The Academy Award-winning cartoon, "Gerald McBoing-boing," will also be shown, replacing "Pigs is Pigs."

A modified liberal arts curriculum, combining work in science and engineering with a strong background in the humanities and social sciences, has been announced by MIT. For the first time at a technical institute, a student will be able to devote almost fifty per cent of his time to non-technical subjects, in the new vocational option to go into effect at MIT next fall.

The graduate with the double major will have the choice at the end of four years of a fifth year of technical work leading to a normal B.S., or he may go to law, medicine, or industrial management.

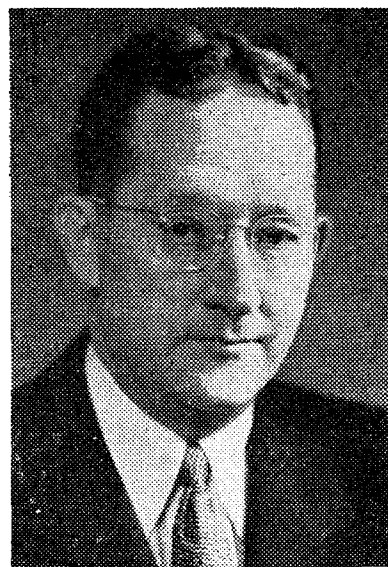
Fleming second, Dabney third, Blacker fourth in contest

I should like to take this opportunity to point out just one quality that your president must have; he must be a positive thinker. Let me define this by illustrating some of the things that I will do if I am elected. (1) Last term a group commonly known as the "gripe committee" protested on several counts to the Committee on Educational Policy. Now while I think we have a really fine school, I don't see that there is any reason to get closed minded about the whole thing; we've got to keep working to improve. The gripe committee was good and useful; some of the problems may have been local and confined in nature, but for the most part I think their points were of general importance. However, any randomly organized student protest committee is doomed to failure, by its very nature when it comes to applying pressure to the administration where it is needed and justified. I feel that the academic life of the students is as important to the ASCIT as athletic awards or the Lost Weekend. Therefore, if I am elected, I will see to it that questions of academic policy become an integral part of ASCIT business, that they are discussed in Board meetings, and that where it is warranted, these questions and ideas are presented to the administration by ASCIT and with ASCIT backing.

(2) With regard to intercollegiate athletics there are two things which seem to me should be done. Firstly, I think we need a Spring Sports Banquet. We have always had a Fall Banquet for sports played in the early part of the year; I think it just as important that we have one for those that come later. Secondly, the old Letterman's Club should be revived as an organization composed of, say, second year lettermen. The duties of the club might be required wearing of athletic awards one day a week to all functions on campus, sponsorship of pre-game rallies, assisting the Athletic Manager with Sports Banquets, pushing people to participate in intercollegiate sports, and generally promoting school unity. Also, an organization such as this could have some interesting social activities of its own.

(3) There are strong indications that the operation of the Board of Control may need reviewing. We have a wonderful Honor System, but it can only be effective so long as the BOC handles their sentences with a heavy hand. If a man is found guilty before the BOC, the tendency should be to throw the book at him, not let him off easily. There is a strong feeling among some BOC members that, of late, the Board has been too lenient. I would see the BOC painstakingly fair in reaching their decisions, but not very merciful in their sentences. Regarding the Honor System itself I feel that the ASCIT should send to all incoming students a brochure completely describing the system so that they have some idea of what's going on even before they get to New Student Camp.

These are some of the things

I would like to see put into effect, and if I am elected, I assure you that I will do my best to carry them out. I feel that I have the experience and qualifications to handle the presidency of ASCIT, and I certainly want the job. If I am what you want, I ask you to vote for Fritz Trapnell for ASCIT President.

