More Evidence the Masses Have S@&t Taste: Reviews of "Bird Box" and "Annihilation"

January is the worst month of the year for new movie releases. All the good movies that would premiere around this time are pushed up to December so they can be fresh and relevant for the Oscars season. All that's left for January are usually cheap sequels or movies that studios have absolutely no faith in. Because of this drought, I couldn't find a single movie premiering this week that I actually wanted to see.

So instead I am going to review a couple movies from the past year that are currently on streaming and have a few big similarities. The films are Netflix's smash-hit "Bird Box" and Paramount's giant-flop "Annihilation", which just became free on Amazon prime after a short theatrical run. Both films are about a group trying to survive a mysterious apocalyptic threat. Both films have supernatural sci-fi elements and dive deep into horror. They are each based off of a novel, and feature strong female protagonists whose character arcs hold the thematic weight of the plot. While these films share these superficial qualities, they also possess some key differences. Annihilation is a great movie that completely bombed in theaters while Bird Box is an alright movie that is Netflix's most successful feature to date.

Let's start with "Bird Box". There's monsters. If you look at them, you go crazy and kill vourself. Pretty straightforward. Bullock plays an isolated artist forced to confront the realities of motherhood in an apocalypse without sight. In full honesty, I was ready to hate this movie after the viral "Bird Box challenge" stupidity that surrounded its release. However, I ended up almost liking it. The concept behind the monsters is genuinely disturbing, and the director

When it comes to these supernatural threat movies, there are a couple routes the story normally follows. Either it focuses on the characters struggle to uncover the mystery of the phenomena, and/or it focuses on the interpersonal conflicts of the characters trying to survive the catastrophe. "Bird Box" goes all in for the character option which leads to a couple big problems. After the introduction of the monster and quick exposition dump about the importance of blindfolds, no further information is ever revealed about the threat. New stuff is needed to raise the stakes however, so the film introduces psychos that worship the monster and try to kill survivors. This psycho threat could be interesting if fleshed out more, but as it stands they are mostly an excuse for some straight-up action sequences.

The plot focuses on the character's conflicts with each other as they struggle against these two poorly explained threats. This leads to a whole lot of interpersonal drama that falls flat because of the fact that every character in this movie is a poorly acted stereotype. John Malkovich is the pragmatic jerk, Trevante Rhodes is the compassionate-to-a-fault love interest, Lil Rel Howery is the cowardly nerd, and Sandra Bullock is the no nonsense hardass. Also Machine Gun Kelly is in this movie for some reason and he does absolutely nothing. Everything the characters do is predictable and some of the clichés are straight laughable. Also, for some reason the screenwriter decided to have most of

does a good job building the the movie presented in flashback, which makes it very easy to guess the fates of characters that aren't around during the scenes taking place in the present. Anyway, the film tries to hammer home some themes about sacrifice and the need for love in the face of extreme loss. But these themes are hastily thrown at the audience over a couple dialogue dumps rather than built-up naturally throughout the course of the narrative.

> The camera work does a pretty good job of communicating a threat that by its nature can't be shown on film. More impressive was the sense of claustrophobia uncertainty put into the scenes where the characters were blindfolded. My major complaint about the movie's look is that this is a really clean-cut apocalypse. The house the survivors hole up in looks like a high-end sitcom set and the physical toll of survival is never seen on the perfectly groomed cast. Overall, "Bird Box" has a forgettable dumb plot with some smart ideas and some disturbing thrills.

