Tech Speakers to Include Bernard Rudin, Leo Breiman Ulrich Merten, Ray Brow, John Rogers, George Brown

Caltech speakers will exercise their vocal cords this Saturday at a Speech Events Tournament on the UCLA campus. The tournament, co-sponsored by Caltech and UCLA, will feature discussion groups and extemporaneous speeches on such current world and national problems as American rights and Civil Liberties and European affairs.

Caltech speakers will be Bernard Rudin, Leo Breiman, Ulrich Merten, Ray Brow, John Rogers, George Brown, Ralph Stone, Ollie Gardiner, and others of the speech squad.

**Valley of Decision**  
Rudin will enter the oration that won him second prize at the Pepperdine Tournament: "The Valley of Decision," about the TVA. Rudin and Brown will also try to retain the first places won at the College of Pacific in Extemporaneous and Impromptu speaking.

The UCLA Tourney forms the second part of the Annual Caltech-UCLA Speech Events Tournament. The first part was held at Caltech two weeks ago and featured debating.

**Future Events**  
Other contests programmed for the speech squad include a tournament at Bakersfield College in which Dr. John Schutz, Caltech debate coach, will direct senior division debating; the Western States Tourney, to be held at Redlands this March; and a series of Oxy assembly debates to be held there the last of February.

**Breiman Wins**  
Bringing home new laurels for the Tech Speechers was Leo Breiman, who was recently awarded third place cup in the Los Angeles County March of Dimes Oratory Contest. He spoke on the life of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

## Conger Peace Prize Rules Announced

Rules for the Conger Peace Prize have been announced by Dr. John Schutz. The contest was established in 1912 by Reverend E. L. Conger for the promotion of world and industrial peace.

Fifty dollar first and twenty-five second dollar prizes will be offered for the best orations on these topics. Contestants will present their speeches before a student body assembly, to be held later this year.

### Rules

Following are the rules for the contest: 1. Any regular student of the four undergraduate classes may enter; 2. Orations should be the original work of the students competing, without more than an hour's assistance from any faculty member; 3. The time of delivery should not exceed ten minutes; 4. Manuscripts are not to exceed 1200 words and should be memorized; 5. Manuscripts are to be presented to John A. Schutz, Dabney Hall by April 15, 1949.

## Congress Activities Discussed by Y

The Caltech Y Radio Roundtable is looking forward to an interesting set of domestic affairs topics arising from the governmental programs being proposed before the new Congress. On Wednesday, Feb. 16, at 9:45 p.m. on station KPPC two or three speakers will discuss the Administration's proposals for a national health insurance program. The question of whether such a program is needed, how comprehensive it should be, its expense, and the views of organized medicine will be covered.

### Future Topics

Future programs will probably include such questions as domestic spending, public housing, future valley authorities, and other such issues up for decision in Washington. The Roundtable will continue to do programs on foreign and local affairs topics. The most recent broadcast on Jan. 19 dealt with the Indonesian dispute, while the program before that was on local public transportation problems.

The Roundtable is still urgently in need of new speakers for its programs, especially among the lower classmen and Juniors. This radio activity deserves to be perpetuated at Tech and must have leaders in future years. These programs offer plenty of opportunity to develop quick thinking and good speaking ability.

Any nominations yet to be made before the assembly should be given to Stan Barnes, ASCIT President, or any member of the Board of Directors. Nominations can be made from the floor during the meeting, but it is desirable that the candidates be known before the assembly. The nominations for any office will be considered open until thirty seconds after the last nomination for that office. The nominations for this office are then considered closed unless there is only one candidate. In this case the nominations remain open for one week.

### Campaigning

For one week following the Nominations Assembly there will be no official campaigning or public election activity on campus. At the end of this week the final list of nominees will be posted on the ASCIT bulletin board in

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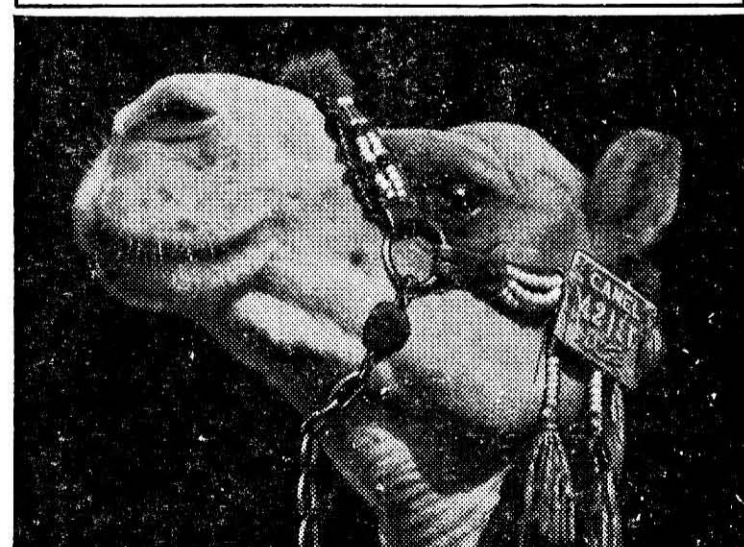

than you could possibly have made in your own contract. Then, when you double, it will be understood as a message that, at the moment, it seems to you that your best bet seems to lie in setting them. Of course you still reserve the right to change your mind later.

There is a simple set of rules available for your partner in deciding whether or not to leave the double in. They are based on his holding in the opponents' trump suit. With three or more, leave it in, even with a weak opening bid. With two, leave it in, holding three or more honor tricks. With a singleton, take it out unless holding at least three and one-half honor tricks. And with a void, take out the double regardless of honor count.