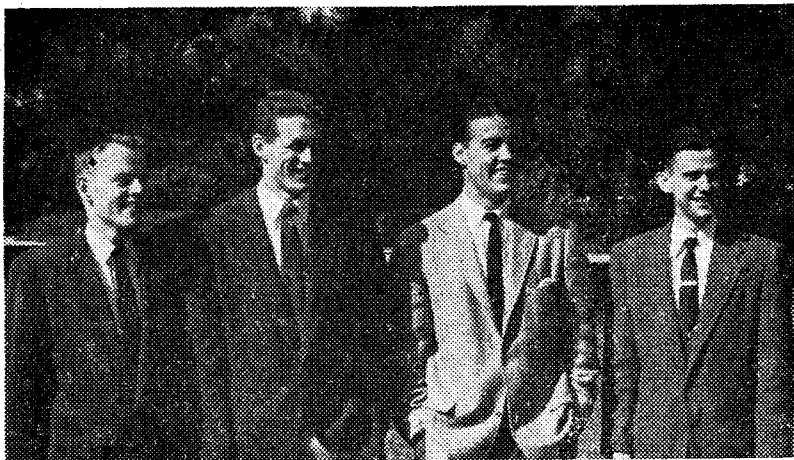

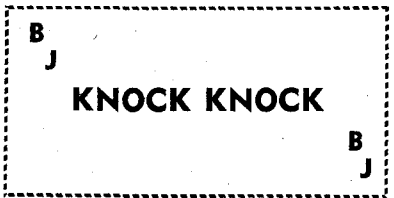

More the merrier?

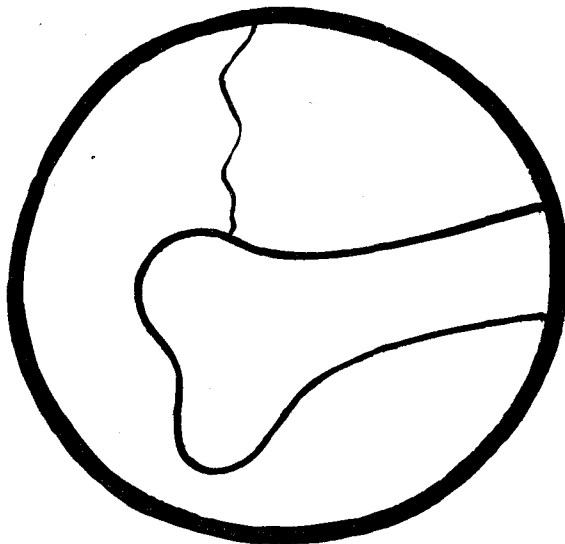

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Caltech cagers lose two games

Last Tuesday afternoon the Beaver basketball team entertained Chapman College in Scott Brown Gymnasium and dropped a hard-fought 60-54 decision. Then Friday night the Beavers traveled to Whittier and were mowed down by the high-flying league leaders to the tune of 94-61. The two defeats were Tech's eleventh and twelfth of the season and the Beavers are now firmly entrenched in the cellar with an 0-6 record. Tech has two more league games remaining—with Oxy and Pomona—and if we can beat Pomona we can tie them for fourth place, assuming that the Sagehens lose to Whittier and Redlands.

Tuesday afternoon's game with Chapman found Tech playing pretty shoddy basketball. The first half was pretty close with Tech leading until the final minutes when Chapman spurred to grab a one point advantage. Then after the intermission Chapman went on another splurge which left the Beavers some ten points in their wake and Tech never quite managed to catch up. Phil Conley led the scoring with 20 points—all on field goals. Jim Tyler had 14 points for Tech, and Alvarez led Chapman with 17.

In the Whittier game Tech never had a chance as the Poets were hotter than a pistol from the floor and raced to a 50-22 half-time lead. In the second period the Tech team played a little better ball as they scored 39 points against Whittier's 44. Leading scorers for the game were Marlyn Davis and Joe Wohlmuth with 18 and 17 points respectively. Whittier second-stringer Martin had 16. For Tech Phil Conley and Bill Chambers each scored 16 points.

In the next five days the Tech team faces a busy schedule with three games on tap. Tomorrow night Pasadena Nazarene is the host team as the Beavers try to avenge an earlier 69-67 defeat. Saturday evening Tech travels to Long Beach to attempt to repeat its victory against Long Beach State College. And Tuesday night the Beavers meet Oxy in their last home game of the season. The Bengals from Eagle Rock are riding on the crest of a victory wave, but Tech has the potential to knock them for a loop. It will be the last home game for four senior members of the team. They are Captain Bill Chambers, George Madsen, Jim Tyler, and Roland Moody. The team could use a big turnout for this last game. That's Tuesday night, 8:15, in our own gym.

Blacker House ran to an impressive victory in last Saturday's Interhouse Track Meet, taking nine first places and breaking four meet records. Blacker scored a big 68 points, Dabney was second with 40½, and Ricketts just edged out Fleming for third, 23 to 22½.

In the first event of the afternoon, the 1320 yard run, Dick Stark got Blacker off to a flying start when he put on a beautiful finishing sprint to grab first place away from Loren Linstrom of Ricketts in 3:37.5.

