

speak and be heard at faculty board meetings. The President is a point of contact with administration, along with the IHC chair, one of the first opinions they ask for, and a frequent member of ad hoc meetings and committees.

The election for ASCIT President, as well as for most ASCIT offices, is little more than a popularity contest. A good deal of ASCIT officers have been friendly faces who said nice things at House dinners in the week leading up to the election. But how many times had you seen them before? How many times since? Officers have often failed to stay connected to the people they claimed to represent. Regardless of what you think of their Houses, we can all agree that there is something inherently wrong with holding an office tasked with representing the campus while only interacting with one's own House. As the construction of Bechtel continues, this year's President will have a large role in discussions on the most fundamental aspects of student life, so make sure they understand your life.

Let me be clear, I don't want to be ASCIT President. I won't even be here beyond fall term. This is about making a statement, and hopefully, a difference. If you do, for some reason, decide to elect me, I'll do what I've always done:



work hard for the student body to make this place better in whatever ways I can. Those of you have have known me, who have seen me work for this campus, have seen me fight for the students here, will know that that's a genuine promise. One that I'll keep not because it got me elected, but because that kind of service is as core and vital to me as the beat of my heart or the breath of my lungs. 

We, as undergraduates, owe it to ourselves to protect our own interests in light of the changes being brought to Caltech. We can do so by electing student government officials who will listen to us, and make our voices heard to administration. This is exactly what I would do as ASCIT President. I plan on regularly publishing updates on issues concerning undergraduates, and hosting office hours, during which students are encouraged to bring up issues they would like addressed, and voice their concerns.

To achieve this, first, I will create more forums for productive conversation; for example, small group lunches with administrators in Student Affairs (in addition to the current town halls). Secondly, I would create a committee to work with the Caltech Alumni Association to gain a better understanding of the Caltech undergraduate experience, and how it has evolved in time. Most importantly, I will bring complete transparency to this process by publicizing the timeline for these decisions, who is making the decisions, and what conversations are being had about Bechtel.



Let's take charge of our campus.

The recent reforms to the UCC (soon to be Peer Advocate) program is the result of a several yearlong effort to strengthen the mental health network. The program will standardize the role and selection of students functioning as supportive resources and provide access to a more in-depth training; this is meant to address an apparent lack of confidence in the UCC program. However, this program fails to take into consideration the very



different, and important roles UCCs currently play in the Houses. As ASCIT President, I would work with the IHC, Head UCCs, RAs, RLCs, and the Counseling Center, to determine the unique needs that UCCs meet in each house, and further refine the Peer Advocate program to meet these needs without sacrificing the improvements to the program.

Finally, I would like to address concerns about career support for undergraduates in all fields. During the most recent Student Faculty Conference, the Industry Opportunities Committee recommended creating formal student committees to liaise with the Caltech Career Development Center and Caltech Alumni Association, and the formalization of mentorship programs within the Caltech community. As President, I would work closely with the Academic Review Committee to see these projects through to

I have had the privilege of serving the student body since I first became involved with ASCIT my frosh year. In that time, I have developed the strong, longstanding relationships with members of administration necessary to being an effective President. But most importantly, I hope I have demonstrated my commitment to improving student life. If elected, I would continue to devote my time and energy to serving the undergraduate community.

ARC Chair: Role and Responsibilities

With ASCIT elections coming up soon, I figured I'd write a short piece about what the ARC chair does and what (in my mind) are good traits for the position. As ARC chair, I've been pulled into a lot of miscellaneous tasks that I wasn't expecting (like moving pies and carting a thousand cardboard boxes). Nonetheless, the job of ARC chair can mostly be reduced into two areas: running the ARC and communicating with faculty.

Managing the ARC boils down to making sure the ARC runs the programs that it is responsible for and distributing the work among members. The ARC is in charge of a menagerie of programs course including concerns, software seminars, student faculty lunches, ASCIT teaching awards, and the option fair. The ARC chair is responsible for getting members to run these programs, but also for finding tasks that will interest the people on the ARC. Delegating tasks while ensuring that everything gets done is one of the key challenges of the job. Paying attention to details without micromanaging is another tricky balancing act.

The ARC chair is simultaneously the ASCIT Vice President of Academic Affairs, and is the primary student representative to faculty on academic issues. The ARC chair sits on the Council on Undergraduate Education, regularly meets with the deans, and often serves on academic faculty board committees. While ARC chair, I've also been included in discussions about academic issues such as the TQFR deadline when these topics sprung up.

Since the ARC chair regularly interfaces with faculty members, communication is an essential skill. I've realized as ARC chair that there's a large gulf of information between students and faculty. There are faculty concerns that students are oblivious about, and vice versa. An effective ARC chair needs to be able to learn and understand the position of faculty members, while clearly articulating student views and concerns. Students and faculty both want students to succeed academically, and this common goal can help smooth potential disagreements.

