Over in Korea, the government is supplying the soldiers with almost everything they need for fighting a war: guns, tanks, ammunition, airplanes, playing cards, chess sets, chewing gum, cigarettes, candy bars, etc. All of these things come out of taxes; but there is one thing that cannot be supplied out of taxes. Neither chemists, biologists nor government economists have figured out a way of getting blood from money. The only way that blood can be supplied to those men who need it is to take it out of the arms of people here.

On Monday, December 1, the Red Cross Bloodmobile will be here on campus. Nearly everyone here at Caltech can give blood if they will take the time and trouble. Last year Caltech bled so generously that there was trouble keeping the blood in the truck that came.

Remember that all donations are credited to the Caltech Group Participation Plan so that if anyone from Caltech needs blood he withdraws from the account just like a bank.

When the bloodmobile comes let's all be good bloodhounds; let's bleed for the ladies!

Caltech, as a privately endowed institution, is forced to maintain the respect and approval of the community for its existence. Can it afford to support a pastime which lends itself so easily to unfavorable publicity and local vilipendency? The only road left open to the Board of Directors is to renounce this spectacular exhibition which has become little more than a perfunctory annual obligation.

Will the panacean excuse of "tradition" maintain an activity which has been proved --- even more this year than in the past -to be potentially dangerous to the Institute, or will Caltech, under the leadership of the Board of Directors, remove their support and place instead its disapproval on this disadvantageous diversion—just as it has done with the policy of raiding —before it is too late?