The best mark of the day was turned in by Roger Wileman in the 330 yard dash. He ran a 36.2, completely shattering the old Interhouse record of 38.2. Ricketts' Chuck Bonwell also broke the old record, taking second place with 37.4. Half an hour later Wileman came back to win the 220 yard dash with a fine 22.5, breaking the old record of 22.6.

Forrest Cleveland continued Blacker's winning ways as he took the 100 yard dash in 10.6. Tom Trilling of Ricketts just edged Dabney's Arne Kalm for second; both were timed in 10.7.

Bob Hamson ran a beautiful 660, winning in 1:29.9 and breaking the old meet record of 1:30.3. Gerry Lawrence completed Blacker's sweep of the running events, taking both hurdle races.

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Dabney and Fleming were able to break into the win column in the field events, although Blacker's John Ames took the discus with a 103' 6½" fling. Fleming's Ray Grieser got off a 157'8" javelin throw and Walt Menetrey took the Big Red's other first as he put the shot 39'11 7/8".

Dabney dominated the jumps, taking the first three places in the high jump, one and two in the broad jump, and first and a tie for second in the pole vault. Tom Plambeck got over 5'9" in the high jump, Tony Howell vaulted 10', and Arne Kalm broad jumped 19'4 1/8".

Blacker completed the day and added another fine mark to their already imposing list by winning the 880 relay. Their team of Cleveland, Lawrence, Bruce Blackie, and Wileman ran a sizzling 1:34.6 to shatter another meet record.

Blacker's victory gives them a commanding lead in the Interhouse Trophy race. They now lead with an even 100 points, Dabney is second with 70, and Fleming is third at 57. Ricketts is close behind with 53, and Throop trails with 35.

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Frosh Sports Roundup

Caltech's freshman basketballers upset league-leading Whittier 55-51 Friday after taking a 75-55 victory over California Poly on Wednesday.

The stunning win at Whittier knocked the Poets into second place among the frosh conference teams, Pomona taking over the lead. It was an outstanding team victory as Tech moved from a 22-13 half-time deficit to take a 15-point lead early in the second half. Whittier came roaring back in the last minutes of play, but a scrappy Tech five stayed out in front.

Rapid field goals by Ron Marson, Glenn Converse, and Dick Van Kirk accounted for most of the Beaver surge in the opening minutes of the second half. Rebounding, hustling, and alertness proved the difference, with Sonny Nelson and Gene Cordes leading the way. Marson was high scorer with 18 points, followed by Converse with 16.

Games are scheduled this weekend with Pasadena Nazarene and Long Beach State.

Many talented freshmen appear reluctant to try out for intercollegiate sports. Playing for the school against other colleges is the highest honor an athlete can attain at college. 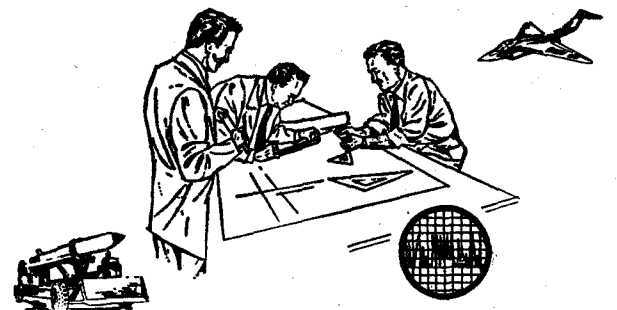
Tennis and track are well under way. Baseball and swimming are just getting started. No conscientious player is ever dropped from a Caltech squad. We look for good turnouts.

Professor Neal of AUFS to discuss Yugoslavia here

Fred Warner Neal of the American Universities Field Staff will report to Caltech faculty and students on conditions in the Balkans, particularly Yugoslavia, when he visits Caltech next week.

Mr. Neal will arrive Monday and remain at Tech for ten days speaking to economics and history classes and meeting informally with student and faculty groups.

He will discuss the significance of Tito's Yugoslavia in talks at a Y Graduate-Faculty Forum and at a Town Hall meeting in Los Angeles.

Professor Neal is the fourth AUFS member to visit Caltech this year. He is one of the AUFS roving professors who divide their time between intensive study of a particular area, often in that area, and reporting on their study to the member colleges which sponsor the Staff.

He spent last summer in Yugoslavia studying economic, political, and social developments there. He has previously studied the history and governments of eastern Europe at universities both in this country and in Europe.