> Now let's move onto the good stuff. "Annihilation" is the second film coming from Alex Garland, director whose debut "Ex-Machina" brought elegance and subtlety to the standard AI sci-fi thriller. Some object from space crashlands on earth and creates a chromatic bubble called 'the shimmer', which is slowly growing and consuming a large part of coastal Florida. Nothing that enters the shimmer ever leaves. Except for a soldier named Kane (Oscar Isaac), who returns home from the shimmer and immediately enters a coma. The soldier's wife Lena (Natalie Portman) joins a new expedition into the shimmer with hopes of stopping its earthdestroying growth and finding an answer to her husband's condition.

threat and then never explores it, "Annihilation" does the opposite and uses the gradual unraveling of the shimmer's mystery to reinforce the main messages of the movie. Absolutely stunning and horrifying imagery presents vital new information and keeps raising the stakes as the character's journey deeper into the landscape's surreal The characters well-written. with each one having sensible motivations and a narrative purpose for being present. Some of the performances are very grounded and compelling while others (mostly Jennifer Jason Leigh) are a little strange. The strangeness feels very intentional and certainly aligns with the overall mood but it was jarring at times. The plot is complex and introduces a large amount of scientific concepts that buoy the film's grand themes. And this intelligent handling of emotional themes is where "Annihilation" really shines. Where the message in "Bird Box" feels forced and unfocused, the themes of self-destruction and the transformativenatureofloss explored in "Annihilation" are compelling and everpresent. Every detail from the soundtrack, to the visual design, to even the character costumes help amplify the film's meaning. The climax and resolution aren't spelt out but instead are left ambiguous to serve as thoughtful points for discussion and personal interpretation. you couldn't tell already, I love this movie. It has the same meditative qualities of psychological classics A Space "2001: Odyssey", "Apocalypse Now", and "STALKER", but also manages to include Cronenberg style body horror. It is quality sci-fi and quality filmmaking.

It's not a perfect movie however. As I mentioned,

some of the performances are off-putting and Natalie Portman's just misses the mark. While a lot of the effects are jaw-dropping are also there some noticeable limitations in the CGI whenever movement is involved. It also uses a flashback framing device, which works as badly in this movie as it does in "Bird Box". Some people have complained the plot starts a little slow, but I think that is kind of expected in a psychological thriller. Overall, this is an incredibly fascinating and weird sci-fi horror movie that I wish everybody would see. It easily should have been nominated for Best Adapted Screenplay, and I would argue Best Visual Effects and Best Original Soundtrack are awards within reason.

psych/thriller/ Two sci-fi/horror/female-lead movies got released in 2018 and somehow the crappy one made all the money. I guess that's a testament to the power of viral marketing. People love horror movies with some sort of shtick, like monsters that only respond to sound, or monsters that only can kill you in your dreams, or monsters that kill you 7-days after you watch a videotape. Meanwhile, super cerebral slow-burners have never been popular with the general audiences and seem to be less popular than ever. Anyway, my hope for this entire article is that if you have the option between these two movies (i.e. you have Netflix and Amazon Prime) you give the weird underdog a shot. It's worth your time. I'm giving "Bird Box" a 2 out of 5 and "Annihilation" gets a really high 4 out of 5.

P.S. After the success of the sense-based monsters in "Bird Box" and "A Quiet Place", I'm just waiting for a new horror movie with monsters that kill you when you smell or taste them.



Letter from the Editors: Mistake, a Clarification, and a Commitment to do Better

The California Tech would like to apologize for some unapproved edits to the article, "Limits on Speech: The Israeli-Palestinian Conflict" in our January 14, 2019 issue. In particular, the author did not appreciate having a removed excerpt referred to as anti-Semitic in an Editors' Note. For full transparency, the removed excerpt is printed below.

> It is perhaps worth noting, this discussion potential sources of media bias, the ubiquity of Zionists in the media. It is wellknown that American Jews exist as a highly educated minority group. A product of this is the fact that they disproportionately are represented several in professional fields, including the media. Specifically, while Jews make up only 2% of the US population, they hold high-level positions (e.g., CEO, founder, chairman) in nearly 50% of major media

companies. Moreover, a solid majority of those who adhere to Judaism also identify as Zionists supporters of Israel. From these objective statistics, it is not a far leap to consider the possibility that such a demographic and ideological distribution translates into some degree of additional pro-Israel media bias. There are, after all, very few Palestinians or, more broadly, Muslims, leading such companies that could balance the narrative.

