
Dedication

Steven Frautschi is a

renowned professor of theoretical physics in the Division of Physics, Mathematics, and Astronomy. Frautschi grew up in Madison, Wisconsin, and began his impressive and inspiring string of accomplishments as the first scientist in his family. After matriculating to Harvard at the age of 16, Frautschi graduated in 1954 with a degree in Physics. He then spent an exciting year bicycling around Europe and later received a PhD from Stanford. He spent his first postdoctoral years in Japan at Hideki Yukawa's Institute for Theoretical Physics in Kyoto, and then spent two more years at UC Berkeley. These were perhaps his most important years, when he developed the "bootstrap" theory of strongly interacting particles and further used his brilliant mind to study Regge Poles. In 1962, Caltech was fortunate enough to gain Frautschi as part of its faculty.

People lucky enough to be Frautschi's student can attest to his great teaching skills, a direct effect of his worldliness, ingenuity, and great personality. From his incredible sense of style to his great instruction, Frautschi is easily a favorite of all undergraduates. Some even think he is singlehandedly responsible for starting the Converse trend in the United States. Frautschi is also a great proponent of performing arts at Caltech, donating generous sums of money to ensure that Caltech students have areat musical resources. He has contributed to Caltech in every way, even serving as Master of Student Houses in his time here. Steven Frautschi is truly an inspiration.
















altech's Biology and Biological Engineering (BBE) department focuses on the discovery of the nature of life by combining innovation and biological principles.






OASIS SHOW


PRANK CLUB Prank Club's










