






A year had gone by after Brown's departure and Caltech still had no president. In October of 1979 Goldberger was inaugurated as the third president of the institute.

























Running At Caltech










his was an excellent year for running at Caltech, both in intercollegiate competition and other activities.


September found the cross-country team with a solid summer of training behind them, and no freshmen in the top five for the first time in years. As a direct result of this increase in contract on the warrity grand. Caltech rolled with a 125

in experience on the varsity squad, Caltech rolled up a 13-5 record, the most wins by any cross-country team in school history.

After having been solidly beaten by Cal Lutheran in the first race of the year, a rematch on the home course proved to be the high point of the season. Glen George led a 2-3-5-6-10 Caltech finish to avenge the loss and raise the team's record to 9-2.

Archrival Claremont bounced back from two earlier defeats to edge us by four points at the SCIAC race, but it








wasn't enough to dislodge Tech from third place in the final standings. At the end of the season, the varsity squad was composed of (in order) Bourret, George, Holmes, Gould, Korevaar, Field, and McClain. Rob Bourret was given the Paul Barthel Award, while Bill Gould and Eric Korevaar were named most improved. Eric was elected to be the team captain.

January came, and so did the second Santa Monica Beach Flick, as twelve hardy souls ran the 30 miles from Pasadena to the Pacific. For the third year, Saturday nights with a full moon brought steeplechasers onto the streets and over the hedges of San Marino. Increasing numbers of Techers took part in the AAU road races and marathons.

Participation in the Interhouse Track and Field Meet in February was up over last year, in spite of the fact that Ricketts was disqualified. Page took the meet easily, winning 9 of 10 running events and setting 5 new records in the process. Greg Blaisdell set the other new record, clearing 6'1" in the high jump.




n spite of a lack of depth in the field events, and attrition during the long season, the track team won its last 5 meets in a row to finish with a 7-5 record. At the SCIAC finals, the mile relay squad broke through the 3:30 barrier to take first, and the team tied with Redlands for fifth place. Jim Quillian won the 400m at district, as rival Redlands nipped Tech by a point.

The high point man was Mark Morisset, who competed in the pole vault. The horizontal jumps, and a variety of sprints. Decathlete Brian Sutula was the other mainstay in the field events (shot put, discus, javelin, etc.) while Greg Blaisdell had a best high jump of 6'4".

Speedster Jim "Q" Quilliam ran on both relays and set a new school record with a 48.3" 400m. Veteran John Hattick also ran both relays, and had team best times in the 100m and 200m. Hurdles ace Norm Murray was lost to an injury, but not before contributing many valuable points.

Goldsworthy Award winner Rob Bourret ran a 3:58.1 1500m, and Lewis Collins had an outstanding freshman season in both the 400m intermediate hurdles (58.3) and 800m (1:56.3). Bill Gould broke his own 3,000m steeplechase record by 25 seconds with a 9:55.9.





There than came to pass the feast day of the Relay and ne'er before had such assemblage gathered about the Endless Oval.

t is said of the Eighth Light Regiment that they heed not the threshold of pain. The simply run until their feet quit cooperating. Thirteen hours into the relay Bruce Bills suggested that the whole team cart him in the whirlpool for the next mile. Down to seven runners meant no time for sleep, no time for recovery. Warmdowns blended into warmups. The survivors covered 30 miles to pull KELROF up to 261 miles, 122 yards.

The call of the Cripples was sounded and from afar there came Da Wabbit and Mukai who led the Crutchless Ones over the 200 mile wall and into 24-hour relay history. Caltech Cripples w/o Crutches III: 214 miles, 1110 yards.

Page House Relay dominance was challenged by Ten Moles (211 miles, 340 yards) led by Larry Doolitle, and the leaderless Good Guys (201 miles) of Lloyd who can still be seen wandering down the Walk of Olives. Ruddock's KMRIA (196 miles, 920 yards) under Wheels Wheeler explained that they certainly had no potential and thus all their energy must be kinetic. Page's Super Frosh Plus (206 miles, 1052 yards) set new standards in using upperclassmen, while the No Names set the eight man, one woman record with 205 miles, 1115 yards. Quoth Andy Hunter: "Next year let's have a bridge tournament."








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BLACKER HOUSE










The third term crazies struck in full force.






Above. Up the Millikan elevator. 210 cubic feet of snow waiting for Dr. Martel.