The ARC chair has the power to guide the direction of the ARC and shape campus wide discussions. My biggest goal for the ARC has been better

communication between students and faculty, in both directions. In the student to faculty direction, I've emphasized using survey data as a starting point for discussions and producing written reports that can be easily distributed. In the opposite direction, the ARC runs a mailing list that students can sign up for news about meetings with administrators and potential academic changes. After the election, I'll be stepping aside as ARC Chair and retiring to my log cabin in the sub-basement of Moore. The ARC Chair that follows will have the chance to create their own agenda and develop their own vision for the ARC.


Social Director Candidate

I've organized some of the more personal events that the ARC puts on like the Option Fair, argued for undergrads on topics like freshman pass/ fail policies in front of faculty committees, and even helped run the ARC as an interim secretary. What really matters, though, is that I have good ideas that I know can improve life for undergrads, along with the experience and persistence to get them done. Here are just a couple of the things that I'd do as the next ARC chair:

-Fix Registration: In my opinion, our current registration system is not only inconvenient but fundamentally flawed. In the last few weeks, I've already initiated an effort that combines both students and faculty/administration to help revamp the entire registration

with the Vice Provost, Cindy Weinstein, as well as the Center for Teaching, Learning and Outreach (CTLO). With the CTLO, I have also helped resolve issues such as a lack of office hours and vague collaboration policies through the ARC's Course Concerns Subcommittee.

As an At-Large Rep this year, I continue to work on these projects and also serve on the Curriculum Committee (CC). -Realizing goals from the Student-Faculty Conference such as **adding CS1 to core and revising Ma3.**

-Increase Access to Faculty: Even with our small community, sometimes it's hard to get to interact personally with profs. track & field in final tune-up

PASADENA (Apr. 8, 2017) - Caltech track & field contested its final tune-up meet before heading into the thick of championship season at the Pomona-Invitational on Saturday.

Only a partial squad attended, yet the Beavers still managed to record their fair share of personal-best times, with some inching up program Top 10 lists.

Sophomore Melissa Gutierrez slid up one spot into eighth all-time with a 2:29.47 in the 800-meter run. She and classmate Michelle Marasigan placed ninth and 10th, respectively, among SCIAC competitors in the field, where at least partial squads from eight institutions attended.

Rookie Alexa Lauinger improved in both the discus (two feet) and hammer throw (three feet) while working on enhanced techniques in each to set herself up well for the SCIAC Championships. Senior Lucy Chen made a big gain the long jump, leaping a seasonbest 14 feet, 3.25 inches that leaves her just

8.25 inches shy of her PR. She also ran her fastest 200-meter dash in two years at 31.49, with senior Alison Lui making a solid longawaited debut in both the 100m and 200m.

On the men's side, freshman Jesse Cai lopped off another .52 in the 400m for a 51.37, which places him just outside the top 20 times in the SCIAC this spring. Junior Alex Bourzutschky finally made a big leap in the 200m, chopping off more than a second to pull within just .58 of his personal best, while freshman Alex Lettenberger continued to make significant gains in his sprints, trimming .31 in the 200m. Rookie Tim Krasnoperov finished in third among SCIAC competitors in the discus despite not quite reaching his PR, while both freshman David Fager and junior Chris Haack shaved about a second in the 800m. Freshman Gianmarco Terrones made his return from ankle injury in the 800m, running the third-fastest race on the team this spring at 2:01.92.

"It is exciting to see our sprinters continue to drop large chunks of time," Head Coach Ben Raphelson said. "We're getting to see their hard work in practice pay off."

The rest of the team, particularly in singles play, came within a few games of securing more points for the Beavers. Top singles player Ruthwick dropped a close match to regional No. 18 Graham Maassen (7-6[2], 6-2) while freshman Miha Valencic fell in similar fashion (7-6 [3], 6-0) at #3. Fellow freshman Connor Soohoo won the first set in his #4 match, but ultimately sucummbed to Quinn Hirsohn in a super tiebreaker (3-6, 6-3, 10-6).

Fellow junior David Watson also lifted the Beavers with three hits of his own. In a continued theme from the prior game however, Caltech came up short in scoring opportunities, this time

stranding 12 runners on base. The Beavers did outhit the Panthers 13-12 and had they picked up a couple more the narrative for this game might have been drastically different. The Beavers also held a two-run lead at one point thanks to three-run fourth inning which saw first baseman Watson, along with outfielders Kai Kirk and David Adams score. Right fielder Harrison Jacobs also came perhaps a few feet away from his

Senior John Galden relieved Krop and limited the damage, pitching three innings of one-run ball.

Caltech had its least amount of success in the second game of Saturday's doubleheader, though there were still positives to take away from the experience. Garrett Levine picked up two more hits to finish the series a cool 6-for-13 at the plate. His season average up now sits at .255, perhaps an indication that his slow start to the season is behind him. Mark Burleson also had two hits for the Beavers along with his third stolen base of the season. David Watson and freshman Alex Corado also registered hits.





