Expire

When the jobless benefits program was established by the Servicemens' Readjustment Act of 1944, Congress specified that rights to unemployment pay would expire two years after termination of the war. President Truman proclaimed July 25, 1947, as the official end of the war, which automatically fixed July 25, 1949 as the expiration date for servicemen's readjustment allowances.

The Caltech office of veterans' affairs is cooperating fully in advising veterans of their future rights to benefits. Any veteran who enlisted under the Voluntary Recruitment Act or who had service both before and after July 25, 1947 and is in doubt as to his rights may discuss his case with the readjustment allowance specialist at room 118 Throop.

Honor System

(This is the last in a series of three articles on the Honor System in the California Tech.)

The following is a sample case of an Honor System violation taken from the records of the Board of Control. The names of the individuals concerned will, of course, be withheld.

The first account of the suspected violation came to the Board of Control from a Physical Chemistry instructor who reported that, on a home examination which was to be done independently, Mr. A. and Mr. B. turned in papers that showed at least a dozen points of unusual similarity. Although the instructor admitted it might be a coincidence, he strongly suspected cheating.

A meeting was called and Mr. A. was sworn in to testify. After having been presented with the findings of the Board, he stated that he had done the examination individually in the Chemistry library. Asked whether Mr. B. could have copied his work, Mr. A. recalled that he had left his exam on the library table for an hour while he went out to lunch but he did not think Mr. B. would have copied it.

Mr. A. was dismissed and Mr. B. sworn in. Having been presented with the facts, Mr. B. at first denied copying from Mr. A When, however, during the questioning of Mr. B. by members of the Board he became aware of certain inconsistencies in his story, Dance Decorations he broke down and confessed he had copied directly from Mr. A's paper in the library. He further stated that the whole thing had been prearranged with Mr. A. When asked why he had cheated, he said he was on the verge of flunking out.

Mr. B's roommate was then sworn in and he stated that Mr B's grades were very poor and that he had suspected him of collaborating with Mr. A. on home exams before. Inasmuch as he could give no concrete evidence to back up his statement, Mr. B's roommate was dismissed.

When called back in, Mr. A. stuck to his story that he had not given Mr. B. permission to copy from his home exam. However, testimonies from two other class members to the effect that they had seen Mr. A. and Mr. B. openly collaborating on home exams in previous instances, convinced the Board of Mr. A's guilt.

For his flagrant violation of the Honor System, Mr. B. received an "F" in the course and was expelled for good from the Institute.

For giving unauthorized help to Mr. B., Mr. A. received an "F" in the course and was put on probation for the remainder of his undergraduate years.



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

Who Dealt This Mess By Carl Fox

It often happens that the most important play of the hand, from the defensive standpoint, is the opening lead. This week's hand illustrated the point. Par is for East-West to set the game contract of North-South.



East cannot possible lead Spades, and Clubs are not at all attractive. Diamonds are a possibility, but have little to recomment them. The definite raise in Hearts by South plus the holding of three by East indicates that no damage will be done to partner by a Heart lead. Another consideration enters in, since North has bid two suits he is probably short in one of the other two. Since South is obviously short in Spades, there is a strong possibility of a cross ruff. The lead of a Heart will cut down this possibility.

Facing a Heart opening, North has but one play for the contract, he must attempt the cross ruff. Any other approach leaves him at least one trick short, viewing the situation optimistically. But to do this he must void his hand in Clubs. This allows East to get on lead again with the Ace, and the lead of another trump leaves Declarer without even a prayer for his contract.

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
