to 37 with a long shot. Redlands again stalled, but Saltman was fouled while on defense and his swishing free-throw made it 40-38. However, there were but 28 seconds left in the game at this point. Again Redlands was unable to keep the ball from the aggressive Tech forwards, and, with eight seconds left, Tex Bass tied the score with an unbelievable two-handed jump shot from the back of the key.

The Beavers continued their scoring surge into the overtime with baskets by Furth and Bass against a single Redlands free throw, giving them a 44-to-41 lead.