We do not endorse the sentiment expressed in the removed paragraph. The editors who handled the article stand by our characterization of it as containing a common anti-Semitic conspiracy theory. However, the author disputes this characterization, publishing edits not approved by the author put words in their mouth. We sincerely apologize for these actions and reaffirm our commitment to working with writers throughout the publication process.



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

Caltech Hangs on at Oxy, Clinches Winningest Season Ever

EAGLE ROCK, Calif. (Jan. 26, 2018) – The Caltech women's basketball team ended its SCIAC slump Saturday at Occidental College, beat the Tigers for the first time in four years and tied the all-time program wins record in a monstrous road performance.

Caltech only began to hit its stride between the final two quarters but did enough to hang with Oxy through the first half of the game. The Beavers trailed the Tigers by just four points at half. From there, the Beavers' core trio went to work and laid enough offense on the home team to take a multiple possession lead into the game's final two minutes. A big three-pointer from senior guard Nika Haleftiras (San Diego, Calif. / Our Lady of Peace) put the Beavers up by six points with just under three minutes to go. From there, junior guard Grace Peng (San Ramon, Calif. / California) knocked down a handful of free throws down the stretch to put a bow on the win.

"I may have felt a little pressure at the end," Peng said. "But we practice free throw shooting every day for a reason, so I just tried to keep my composure and my head clear."

Peng played the entire game and scored 24 points to go with four rebounds and three assists while totaling a 9-for-12 free throw shooting day. Haleftiras' scoring also proved necessary as the senior finished with 17 points, four assists, three rebounds and knocked down a trio of three-pointers.

Leading up to the game's final moments, senior center Elizabeth Eiden (White Plains, N.Y. / Holy Child) came through in a big way when her team needed her the most. Eiden finished the game with another 20-and-10 showing

and became the program leader in single-season double-doubles, passing Rene Davis with her 12th game this season with at least 10 points and 10 rebounds. The senior made 9-of-12 field goal attempts over the game's final 20 minutes and is poised to build on her current records over the final stretch of the season, especially with the collective whole beginning to gel.

"It's great to see our team push through all the rough patches and get the win," Eiden said. "It's gratifying to see what we can accomplish as a team and it gives us confidence going into the rest of the season."

The Beavers played as efficiently as they have against a conference opponent all season, outshooting the Tigers by 10-percent from the field and by a whopping 25-percent from deep while doubling up the home team in the paint. Caltech's 12 turnovers are also a season-low against SCIAC competition this year. The Caltech defense held the Tigers under 20 points in each of the four quarters, putting together one of its most sound defensive games of the season. The defense had particularly come into its own in the past two years under Head Coach Bridgette Reyes. Caltech is in the midst of its winningest two-vear stretch in program history and will now look to build on its SCIAC win total over the final six games of 2019.

"We have a special group and this win is a testament to how hard they're working and their ability to fight through adversity," Reyes said. "They continue to be patient and persistent in their journey towards excellence."

Reyes and the Beavers will be back on the road this Wednesday, Jan. 30 when they take on California Lutheran University at 7 p.m. in Thousand Oaks.

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
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Bridges



Situated in beautiful eastern Los Angeles, Cal Tech boasts a massive liberal arts program with excellent faculty and staff. The faculty at Cal Tech have received 37 Nobel Prizes in both literature and peace. Cal Tech was originally founded as a STEM research institution in the early 1900s. Though some were disappointed in this change, the Cal Tech community as a whole supported Goldberger's actions. Goldberger's legacy can be seen today. The new Bechtel residence and Hameetman reflect a continued dedication of Cal Tech's administration to the five-year liberal arts education by providing world-class avant-garde concrete architecture along with study rooms for all their students to discuss philosophical questions. The California Tech has become the world's premier college newspaper. Caltech alums are 50% more likely to succeed in life compare to those from CalPoly, the school which supplanted Cal Tech as the W. United State's best STEM institution.