Dear Prefrosh,

Ifyou're reading this, it's because you got in--congratulations! Maybe Caltech has been your dream school for years, or maybe somewhere else has and you're visiting for the hell of it or because you got a free trip out here. Whether you're sure you want to come here or sure you don't, or somewhere in the middle, it's worth giving it some deeper thought.

I've been at this place since 2012, and I'd say I've gotten to know it pretty well. Caltech is fundamentally a unique place, not the way that other schools claim to be unique. I mean genuinely, undeniably, one-of-a-kind. This isn't necessarily praise, some aspects of the school's uniqueness are... less than ideal. But the simple truth is that you will never have an opportunity to have an experience like you'd have here.

Houses and the Honor Code. In the Houses, almost everyone here finds a home. They provide community, support, guidance, friendship, and so, so much more. Houses are the defining feature of undergraduate culture and have huge effect on who you spend time with, how you spend your time, and how you grow at this school. They provide unique cultures and a level of community that you will

struggle to find elsewhere. House membership is a thing you keep for life, and whenever you meet a Techer in the outside world, the first question you'll ask each other will be, "What House are you in?"

The other aspect, the Honor Code, works to such an incredible degree. You'll see, all over campus, evidence of the Honor Code and the way it sculpts daily life. Doors left open, laptops left out, sets handed to friends to turn in. Life is so much easier and richer when you can inherently trust one another. Most exams you take here are take home, allowing you to work them in better into your schedule and take them in an environment that's much less stressful than it otherwise would be. Most of my friends at other schools automatically assume take home exams mean we all cheat, but the reality is that honesty is the norm here. We hold each other accountable and live in a culture that holds the Honor Code above almost anything else.

These two things synergize in There are many parts of this fantastic and myriad ways. Finding culture that I love—chiefly the someone to work with is as easy as walking down to your lounge. Work is always collaborative, not competitive. You can work freely with other people without worrying about cheating or sabotage. Learning becomes much more of a shared endeavor. The teaching quality here is often poor, but your friends will often make up for what your professors fail to teach you. There's an element to that selflessness, helping one's peers

without a goal of personal gain, that's just so hard to find elsewhere.

Now, I'm not trying to tell you that Caltech is some magical utopia. It hurts. It hurts in ways you can't yet imagine. All your life, your teachers have probably been telling you, "Wait until next year, things are going to get hard." and they never did. But believe me, Caltech is hard. You will struggle. You will get grades lower than you ever have before. You will have to redefine your image of yourself and how you derive self-worth. You will want to give up and quit, but in all likelihood, you will persist. Because if you got in here, you have a level of drive and resilience far above the

There will be times when you feel you can't get everything done. You won't be able to "make time" like you did in high school by losing an hour of sleep or cutting out your daily Reddit crawl- you'll have 20 hours worth of work and it'll be due in 12 hours. The teaching will often be unhelpful, especially in core classes. You'll have sets that seem to have nothing to do with the material that was taught, and exams that seem unrelated to either. But sometimes you'll have professors who still inspire you, who fill you with excitement about the course, and it'll remind you why you came here. They'll learn your name, make sure you're learning, and advise you on your life, both academically and otherwise.

administration too. you'll find, is often much less helpful than you've been lead to believe. Many will not show that dedication to individual attention and compassion that you've been told is a hallmark of this place. You'll butt up against policies that were written in broad strokes and designed to avoid having to deal with students. But sometimes you'll also meet people who will bend the rules in your favor, because they are fundamentally there to aid in your success. People who show you compassion when you most need it, and that's a feeling of such warmth I cannot describe.

So maybe you want this. Maybe you want the communities, the trust, the quirkiness and nerdiness. But know that that also comes with pain, with struggle, with a blow to your ego that will leave you staggering for years. There are a lot of people who will paint Caltech too rosily when they talk to you. I'm not saying not to come here, but come here for the right reasons and know what you're getting into. Admissions likes to talk about Caltech as a place that pushes boundaries. But what often gets left out is that the boundaries push back. There's friction with the administration and a lot of tension over aspects of student life and House cultures. If you want to come here, you should want to keep the things that make Caltech unique and exceptional. I mean really want to. We only keep things if people care enough to fight for them, and we only improve if people care enough to push for a

better future, even if it won't come until after they graduate.

I came here back in 2012, and after screwing up too many classes, had to take last year off, spending it working in Cambridge and hanging around MIT. My life there was great, but I came back. I knew there were problems, even the first time (my older brother went here as well). But I came here for the people and the communities they created. Not a day went by during my time off when I didn't miss my friends or my Hovses. Hell, I even missed frosh I hadn't even met yet.

If you got in here, there's a good chance you have options. And I'm not going to overlook the fact that maybe Caltech is a lot cheaper, or closer, or any of a dozen other factors. But if you've got the choices, come here if you want the things only this place can offer. Come here if you want them enough to stand up for them. Because if all you want is prestige or warm weather or physics research, trust me, other places have those things. But no where else will you find this kind of community all across a campus. Maybe that's enough to get you to come here; it was for me-twice.
